- 3. W-9 Form completed for each exhibitor
- 4. Release of Liability and Indemnity Agreement completed for each exhibitor
- 5. Any additional entry forms required for entry for participants (if applicable). Please make sure to read specific contest rules.
- 6. Summary Sheet from the online entry process.

Quality Counts Verification: Exhibitors are required to pass the Quality Counts Verification test for entry into the 2025 Show. Junior market and breeding show entries will not be accepted without the verification code for each exhibitor. Verification codes are not required for Calf Scramble entrants, Agricultural Mechanics exhibitors, Poster Board contest, Video Competition, and Judging Contest contestants. Junior Breeding Beef Heifers: CEA/ASTs must adhere to the deadlines and requirements outlined in the TX 4-H and FFA Heifer Validation Program for all junior breeding beef heifers and substitutes to exhibit at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Registration papers must be recorded in the name of the exhibitor on or before November 1 for <u>all entered and possible substitute junior breeding beef heifers and uploaded to the TX 4-H/FFA Heifer Validation site</u>. See TX 4-H and FFA Heifer Validation Program site for more details.

All Junior Show entries must be made together and at one time by the CEA/AST.

Group classes for Junior Breeding Sheep must be specified on the entry forms and the fee of \$10 per entry must be paid. Entries submitted on **Dec. 6 until the end of check-in for each individual species** will automatically be charged a \$500 late fee.

- **REQUIRED** -Each Junior Exhibitor and Open Show Exhibitor must complete an IRS W-9 form and return it with entry.


All exhibitors (except for Jr. Comm Steer, Poultry & Open Rabbit Show) must enter and stage at AIRPORT BOULEVARD.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Force Majeure

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo shall not be liable for any delay or failure to perform its operations, activities, shows and events to the extent such delay or failure results from a force majeure occurrence. A force majeure occurrence is defined as any occurrence which makes performance by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo illegal, impossible, inadvisable or, in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's reasonable opinion, unsafe or commercially impracticable, and includes, but is not limited to (i) any breakage or accident to equipment, machinery or facilities; (ii) any strikes, lock-outs or other labor difficulties; (iii) statutes, ordinances, regulations, orders, directives or rules issued by governmental authorities, including, but not limited to those concerning public health and safety, animal disease prevention, detection and response and/or protection of the environment; (iv) judicial decrees or orders; (v) pandemics, epidemics, quarantines, recognized health threats as determined by the World Health Organization, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or state or local government authority or health agencies (including, but not limited to the health threats of COVID-19, H1N1 or other infectious diseases); (vi) animal diseases and/or quarantines; (vii) wars, riots or insurrections; (viii) civil disobediences, public demonstrations or sabotage; (ix) acts of God , fires, floods, national disasters, explosions or inclement weather; (x) inability to obtain necessary labor, materials, supplies, utilities or transportation; (xi) depressions, recessions or other economic downturns; (xii) embargoes or energy shortages; or (xiii) any other cause beyond the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's reasonable control.

NRG Park Emergency Evacuations

Evacuation of Livestock/Equine: During such times as deemed necessary by local, state or federal authorities, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, and/or its officials may evacuate NRG Park. Incidents such as, but not limited to, bomb threats, acts of war, declarations of war, code red of the Homeland Security System, fire, etc. will be acted upon in accordance and cooperation with local, state and federal authorities. Priority evacuation will be given to human life, then livestock and/or equine. In such cases, exhibitors and/or contestants will turn over the care of their livestock or equine to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Proper animal husbandry practices will be followed within reasonable expectations. At which time the evacuation notice is lifted, then exhibitors/contestants will be allowed to reenter NRG Park and claim their livestock or equine.

By making entry into the Show, you authorize the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and its officials to detain your livestock/equine on these premises. Furthermore, you agree to hold harmless and without liability the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, its officials, directors, officers, volunteers, and staff for those animals under the reasonable care of the Show.

Administration of Rules and Regulations

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo reserves to its Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Show, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the following rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums.

Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary; if there is a conflict between the special rules of any department and the general rules and regulations, the special rules will govern. If any of the rules, or any provision of any single rule, is later held to be legally invalid or otherwise unenforceable, all other rules, and all other provisions and terms of any rule containing a provision or term later held to be legally invalid or unenforceable, shall remain in full force and effect.

Disclaimer of Warranties

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo expressly disclaims any express or implied warranties (including merchantability), whether the goods or services are provided by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo or by others (such as drug testing). The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo does NOT provide security or guard services.

Definitions Pertaining to Rules and Regulations

Breeder: The breeder of an animal is the owner of the dam at the time of service. Prior to the close of entries, when a breeder disposes of his herd to a corporation wherein, he is a stockholder or manager, such animals may be exhibited as bred by said corporation.

Grade: Grade is defined to mean an animal having one purebred parent and showing predominantly the characteristic of the breed of that parent.

Attention: Use of Drugs

The use by non-veterinarians* of animal drugs or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by FDA is a violation of federal law. Exhibitor and exhibitor's parents and/or guardians agree that: (1) they are absolutely and completely responsible persons for the care and custody of their animals, (2) the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo shall be entitled to disqualify an exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug, even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and did not administer the drug, (3) the drug test results of the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents and/or guardians. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor.

* Abuse of the extra-label privilege by veterinarians is unethical and is subject to serious consequences such as license revocation.

Statement of Liability

All exhibits are under the control and direction of the Show Management, but the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is not responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him and for its description as given in the catalog, and shall indemnify the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as damage or injury to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor, or any of the animals exhibited by him, or arising out of, or in any way connected with such exhibition of any of the animals so exhibited.

Entry Requirements and Procedures

Liability Statement: Exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) must sign a statement
acknowledging that he/she understands and will abide by the liability requirements and rules and regulations of the Houston
Livestock Show and Rodeo. If the exhibitor does not sign this statement (attached to the entry application), his/her application for
entry will not be accepted.

2. Eligible to Enter:

- a. Invitational Show: The HLSR is an invitational Livestock Show. HLSR reserves the right to extend, withhold, or revoke an invitation to any Exhibitor or Contestant.
- b. **Exhibitor Age Limit:** To be eligible to show an animal, an exhibitor must have reached the age of 5 years old on or before March 1, 2025. The show reserves the right to set a higher minimum age in each breed show.
- c. Special Rules: To be eligible to enter, exhibitors and their livestock must meet the special requirements of the animal or breed of animal to be exhibited. These requirements are listed in the Special Rules section in the Open Show division or Junior Show division of this handbook.
- d. **Certificates of Registry:** Animals in the breeding classes must be recorded in the recognized books of record for their respective breeds. Exhibitors must produce original certificates of registry at the request of the Superintendent in charge. Tattoos, ear tags or other identification marks must match registration certificates.
- e. **Possession of Livestock:** Animals, whether entered singular or in groups, must be the legal property of the exhibitor. Breeding livestock or poultry entries, except where otherwise specified, must be entered in the name of the owner or exhibitor must have permission of owner to enter and/or exhibit animals.
- f. **Firms and Partnerships:** Firms and partnerships entering animals for competition must exist when entry applications are submitted. Firm and partnership arrangements must be bona fide. Partnerships are not allowed in the Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show, Junior Breeding Gilt Show, and Junior Market Shows.

3. Ineligible to Enter:

- a. **Disqualified Exhibitors**: The Show, cooperating with the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association and using the Rule Infraction Database, reserves the right to refuse entry of any exhibitor. An exhibitor found in violation of any Show rules is subject to have his/her name and the result of the rule violation submitted to the Rule Infraction Database administered by the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association.
- b. **Diseased Animals**: Diseased animals cannot enter the Livestock Show area or grounds. Superintendents will refuse unloading privileges to animals showing signs and symptoms of disease.
- c. **Barren Animals:** Barren animals are not eligible for breeding classes. An affidavit verifying the animal is a breeder must be furnished on request.

4. Entry Procedure:

- a. **Entry Submission:** Entry applications must be submitted on current, official Houston Livestock Show entry applications and must include all requested information. Incomplete entries will be returned to applicants. Complete entries, including signature of the applicant/exhibitor, parent or guardian are to be filed in the Livestock Show office.
- b. **Group Classes:** Entries for group classes also must be shown in their respective single classes. Exhibitors must indicate the Breed and Group Class in which they expect to compete. Group Class entries must be made by the appropriate entry deadline and must include the appropriate entry fees.
- c. Entering Both Junior Show and Open Show: If the exhibitor chooses to show in both the Junior Show and the Open Show, separate entry applications and fees are required. Only animals entered in the Junior Dairy Show, Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show and the Junior Breeding Sheep Show may also enter the Open Show.
- d. Acceptance of Entry: Show Management reserves the right to reject, accept or accept conditionally an application for entry. Entry does not guarantee space in the exhibition buildings. Entries received after all pens, stalls or coops have been reserved will be returned to the exhibitor.

- 5. Erroneous Entries: At the discretion of Show Management, exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper classes prior to judging. Show Management will decide the disposition of each case of erroneous entry upon its merits.
- 6. Entry Deadline Dates: Entry deadlines are strictly enforced.
 - a. Junior Show Individual Entries: Entries must be submitted ONLINE before midnight, Dec. 1. Junior Show entries submitted after Dec. 1 and on or before Dec. 5 will be accepted with a \$250 late fee. Entries submitted on Dec. 6 until the end of check in for each individual species will automatically be charged a \$500 late fee per entry.

Quality Counts Verification: Exhibitors are required to pass the Quality Counts Verification test for entry into the current year Show. Junior market, breeding show entries, and Calf Scramble entrants will not be accepted without the verification code for each exhibitor. Verification codes are not required for Agricultural Mechanics exhibitors, Young Guns Clay Shoot, Young Guns Skeet Shoot, Archery, Poster Board contest, Video Competition, and Judging Contest contestants. - 2. A completed Junior Show Entry Worksheet for each exhibitor.
- 3. W-9 Form completed for each exhibitor.
- 4. Release of Liability and Indemnity Agreement completed for each exhibitor.
- 5. Any additional entry forms required for entry for participants (if applicable). Please make sure to read specific contest rules.
- 6. Summary Sheet from the online entry process.

10. Parking Permits

<u>Open Show</u> – one per the first animal entered and one for every additional 4 head beyond the first animal entered. One parking pass will be assigned to Gate 11 Parking (onsite parking), all additional parking passes will be assigned to Gate 21 Parking (lot located South of 610 at the corner of West Belfort and Kirby).

<u>Junior Show</u> – Parking will be distributed as follows:

- **Gate 11 Parking** (onsite parking): Each club/chapter will receive <u>1 parking pass</u> for this lot for each time period that the club/chapter has entries for teacher/agents. If the lot meets capacity, vehicles with a pass to this lot will be sent to Gate 21.
- **Gate 21** (lot located South of 610 at the corner of West Belfort and Kirby): Parking will be distributed for each time period as follows based on total entries per time period:

The parking permit must be displayed from rear view mirror and is transferable to other vehicles. Permits do not guarantee a parking space. Parking permits cannot be purchased and are not distributed during the Show; they must be obtained in advance.

*In addition to grounds passes, 2 parking passes per team will be issued to on-site judging contest participants. Judging contest participants will not be allowed on the grounds without a parking pass.

**Permit must be displayed from rear view mirror and is transferable to other vehicles. Permits do not guarantee a parking space. Vehicle permits cannot be purchased and are not distributed during the Show; they must be obtained in advance.

11. Admission Passes: Livestock Exhibitor Season Passes are available in advance or upon arrival. NRG Park Admission tickets are available only upon arrival.

12. Refunds: There are no entry fee refunds after the entry deadline (Junior Show: Dec. 1, Open Show: Jan. 5).

Competition

- 13. Judges:
 - a. **Selection of Judges**: Show Management is solely responsible for selecting judges and determining judging systems. Judges will be familiar with all rules, regulations and procedures of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
 - b. Judges' Decision: The judges' decisions are final. If fraud, misrepresentation, error or collusion is discovered after awards have been given, the Show Management or appointed referee will make a decision regarding final placement. Such decisions may be appealed to the Executive Committee from whose decision there will be no appeal. Protests alleging that the judges overlooked exhibits will not be considered.
 - c. **Interfering with Judges**: An exhibitor or his representative who interferes with or displays disrespect to a judge or the Show could forfeit any monies earned or be subject to other penalties assessed by the Show.
- **14. Sifting Committees**: The Show may appoint sifting committees to determine the eligibility of animals to compete prior to judging. Animals must be un-blanketed and ready for inspection by the sifting committee at the announced time of sifting. The sifting committee will eliminate any animal which, in its judgment, is not qualified to compete. At the committee's recommendation, the Show may require these animals to be removed from the grounds. The sifting committee's decisions are final and protests will not be considered by the Show.
- **15.** Security Personnel: Exhibitors not cooperating with security personnel or Show officials in all matters of policy, including parking, will have their entries canceled and will be ordered to remove their exhibit from the grounds immediately.

16. Protests:

- a. **Protest Filing**: All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a \$300 deposit which will not be returned if protest is not sustained by Show Management. Protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Show Management immediately after the occasion that prompted the protest. Protests will be accepted prior to, during and within 2 hours immediately following the occasion that prompted the protest. Protests concerning ages of animals must be filed with the Show Management prior to the day on which the animal(s) is/are to be judged.
- b. **Protest Investigation:** Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a complete investigation has been conducted.

17. Show Ring Competition:

- a. **Entry Numbers**: Each entry will be assigned a number. Exhibitors will receive corresponding cards with numbers which must be displayed by exhibitors during judging.
- b. **Requirement to Show:** Animals properly entered in a show class and passed on by the sifting committee as eligible for competition must be brought into the show ring for competition. Exhibitors who refuse, without Show approval, to lead their animals for parade or for competition in the show ring will forfeit any prizes previously won. Also, refusing exhibitor may be barred from further participation in the Show and be required to remove their stock from the Show grounds immediately.
- c. Arena Promptness: Promptness to the show ring is required. In order to keep the show moving, neither classes (this includes division, breed and overall drives) nor show order will wait on a participant to bring their animal to the ring. The Superintendent has the authority to disqualify an animal if they do not enter the ring in a timely manner.
- d. **Judging Contests**: When an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more animals for the students' judging contests, he or she will cooperate with the Show. Refusing to allow an animal to be used in this manner, without Show approval, will result in the forfeit of any prizes or such other action as the Show deems necessary. Selection will be made under the direction of the department superintendent.
- e. **Disqualification:** If an animal is disqualified after having won awards or premiums, the animals placing below may be moved up to fill the vacated position.
- **18. Photographs:** Exhibitors must present themselves and their animals, at the Show's request, for official photographs. Those photographs are the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Unofficial (i.e., personal) photographs may not be published without written approval of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Exhibitors wishing to purchase photographs must contact the Official Livestock Photographer.
- 19. Animal Handling: Only experienced handlers may lead livestock within the premises of NRG Park. Show Management reserves the right to release any animal with less than desirable disposition. In any such case, the owner will have up to twelve hours to remove the excused animal from show grounds. The decision of Show Management is final, and exhibitor or purchaser has no recourse.
- **20. Removal of Animals:** The Show can remove any exhibit, animal, booth or show they deem unsuitable or objectionable, without furnishing reasons for the action. Fees already paid for space or stalls may be returned to the exhibitor at the discretion of Show Management. The decision of Show Management is final, and exhibitor or purchaser has no recourse.
- **21. Animal Welfare:** It is the responsibility of all exhibitors to provide proper and humane care and treatment to animals. Show Management reserves the right to disqualify and remove any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal husbandry.

In accordance with Section 42.09 as defined in the TX Health and Safety code, any exhibitor found in violation of the following actions is subject to disqualification and a \$10,000 fine.

Section 42.09 "Cruelty to Livestock Animals" of the The TX Health and Safety code prohibits a person from intentionally, knowingly or recklessly cruelly treating an animal. The following actions define cruel punishment.

- 1. Torturing an animal or in a cruel manner kills or causes serious bodily injury to an animal;
- 2. Without the owner's effective consent, kills, administers poison to, or causes serious bodily injury to an animal;
- 3. Fails unreasonably to provide necessary food, water, care, or shelter for an animal in the person's custody;
- 4. Abandons unreasonably an animal in the person's custody;
- 5. Transports or confines animal in the person's custody;
- 6. Without the owner's effective consent, causes bodily injury to an animal;
- 7. Causes one animal to fight with another animal, if either animal is not a dog;
- 8. Uses a live animal as a lure in dog race training or in in dog coursing on a racetrack; or
- 9. Seriously overworks an animal.
- 22. Animal/Exhibitor Disqualification: To foster fair competition, to provide a level playing field and to protect the safety of food, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species is subject to disqualification if that animal tests positive for that drug upon arrival at NRG Park. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on Show grounds.

Any exhibitor found in violation of the HLSR unethical fitting and/or residue avoidance policy is subject to disqualification, revocation of payment and suspension from any future participation in any HLSR sanctioned youth competition. Further, any infraction resulting in disqualification may affect scholarship eligibility.

a. **Unethical Fitting:** Unethical fitting means <u>any</u> alteration of the natural appearance, conformation, musculature, or weight of an animal by <u>any</u> unnatural means. Such alterations do not include common and accepted animal husbandry practices. Animals showing <u>any</u> signs of being unethically fitted will be subject to disqualification.

HLSR will appoint a designee at the time of sifting or classification to promptly inspect any suspected instances of unethical fitting. If surgical alterations are suspected, exhibitors MUST produce a veterinarian note at the time of inspection, that must include the following: the identification of the exhibit by its state validation number, the reason for the alteration, and when the alteration was performed. HLSR, in its sole discretion, will determine whether an exhibit has been unethically fitted and may, in its sole discretion, disqualify the exhibit. Such determinations are final and binding on the exhibitor and not subject to appeal.

Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to the following:

- application of <u>any</u> substance to any part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that species; injection, drenching or application of any substance per rectum is prohibited
- use of injections
- draining of fluids
- bruising
- feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass
- surgical alterations
- artificially filling animals by stomach pumping or airing injections
- Alternative treatments including but not limited to: Acupuncture, Massage Therapy, Therapeutic Laser
- b. **Drenching:** Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drenching tubes or any other method (by esophagus) is prohibited.
- c. **Therapeutic Practices:** The practice or use of any therapeutic application including, but not limited to animal chiropractic services, acupuncture or electrical massage stimulation on show grounds is prohibited.
- d. Over Age Animals: Over age animals will be disqualified.
- e. **Unapproved Drug Use**: The showing of any animal that has been administered during its life any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.
- f. **Approved Drug Use**: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at NRG Park. Animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on show grounds. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- g. Animal Inspection: As condition for participation in the Show, exhibitor must agree to submit any animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection. Exhibitor agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by the Show. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by the Show or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. Further, the Show specifically reserves the right to have tissue, blood, urine, hair, feather, and/or fecal laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the laboratory shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or age, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- h. Unmanageable Animals: The Show may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable.
- i. **Non-adherence to Rules:** Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Show rules will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- j. Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on Show grounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. An exhibitor may choose a licensed veterinarian other than the official Show veterinarian, but the official Show veterinarian MUST be notified in advance and he/she MUST be present. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, The Official Show Veterinarian, in agreement with Show Management, reserve the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official Show Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official Show Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and/or elimination time, the animal will be determined ineligible for competition.
- k. Treatment Cost: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

- 23. Animal Handling Devices: Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. <u>Halters of any material less than ½</u> inch in diameter are prohibited for all species, including but not limited to: cable, nylon, string and monofilament.
- 24. Release Times: Exhibitors and their animals must remain at the Show until animals are released by Show Management. An animal on exhibition may not be removed from the grounds prior to its release time without a special order given by the Agricultural Exhibits Division. Release times are listed in the daily schedule. Any violation of this rule will cause forfeiture of all premiums earned by exhibitor.
- 25. Exhibitor Grounds Pass: Anyone abusing the use of or transferring passes will forfeit the pass.

Exhibitor Conduct and Exhibit Area Rules

- **26.** Care of Property: Owners and those in charge of property or livestock shall care for, guard, protect and preserve the same. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will not be held responsible for any loss or damage.
- 27. Aisles/Passageways: No tables, chairs, coolers, carts, buckets, feed bags, bales of hay, tack boxes or anything that might pose a tripping hazard are allowed in the aisles. (The aisles are designated for animals and people to walk on, and for emergency evacuation.)
- 28. Fire Marshal Regulations: No hot plates, fryers, electric or gas burners are allowed. All crock pots, coffee pots, oven roasters when deemed safe to use, must be powered by a UL Listed Surge protector.

109.3 General penalty; continuing violations – When in this code an act is prohibited; is made or declared to be unlawful, or an offense or misdemeanor; wherever in this code the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful and no specific penalty is provided therefore, the violation of any such provision of code shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$500.00, nor more than \$2,000.00; provide, however, that no penalty shall be greater or lesser than the penalty provided for the same offense under the laws of the state. Each day any violation of this code shall continue shall constitute a separate offense. In prosecutions under this code, the various provisions hereof that are designated as exceptions shall not be treated as exceptions within the meaning of Section 2.02 of the TX Penal Code, and instead, they shall constitute defenses to prosecution within the meaning of Section 2.03 of the TX Penal Code.

109.2.2 Compliance with orders and notices – A notice of violation issued or served as provided by this code shall be complied with by the owner, operator, occupant or other person responsible for the condition or violation to which the notice of violation pertains.

- **29. Exhibitor Camping:** Lawn chairs that are reclining, zero gravity, or can be extended past the knee while sitting in the chair are prohibited from being used. Hammocks and round chairs (including bungee, soft web, and moon chairs) are prohibited. Tables, of any size or shape, are prohibited in the camping area.
- **30.** Grounds Conduct: The use of bikes, trikes, skateboards, and any other wheeled mode of transportation is prohibited on the show grounds. Pedestrians always have the right of way.
- **31.** Exhibitor Code of Ethics: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] is a family friendly event. As such, an individual's conduct as an exhibitor or patron should be exemplary, and violators are subject to disqualification or removal from Show grounds.

Violations include, but are not limited to:

- Disruptive or improper conduct
- Public display of profanity of any sort
- Violence of any sort
- Providing alcohol to underage persons or providing a space for the consumption of alcohol by underage persons.
- Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol by underage persons
- Excessive consumption of alcohol

The consumption, distribution, and service of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with the TX Alcoholic Beverage Code, which defines the lawful consumption and service of alcohol and prescribes sanctions for violations. The consumption, distribution, and service of alcoholic beverages must comply with HLSR regulations and policies.

The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo[™] is an invitational Livestock Show. HLSR reserves the right to extend, withhold, or revoke an invitation to any Exhibitor or Contestant.

32. Open Show Entertainment: Open show exhibitors must have prior approval for entertainment to be allowed in the stall areas. Only acoustic performers will be allowed unless HLSR gives approval otherwise.

33. Music: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is a family-friendly event. Exhibitors should keep noise and music to a minimum level as to not impact the exhibitors surrounding them, the general public, or the Retail Vendors. In addition, HLSR has the right to deem what music is appropriate for our event. All gatherings and music shall end no later than 10 p.m. daily. Violators will be subject to the Rule 30, Grounds Conduct and Rule 31, Exhibitor Code of Ethics.

- **34.** Signs: Livestock exhibitors are permitted to display a sign over their exhibit to advertise their own herd. This sign shall be of a reasonable size so as not to obstruct the view of other exhibitors' signs or exhibits of livestock. Signs not larger than 22 x 28 inches may be used to advertise individual animals within an individual exhibit. The Show can remove any sign. "For Sale" signs are not allowed.
- **35. Stall Availability:** Stall pen space is not guaranteed for each entry fee paid in the show. Show Management will make every effort to stall each entry in the NRG Center and NRG Arena. However, space availability is subject to change depending on arrival numbers.
- **36. Stall Cleanliness**: All stalls, pens and exhibition places must be cleaned before 7 a.m. each day and refuse disposed of as directed by the Show Management. For those exhibitors refusing to keep their stalls, pens and/or exhibits clean and neat, the Management reserves the right to have animals removed from grounds or have said stalls or pens properly cleaned with the cost to be charged to the exhibitor. Cleaning costs will be collected from the exhibitor before release is issued.
- **37. Equipment:** Any equipment brought in to be used in the exhibit stall or space must comply with and be used in compliance with all Federal, State, and Municipal Occupational Safety and Health Regulations. The Show will determine what equipment is allowed on Show grounds.
 - a. **Scales:** The Show will provide scales for the use of junior market exhibitors. Exhibitors are allowed to bring portable scales into the building if they are pad type scales with no sides and they are kept in the stall area. Any violation of this rule will cause scales to be confiscated.
 - b. **Fans:** Freestanding fans are not allowed outside the feed aisle between the tie rails. Hanging fans can only be attached to the tie rails.
 - c. Generators: Generators are not allowed.
 - d. **Trim Chutes:** <u>No trim chutes are allowed on grounds for Open Cattle Shows OR Junior Show</u>. Trim chutes are not provided. Trim chutes are considered to be free standing or have any of the following components: head gate, floor or wheels. Show Management reserves the right to determine what constitutes a trim chute.
 - e. **Fitter Guards:** Fitter guards can be used as an alternative to trim chutes and are eligible to be used in the open and junior cattle show. Fitter guards must be set in the stall space allocated for the exhibitor. There is no fee for fitter guards.
- **38.** Hay/Feed: Hay and feed may be purchased through the HLSR Feed Store Committee. Exhibitors who wish to bring their own hay, grain, mixtures or supplements will be permitted to do so. Exhibitors are requested to store no more than two days' supply of feed or hay in the barn at any time. Paid feed bills must be presented at the time releases are requested. Note: Only small squares bales are allowed on grounds. Round bales and large square bales are not allowed.
- 39. Bedding: Livestock will be bedded on material provided by the Show unless otherwise stated in the rules of a particular department. No straw is allowed (exception: dairy cattle & tie outs). Bedding must not be removed from stalls. <u>Junior Market</u> Barrow, Lamb, & Goat exhibitors are NOT allowed to bring in outside shavings. Only straw can be used in tie-outs.
- 40. Livestock Display: Livestock must be in designated stall or pen between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. each day of the Show.
- 41. Dogs: Dogs are not allowed on Show grounds because of safety and public health regulations. This rule will be strictly enforced and applies to all exhibitors and their employees as well as Show visitors. Exceptions are granted for service dogs that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability. The task(s) performed by the dog must be directly related to the person's disability. Exceptions are also granted for dogs under contract with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for demonstration, competition and entertainment purposes, and dogs entered in the Sheepdog Trials.
 - a. The service animal must remain on a leash or otherwise be under the handler's control while on the Show grounds.
 - b. To protect the health and well-being of all animals on Show grounds, the exhibitor may be asked to provide current health records, including vaccination records to the Show's veterinarian.
- 42. Nurse Cows: Nurse cows are not allowed on Show grounds.
- **43.** Companion Animals: Only animals entered in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] are allowed on show grounds. All other animals, excluding entered cow-calf pairs, will be removed per Show Management.
- 44. Good Herdsman Awards: Rules, criteria and prizes for this competition are listed separately in this handbook.
- **45.** Commercial Exhibitor/Retail Vendor Area Access: Livestock exhibitors should not be in commercial exhibit/retail vendor areas when booths are closed. Commercial exhibit/retail vendor booths close at 9 p.m. each night, and livestock exhibitors who are not inside the halls at closing will need to go to the blue doors of Hall B or Hall E lobby to show their Livestock Exhibitor Grounds Pass to be admitted back into the livestock area. Cooperation with exhibit hall security and staff is required. Livestock exhibitors should then walk directly back to the barn at Hall B or Hall E to avoid the commercial exhibit/retail vendor booths to reach other areas of the barn. Livestock Exhibitor Grounds Passes will only allow re-entry at Hall B or Hall E doors. Livestock exhibitors found in commercial exhibits/retail vendor areas when booths are closed are subject to disqualification of entries and forfeiture of all fees paid.

ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo officials are allowed to impose animal health regulations that are more restrictive than those imposed by the TX Animal Health Commission (TAHC). Specific TAHC regulations will supersede the Show requirements if there is a dispute between the two in which the Show rules are less restrictive than TAHC regulations. In accordance with the TAHC, **THESE REGULATIONS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE AT ANY TIME.**

The Show considers itself an interstate (accepting entries of livestock and poultry from within TX and from other states) show for livestock entries. Exhibitors with livestock originating outside the state of TX are encouraged to contact their state Animal Health officials to confirm specific requirements, if any, their state may impose on animals returning from a TX show.

Routine Inspection Procedures (What the Exhibitor Should Expect)

- 1. Representatives of the Show should meet the incoming livestock vehicle at the entry gate to the livestock staging area.
- 2. All documents are to be examined and a visual inspection of the shipment is to be made. Be certain that certificates of veterinary inspection, EIA test information, permits, etc. are still valid. A visual exam of the animals is to be made to ensure that the animals described on the documents are the same as those in the shipment.
- 3. If shipments meet all entry requirements, allow the driver to proceed without delay. Return the certificates and other documents to the owner or driver.
- 4. If a shipment does not meet the requirements, the driver should pull the truck or trailer out of traffic's way. Contact Show security if problems occur. If animals must be unloaded, they must remain in a separate pen (holding area) away from other livestock. Individuals should be allowed to contact the Show Veterinarian or their own veterinarian to obtain the proper documents and/or tests. Documentation must be in writing no corrections will be allowed by phone. Fax documents are permissible.
- 5. Consult the Show Veterinarian if animals do not appear to be in good health when inspections are made.

Definitions

Interstate Event: The TAHC considers shows, fairs, rodeos, events or exhibitions to be interstate if they permit livestock and poultry from other states to enter for show or exhibition and be held or exhibited in common facilities with Texas origin livestock and poultry of the same species.

Intrastate Show: The TAHC considers shows, fairs, rodeos, events or exhibitions to be intrastate if they ONLY allow Texas animals to enter or if they require Texas livestock and poultry of the same species to be housed and exhibited separately from livestock and poultry from out of state.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): CVIs are commonly referred to as "health certificates". This document indicates that an accredited veterinarian inspected, tested or immunized the animals in question as required by the TAHC.

- Cattle, sheep, goats, equine, swine, exotic livestock and ratites coming into the state or entered in an interstate show must be accompanied by a CVI.
- Poultry may enter into the state or into livestock shows with a CVI inspection or with other documents as described on the "Poultry" page.
- The certificate is valid for 30 days for all species being exhibited or exhibited and sold.

Entry Permit: This permit is issued by the TAHC and is needed for certain livestock, poultry, exotic livestock and ratites to enter Texas. The permit is valid for 15 days. The entry permit number must be recorded on the CVI. To obtain an entry permit call the TAHC at 512-719-0777, or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777, or email <u>permits@tahc.texas.gov</u>.

Permits and General Requirements

CATTLE

TX Origin Breeding Beef Cattle (Intrastate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- **3.** Official Identification:
 - a. All dairy breed animals, including steers and spayed heifers, must be officially identified.
 - b. All breeding bulls 12 months of age or older must be officially identified.
 - c. Within 7 days of change of ownership cattle parturient, postparturient, or 18 months of age or older must be <u>officially</u> <u>identified</u>.

4. Testing Requirements:

- a. Trichomoniasis (Trich) Test:
 - i. Exhibition ONLY: Not required by the TAHC.
 - ii. Sale of Exhibition Animals: Unless excepted, non-virgin bulls and virgin bulls 12 months of age or older must be Trich tested within 60 days prior to sale.
 - Exception: Breed registered bulls can be certified as virgin (up to 18 months of age).

- b. Tuberculosis (TB) Test:
 - i. Beef Cattle: Not required by the TAHC.
- c. Brucellosis Test: Not required by the TAHC.

Out-of-State Origin Breeding Beef Cattle (Interstate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): Unless noted, all cattle must have a valid CVI. CVIs are valid for 30 days. Veterinarians should contact 512-719-0777 or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777 for CVI requirements.
 - a. Note: All cattle coming from a vesicular stomatitis virus (VSV) affected state must have a CVI issued within 14 days prior to entry and a VSV status for the premises or area should be recorded on the CVI.
- 2. Entry Permit: Certain classes of cattle are required to obtain entry permits, please refer to the sections below for guidance. Permits for cattle may be obtained at any time by calling 512-719-0777, or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777, or by emailing the TAHC at <u>permits@tahc.texas.gov</u>.
- 3. Official Identification: All cattle of any age used for rodeo, recreational events, shows, or exhibition must be <u>officially identified</u> for interstate movement regardless of age or breed (<u>9 CFR §86.4(D)(iii)</u>).
- 4. Testing Requirements:
 - a. Trichomoniasis (Trich) Test:
 - i. <u>Exhibition ONLY</u>: All breeding bulls 12 months of age or older must be tested within 60 days or be accompanied by an entry permit.
 - ii. <u>Sale of Exhibition Animals:</u> All breeding bulls 12 months of age or older must be Trich tested within 60 days prior to sale.
 - b. Tuberculosis (TB) Test:
 - i. Beef Cattle: Not required by the TAHC.
 - Brucellosis Test: Unless excepted, cattle are not required to be tested for interstate exhibition or events.
 - i. Exception: Cattle from designated surveillance areas in Idaho, Montana, or Wyoming are required to meet testing requirements.
 - ii.

C.

TX Origin Dairy Cattle (Intrastate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Each lactating dairy cow moving intrastate to a fair, show, or exhibition must have a negative PCR (polymerase chain reaction) test result for Influenza A virus from an individual milk sample collected and tested at an approved National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory using a NAHLN approved assay within 7 days prior to movement. These animals may return to their home herd using the same negative test result provided the exhibition or show does not exceed 10 days of length. This testing is available to producers at no cost through USDA APHIS at NAHLN laboratories. Producers may also apply for reimbursement of shipping and veterinary fees for collection of samples.
 - 3. The HPAI Dairy Testing Protocol requires the following: 1) Sample collection must be performed by a USDA category II accredited veterinarian or a person under the direct supervision of USDA category II accredited veterinarian working for the dairy cattle herd. 2) Milk from each quarter of the individual cow must be pooled together to create a total sample between 3-10 ml of milk. 3) Each lactating dairy cow's sample must be kept individualized. Samples shall not be pooled between cows.

Out-of-State Origin Dairy Cattle (Interstate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Prior to interstate movement, lactating dairy cattle are required to receive a negative PCR test for Influenza A virus at an approved NAHLN laboratory using a NAHLN approved assay and in accordance with the Federal Order effective April 29, 2024 https://www.aphis.usda.gov/sites/default/files/federal-orderfag.pdf
 - 3. The HPAI Dairy Testing Protocol requires the following: 1) Sample collection must be performed by a USDA category II accredited veterinarian or a person under the direct supervision of USDA category II accredited veterinarian working for the dairy cattle herd. 2) Milk from each quarter of the individual cow must be pooled together to create a total sample between 3-10 ml of milk. 3) Each lactating dairy cow's sample must be kept individualized. Samples shall not be pooled between cows.

Junior Market Steers

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.

Junior Commercial Steers

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.

Junior Breeding Beef/Scramble Heifers

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.

SHEEP

TX Origin Sheep (Intrastate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: Unless excepted, the following classes of sheep must be <u>officially identified</u> before movement from the farm for intrastate or interstate commerce, exhibition, or to be commingled with animals from other farms.
 - a. All sheep 18 months of age or older,
 - b. All breeding sheep regardless of age,

- c. Sexually intact show or exhibition sheep.
 - i. <u>Exception</u>: Sheep that have a <u>premises identification number</u>, a registration tattoo, and accompanied by registration papers.
- **4.** Testing Requirements:
 - a. Brucella ovis Test: Not required by the TAHC.

Out-of-State Origin Sheep

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days. Veterinarians should contact 512-719-0777 or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777 for CVI requirements
 - a. Note: All sheep coming from a vesicular stomatitis virus (VSV) affected state must have a CVI issued within 14 days prior to entry and a VSV status for the premises or area should be recorded on the CVI.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: All sheep are required to be <u>officially identified</u>.
- **4.** Testing Requirements:
 - a. **Brucella ovis Test:** Unless excepted, breeding rams 6 months of age or over are required to have a negative ELISA test for Brucella ovis within 30 days of the event or from a brucella ovis free flock. The test results or herd number must be written on the CVI.
 - i. <u>Exception</u>: Breeding rams originating in Texas are exempt from the Bucella ovis Test requirement if they are held separate from out-of-state sheep.

GOATS

TX Origin Goats (Intrastate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: Unless excepted, the following classes of goats must be <u>officially identified</u> before they are moved from the farm for intrastate or interstate commerce, exhibition, or to be commingled with animals from other farms.
 - a. All breeding goats that have not commingled with sheep, or
 - b. Sexually intact show or exhibition goats
 - c. Exceptions:
 - i. Wethers or commercial goats that have not had contact with sheep; or
 - ii. Goats that have a registration tattoo and are accompanied by registration papers.
- 4. Testing Requirements: Not required by the TAHC.

Out-of-State Origin Goats (Interstate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days. Veterinarians should contact 512-719-0777 or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777 for CVI requirements.
 - a. <u>Note:</u> All goats coming from a vesicular stomatitis virus (VSV) affected state must have a CVI issued within 14 days prior to entry and a VSV status for the premises or area should be recorded on the CVI.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: Unless excepted, the all goats are required to be officially identified.
 - a. Exception: Registered goats that have a <u>premises identification number</u>, a registration tattoo, and accompanied by registration papers.
- 4. Testing Requirements: Not required by the TAHC.

Junior Market Goats

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection not required.

SWINE

TX Origin Swine (Intrastate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: CVI current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: Unless excepted, swine are not required to be officially identified.
- a. <u>Exception</u>: Breeding swine (sexually intact swine, 6 months of age or older) changing ownership must be <u>officially identified</u>.
 4. Testing Requirements:
 - a. Brucellosis Test: Unless excepted, swine are not required to be tested.
 - b. Pseudorabies Tests: Unless excepted, swine are not required to be tested.
 - c. <u>Exception:</u> All breeding swine must be tested negative for pseudorabies and swine brucellosis 30 days prior to change of ownership in Texas.
- 5. Vaccination Requirements: Not required by the TAHC.

Junior Market Barrows

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.

POULTRY

Junior Market Poultry

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection not required.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: Not required by the TAHC.
- 4. Testing Requirements:
 - a. **Pullorum-Typhoid (PT) Test:** Poultry must originate from flocks or hatcheries free of pullorum disease and fowl typhoid or have a negative PT test within 30 days before exhibition.
 - b. Laryngotracheitis (LT) Test: Poultry must originate from areas where LT has not been active in the past 30 days, and poultry must not have been vaccinated with the modified live chick-embryo origin LT vaccine or the modified live MGattenuated vaccine.
 - c. Avian Influenza (AI) Test: Not required by the TAHC.

EXOTICS

Camelidae: includes camels, llamas and alpacas.

TX Origin Camelidae (Intrastate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): All exotics must have a valid CVI. CVIs issued within 30 days of the last day of the show.
- 2. Entry Permit: Not required by the TAHC.
- 3. Official Identification: Not required by the TAHC.
- 4. Test Requirements: Not required by the TAHC.

Out-of-State Origin Camelidae (Interstate)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): All exotics must have a valid CVI. CVIs are valid for 30 days. Veterinarians should contact 512-719- 0777 or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777 for CVI requirements. CVIs issued within 30 days of the last day of the show.
- 2. Entry Permit: All exotics entering Texas must have an entry permit issued by the TAHC within 15 days of entry. Entry permits for exotics coming may be obtained at any time by calling 512-719-0777, or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777, or by emailing the TAHC at permits@tahc.texas.gov.
- 3. Official Identification: Not required by the TAHC.
- 4. Testing Requirements: As of November 18, 2020, there are no testing requirements for Camelidae. Please contact the TAHC at 512-719-0777 or 1-800-550-8242, ext. 777 to confirm testing requirements.

DOGS

DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED ON THE SHOW GROUNDS because of safety and public health regulations. This rule will be strictly enforced and applies to all exhibitors and their employees as well as Show visitors. Exceptions are granted for dogs that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability, dogs under contract with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for demonstration and entertainment purposes, and dogs entered in the Sheepdog Trials. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current within 30 days is required to accompany all dogs eligible to enter NRG Park. Certificate must state that rabies vaccination is current. **OPEN AND YOUTH CATTLE**

Special Rules for All Open & Youth Cattle Shows

- 1. Entries and awards in this department are subject to the General Rules and Regulations of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and to the Special Rules of respective breeds as published in this book.
- Animals must have permanent identification (brand or tattoo), and their identification must match the original registration papers. Any animal which does not have a legible tattoo corresponding to its registration certificate at check-in is ineligible to show. Once disqualified, animals cannot be re-identified and re-checked at the Show. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection by the Show Superintendent.
- 3. Cattle must be entered for the purpose of exhibiting in a breed classification show.
- 4. Exhibitors who have non-approved cattle in the building will be asked to remove such cattle from the premises and will forfeit all prizes.
- 5. This classification is being established to help the purebred cattle breeders better market their animals; however, it must be noted that "For Sale" signs will not be allowed on exhibit stalls.
- 6. Official photographs of champions of each breed will be made at the end of each sex division. Exhibitors will cooperate with superintendents and photographers.
- 7. All bulls, 12 months of age or older, must be shown with a nose ring lead. Nose rings may be permanent or snap type unless breed association rules state otherwise.

Special Rules for All Open & Youth Cattle Display Space

- 1. Display space will be sold to exhibitors at the time of entry (online or paper form) and will be strictly limited to what is purchased in advance. Space will not be available for purchase once entries close on January 15th.
- There will be a limit to the amount of display space that can be purchased based upon the number of animal entries (group classes are not included in the count). You may purchase less space at a lower level than you are eligible to purchase if you so choose. (Please see table below for display quantities and pricing.)
- 3. The maximum display space that can be purchased is 24 feet. In order to receive 24 feet, forty-one or more animal entries must be entered. Multiple entry orders cannot be combined per owner/exhibitor to gain additional display space.
 - a. For example, if a ranch, exhibitor, owner, or fitter places an entry with 41 animals to purchase 24' of display space, they or another person with animals tied to the same ranch, owner, exhibitor, or fitter cannot place entries to gain more space over and above the maximum display space allowed.
- 4. Exhibitors/owners are prohibited from setting up displays outside of the purchased display space area.
- 5. Signage in the display space area can include backdrops, curtains, tables, seating, video monitors and promotional items.
- 6. Pedigree signs and front stall panels covered with a canvas type material or skirting material are allowed in cattle stalling areas. This material can include the logo/brand of the ranch and/or cattle fitting company as well as web addresses and contact information.
- 7. Signage can hang on stall dividers in this area. This signage may include the logo/brand of the ranch and/or cattle fitting company as well as web addresses and contact information.

Special Rules for All Open & Youth Cattle Display Space

- 8. Any wording used to promote an event or sale will not be allowed in the cattle stalling area but **is allowed in the display space area**.
- 9. Tack must fit within the feed alley, or the stall space assigned to the exhibitor.
 - a. Appropriate items for tack space include feed, hay, tack boxes (show box)/show equipment, and lawn chairs.
 - b. Any items resembling a display will be prohibited from being used in this area. This includes signage such as backdrops and banners.
- 10. Stall, tack and display space are not guaranteed. HLSR reserves the right to limit space as needed. If space is limited, there will be no refund on animal entry fees. HLSR will refund fees paid for the area of display space that cannot be fulfilled. If a reduction in display space is required in order to stall all cattle, preference will be given to exhibitors with the greatest number of entries.
- 11. Only those cattle that are entered in the show will be allowed in the barn. Exhibitors who enter 5 or more head and purchase display space must check-in and show at least 75% of the animals entered in the show. Exhibitors who check-in and show less than 75% of the animals entered in the show will lose the ability to purchase display space the following year. This includes all parties included on the entry order (owners and exhibitors).
- 12. Stall space is not guaranteed based on entries, if the number of entries exceeds the stall space available, arrival rates from the previous year will be used to determine the amount of space each exhibitor will be allocated.

This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the All Open/Youth Cattle Show Special Rules and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

Special Rules for Open Angus Show

- Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate issued by the American Angus Association available for inspection at the show for each animal or another current proof of ownership issued by the American Angus Association pedigree look up. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-identified (tattooed/branded) and rechecked at the show.
- 2. Any female shown with a calf at side: the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show day and have the original registration certificate at check in.
- 3. Only one person at a time shall lead an animal into the show ring.
- 4. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800 810. These rules can be found at: www.angus.org.
- 5. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.
- 6. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated line up areas.
- 7. All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
- 8. Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

Special Rules for Beefmaster Promotion Group Open International Show

- 1. Beefmaster Promotion Group, 514 State Hwy. 75 N, Fairfield, TX 75840.
- 2. Any individual who has an entry in a BPG approved show must be a member of the Beefmaster Promotion Group and must be at least 6 years of age as of the day of the show.
- Beefmaster Promotion Group, 541 State Hwy. 75N, Fairfield, TX 75840 pays some percent of premiums awarded for this show.
 All cattle must be registered with BBU.
- 5. Only one (1) person per animal is permitted in the show arena during the exhibition of individual classes, with exceptions made by one of the following:
 - a. A physical or mental disability that prevents the proper handling of the animal without assistance or,
 - b. A handler has a physical injury (sprained ankle, broken arm, etc.) that requires assistance.

Any request for an assistant shall be presented to an attending BPG Director or Officer before the beginning of the show for a ruling. In the event that an assistant is required and approved, the assistant shall provide the least amount of interference as possible for the handler to properly display the animal and shall not interfere with any other entrant or otherwise block the path or view of the Judge.

- 6. All animal tattoos may be checked for legibility and must match the registration papers for that animal. Animals with illegible tattoos or incorrect papers will not be allowed to show.
- 7. Heifers exhibited at 24 months of age or older must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy or be nursing their natural calf-at side. If calf is over 6 months old, cow must be palpated safe in calf and so stated on health paper.
- 8. All bulls 12 months and older must be led with a nose lead at all times.
- 9. Animals entered in group classes, must have been shown in an individual class.
- 10. All BBU registered animals must be shown with their hair coats lying downward and flat against their entire body. Hair trimming is permissible and must be done in those few areas such as the neck and portions of the topline of the animal which may not lay flat against the body. Hair may not be trained upwards or forwards and/or pulled upwards or forwards on any part of the animal's body. No animals may have any foreign object(s) attached to it in any manner or have its natural color altered in a manner so as to change the conformation or appearance. An exhibitor who fails to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points from the show.
- 11. Each animal must be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, or other appearance change for cosmetic purposes (such as silicon injections or other injections for cosmetic purposes), save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning.

Special Rules for Beefmaster Promotion Group Open International Show

- 12. All bulls 20 months of age or older that are exhibited must have passed a fertility examination given by a licensed veterinarian to be eligible to show and the results must be presented at check in. Once a bull has a positive exam, retesting is not required.
- 13. Determinations regarding classes and the splitting of classes shall be made in the sole discretion of the show official or coordinator and are not subject to review or protest.
- 14. Any and all protests must be written and be filed with a BPG officer or Director no later than 1 hour after the conclusion of the show, accompanied by a \$150 nonrefundable protest fee. Exhibitors must also file a protest with HLSR.
- 15. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in a BPG approved show, each exhibitor hereby releases Beefmaster Promotion Group and their respective officials, sponsors, agents, officers, directors, employees and representatives, from any and all claims, liabilities, suits and judgments, arising from or connected with the administration or use of any animal test, rule enforcement and the resulting decision or action based thereon.

Special Rules for National Braford Show

- 1. All rules, regulations, premium offers, etc., appearing in this catalog are subject to correction in the event of any printing errors that would tend to change the meaning or intent.
- 2. All bulls must be secured with a neck strap in addition to their halter while stalled.
- 3. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal for inspection at the show.
- 4. Animals must be registered by the United Braford Breeders (UBB) to compete in this association-sponsored show. Owners must be members of the UBB in good standing. Cattle must be classified as 3/8 Brahman, 5/8 Herford to be eligible to show in the Braford show. All other registered Braford cattle shown must be F1s (50% Brahman, 50% Hereford only).
- 5. The registration number and animal identification number (brand or tattoo) of each animal entered in an individual class, and the sire of each entry must be listed on the entry.
- 6. Animals eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in individual classes.
- 7. This is one of 7 UBB-sanctioned Open Braford Point Shows that constitute the Braford Show Animals of the Year recognition program.
- Animals found to have evidence of incisions, surgical or otherwise, in the follow areas: testicles, sheath, navel, or dewlap will be disqualified from showing in all UBB shows, or indefinitely. This is subject to review by the UBB Board of Directors.
- 9. No animal may be shown that has had any foreign objects glued to or otherwise attached in a manner so as to alter its conformation or change its appearance. Tail ties and hair nets used on the tail will be the only exception.
- 10. Calves shown at the side of Braford cows must be registered as purebred Brafords. If bred, F1s must be bred to Brahman or Hereford bulls or bulls that will produce purebred Brafords. If F-1 is show with a calf at the side, the calf must be registered with the UBB and must be either a purebred Braford, ³/₄ Brahman and ¹/₄ Hereford, or a 1/4 Brahman and ³/₄ Hereford. Bred F-1 Females shown must have available the registration number of the service sire. Calves shown at the side of any Braford influenced cows must be registered within 2 weeks of age; extenuating circumstances will be considered via show committee decision. All calves must be the biological progeny of the female they are being shown by.
- 11. No nurse cows will be allowed. A nurse cow is defined as a cow that has a calf nursing, in which the cow is not the biological mother of the calf.

Special Rules for National Braford Show

- 12. All protests must be made in writing and be accompanied by a deposit of \$200 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protests must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the UBB show committee within 30 minutes following the conclusion of the show. Exhibitors must also file a protest with HLSR.
- 13. Any person violating these rules shall be subject to be suspended from all UBB-sanctioned shows pending the UBB Board of Directors investigation.
- 14. Any and all members caught in physical violence and/or verbal harassment of other members or show facilities personnel will be subject to expulsion from UBB for life, pending UBB Board of Directors investigation.
- 15. Any and all non-UBB members caught in physical violence or verbal harassment of UBB members or at any UBBsanctioned event will be referred to local law enforcement and possible charges shall/can be filed.
- 16. All Braford entries are subject to the provision of a rule of the United Braford Breeders entitled "Inspection of Exhibits".
 - a. The association and its representative have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification and pedigree of exhibited animals. "Said authority shall extend to and cover the enforcement of all Show rules as adopted by the UBB."
 - b. Each exhibitor shall submit his registered Braford cattle to such tests and examinations as requested and/or required by the association, its authorized representatives, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show. These tests and examinations shall include but are not limited to any weighing, measuring, or ultrasound evaluation of these animals as required by the UBB's Show Committee.
 - c. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any Braford function, exhibitor hereby releases the Association, its officers, directors, and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgements past, present or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decisions therefrom.
 - d. Dental inspection: All entries may be classified for judging on an age basis and should be entered in class according to age. Teeth may be inspected by a veterinarian designated by the UBB in order to determine whether dental development is within allowable limits for the class so entered. If the veterinarian determines that in his opinion dental development exceeds maximum allowable limits, the animal shall be moved to an older class as determined by the veterinarian and shall remain in that class until determined otherwise by subsequent mouthing or favorable appeal to the Show Committee. If it is not possible to move an animal, the animal may not be exhibited in such Show.
 - e. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any such test, exam or show rule enforcement, as applied to his animal, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the association.
 - f. Appeal: An appeal from the decision of the veterinarian or association representatives designated by the UBB under sections 1 and 4 of the Inspections of Exhibits may be made to the Show Committee of the UBB if the following written appeal with the UBB Show Committee as soon as possible after the veterinarian's or designated association representative's decision was made. If an appeal satisfying the foregoing requirements is filed with the UBB Show Committee, the Committee shall hold a hearing at which the appealing party and the veterinarian or designated association representatives whose decision is being appealed shall present statements and other evidence that are relevant to the matter, following which the Show Committee shall render a decision which shall be final and conclusive.
- 17. All members of the UBB (regular or junior) will abide by the show rules as adopted. In addition, any show, fair event or display in which Braford Cattle participate should comply with these rules as adopted by the UBB.
- 18. Entries that have not complied with all the above rules will not be eligible to show, receive premium monies, and are subject to being suspended, pending UBB Board decision.

Special Rules for International Brahman Show *WE ARE WAITING ON ASSOCIATION RULE UPDATES, THE HANDBOOK WILL BE UPDATED SOON. *

- 1. The ABBA requires that everyone who exhibits cattle in an ABBA Show must be a member in good standing as either a Junior, Active or Show Member. Please review the ABBA Constitution and Rules to familiarize yourself with the membership levels along with their requirements.
- Animals must be registered in the American Brahman Breeders Association to be eligible to compete in association sponsored shows. The registration certificate for each entry must be available for presentation to the superintendent or manager of the show at the time entries are verified prior to judging.
- 3. The registration number and animal identification number (number branded on animal) of (1) each animal must be entered in an individual class, (2) the sire of each get-of-sire entry and (3) the dam of each produce-of-dam entry must be listed on the entry card of each animal entered.
- 4. Entries that have not complied with rules one (1) and two (2) will not be eligible to show, receive premium monies or earn points in the association's Register of Renown.
- 5. Animals to be eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in individual classes.
- 6. Entries will be listed numerically according to age (oldest first) in catalogs and judging schedules. <u>Include animal identification</u> <u>number (number brand) as a part of identification.</u> When entering the arena for judging, the handlers will line cattle up numerically in the same order.
- 7. Judges will be allowed to comment on placings in selected classes when conditions permit.
- 8. Each animal will be presented in the showring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical or circulatory constriction including banding or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Injections of foreign substances internally for cosmetic purposes, steroids, growth hormones or stimulants shall be prohibited. If to the satisfaction of the ABBA staff, officers, executive committee or board of directors an animal has had its natural conformation or structure altered or been administered steroids, growth hormones or stimulants; then the said animal shall be ruled ineligible to compete until such time the Show Committee and owner/owners have reviewed the case. Any violators, both owner & fitter will be in-eligible to exhibit cattle at ABBA Approved Shows for 5 years.
- 9. If any exhibitor/owner/showman interferes in any way with the judge or shows disrespect to him, or to the show in the ring, the exhibitor/owner/showman may be dismissed by the judge or Show Management from the ring. The management may withhold from each exhibitor/owner/showman any premium monies that may have been awarded or take other steps deemed desirable.

Special Rules for International Brahman Show

- 10. In cases where families, companies, corporations, etc., are operated as a unit under the same management but have cattle also registered in the name of the individual partners, said cattle, even though bearing a different ownership brand, are eligible to be shown in competition under the firm name provided they have not been and will not be shown in the name of the individuals.
- 11. For females being shown in the four oldest classes (females calved Jan. I Dec. 31, 2020 for Spring Shows), exhibitor must have a certificate of pregnancy no older than 30 days issued by a licensed veterinarian or certified technician to be presented to show officials at time of check-in or registration paper check. The show reserves the right to perform pregnancy determination by palpation for females in the above classes at any given ABBA approved show if an official protest has been filed. Females exhibited in the last class MUST have her nursing natural calf at side. The only exemption from this rule will be cows that have already weaned a calf and a registration certificate of the calf MUST be presented to the judge. The pregnancy certificate will be checked at the ABBA National, International & any other participating show.
- 12. *All bulls will be shown with a nose ring or nose restraint with lead attached. A satisfactory Breeding Soundness Exam (BSE) will be required for bulls 2 years of age and older for National, International, and Kick-Off Classic. Exhibitors will be required to obtain a satisfactory BSE one in the fall and one in the spring to comply.
- 13. All **Group Classes** will be exhibited at the beginning of the ABBA Approved Show prior to any individual classes being exhibited in such show. All individual animals exhibited in Group Classes must be presented by an individual Showman for each participating Animal for the Group to be placed by the Judge(s).
- 14. This deals with the produce of dam classes and the get-of-sire class. All group classes must be held by a handler in the show arena to be placed. At the International, National and any other participating show, the Original Registration Certificate or Original Copy (Blue with COPY across it) of each animal entering the ring for the group classes must be presented to the Show Official for parent verification. In an attempt to accommodate the exhibitors, the registration certificates of animals being exhibited in the group classes will be checked in advance at a specified time. Two animals for Natural Produce, four head for Embryo Produce and six head for the Get of Sire classes can be checked allowing the exhibitor to make the final selections prior to the show. If an exhibitor does not want to check papers early they would then have to bring papers on each animal that will enter the ring, at class check-in.

Embryo Produce of Dam - Two animals from the above classes produced by one dam by embryo transfer either or both sexes may be represented. No ownership requirement.

<u>Natural Produce of Dam</u> - Two natural born animals produced by one dam from the above classes, either or both sexes may be represented. No ownership requirement.

Get-of-Sire - Four animals from at least two dams by one sire from the

- 15. No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one produce or embryo-produce of dam per dam.
- 16. Cows that are exhibited with calves at side must be in a lactating stage. Calves must be the natural calf of the cow being exhibited and must not exceed 240 days of age on day of judging. The judge will be made aware by the ring steward for those cows whose calves are ineligible to show by this rule.
- 17. Cattle will not be allowed to show if their switches have been balled or glitter applied to their skin.
- 18. Color Classification Rule effective with the 2018 ABBA International Show-Houston. For animals exhibited in ABBA approved shows, the following rules will apply:
 - a. The ABBA Color Chart will serve as the official breed resource for identify the proper hair coat of registered Brahman cattle (see charts at ABBA official website).
 - b. In order to show in the Red Show, an animal must have a minimum of 3 Red ancestors in their 3-generation pedigree. An animal with less than 7 out of 14 Red ancestors in the 3-generation pedigree may not show until color is classified.
 - c. Animals will be color classified by the ABBA Color Committee in order to compete at the International, National, Kick-Off Class and All-American Shows. The Show Committee also has the right to color classify at any ABBA Approved Show unannounced.
 - d. The ABBA Color Committee shall consist of 3 primary members and 2 alternates, all with experience in the beef industry and with at least 2 of the members being ABBA Directors who are non-showing members. The Color Committee will be appointed by the ABBA President and will serve for the full show year.
 - e. Animals will be color classified by their predominant hair color based on the ABBA Color Chart.
 - f. Only if an animal is unable to be classified based upon the ABBA Color Chart, the animal's pedigree may be used to aid in color classification.
 - g. Once classified, the animal's paper will be stamped with the color classification and remain in that classification throughout its show career. Appeals can be sent to the Executive Committee within 30 days.
 - h. If any animal is reclassified by the Color Committee, the ABBA must provide corrected papers to the current owner of that animal within 30 days of the reclassification at the owner's expense.
 - i. Animals shown in group classes must show in the group class of the registered color of their sir for the Get-of-Sire and the registered color of their dam for the Produce-of-Dam (ET & Natural).

Special Rules for International Brahman Show

- j. Both the exhibitor and owner of an animal that is shown in the wrong color division after being color classified will be ineligible to show any animals for 13 months following the infraction. The animal in violation will be disqualified for its entire show career and will forfeit all Register of Renown points.
- k. Any ABBA member or exhibitor has the right to protest the color classification of any animal at any ABBA Approved Show to the Show Committee in writing within 30 days. Any animals already stamped with color classification will not be reclassified.
- 19. The owner of record of any registered animal entered in an ABBA approved shows and/or his/her agent, exhibitor, fitter, handler and/or representative releases ABBA and its representatives from any and all liability that seller/owner might claim as a result of injury of any kind sustained before, during, or after handling cattle for any ABBA board approved activity.
- 20. Beginning January 21, 2019 for shows to remain approved point shows by ABBA they must maintain a forty (40) head average for the previous two (2) years. Shows must also follow the Requirements of ABBA Approved Shows.
- 21. All bulls two (2) years of age and older will be required to obtain a Satisfactory Breeding Soundness Exam once in the fall and once in the spring to show at the National, International, and Kick-Off Classic.
- 22. The official ABBA rules & procedures governing showing & exhibiting of registered Brahman cattle supersede any rules printed in any show catalog.
- 23. In an attempt to ensure that all animals receive an equal evaluation at the National and International Shows, classes with more than 30 entries may at the discretion of the Show Management and/ or ABBA Officials be split by age as evenly as possible.
- 24. Any animal that exceeds the weight & measurement requirements at the International Brahman Show, National Brahman Show, All American National Junior Show or any other designated show where weights & measurements are taken will be in-eligible to show at that show and any future ABBA Approved Shows until the next show that weights & measures are taken when they can requalify. Any animal that exceeds the parameters and is shown at an ABBA Approved Show before requalifying will be in-eligible to show their remaining career. Both the exhibitor and owner of the previously disqualified animal that is shown before requalifying will be in-eligible to show animals forever.

This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the All Open/Youth Cattle Show Special Rules and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

Special Rules for the International Brangus, Red Brangus, & Ultra Shows

Eligibility

- 1. The owner(s) of record on all animals entered in an IBBA National or Regional point show must be active member(s) of the IBBA in good standing.
- Animals must be registered Brangus, Red Brangus, Ultrablack, or Ultrared with the International Brangus Breeders Association (IBBA) to be eligible to compete in an IBBA-sponsored show. Animals recorded in the IBBA Appendix registry are ineligible to show.
- 3. UltraBlacks and UltraReds must show separately from Brangus and Red Brangus, with the exception of calves shown at the side of their dams in both the Female and Cow Calf show. The registration prefix of the dam determines the classification of the pair.
- 4. All calves exhibited at the side of the female must be registered with the IBBA and meet all rules required for show eligibility and inspections of exhibits (refer to Rule 9.a.). The registration prefix of the dam determines the classification of the pair.
- 5. Animals eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in respective individual classes. Cows exhibited in the cow/calf classes are not eligible for the group classes.

Animal Identification

- 6. The registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the Superintendent or show manager at the time entries are verified prior to judging. Digital images and herd book data sheets will not be accepted.
- 7. Once an animal's identification has been verified by visual inspection of a brand or ear tattoo, it's registration papers will be stamped with seal of the IBBA with the date of the inspection. In future shows, this registration certificate with the seal will need to be presented at check in for identification purposes only. If this registration certificate is presented with the seal of the IBBA, the additional inspection of a brand or ear tattoo is not required. If a new or unstamped certificate is presented, the animal's identification must be verified again before a stamped is received again. Any animal is subject to recheck by the IBBA Ethics Committee at any show at any time.
- 8. Any animal upon check in which does not have a legible tattoo or brand corresponding to its registration certificate is ineligible to show. An animal may be tattooed immediately at a show for reinspection.

Parent Verification

- 9. All animals are required to have completed parent, both sire and dam, verification on file at IBBA prior to the show check-in. If an animal does not have DNA parent verification completed at that time, they will be ineligible to show. DNA parent verification is defined as having submitted DNA samples per the IBBA DNA testing process of the animals being entered, their sire and their dam, and then having the show animal's genotype match to that of both parents as determined by the IBBA.
 - a. If the calf at side is over 90 days of age by the date of show check-in, it must have parent verification completed by show check-in. If it is under 90 days, parent verification of the calf is not required.
 - b. Cows in the cow/calf pair classes are exempt from the parent verification requirement if they are born prior to September 1, 2016.
- 10. IBBA reserves the right to collect DNA samples at any IBBA-sanctioned show. Collection will be conducted by random draw for retesting of parentage at the association's expense. At the six national IBBA-sanctioned shows, three random samples will be collected from Brangus and UltraBlack entries and three random samples will be collected from Red Brangus and UltraRed entries. An animal found to not match the stated pedigree must resolve the question before it is allowed to show again.

Physical Inspection

- 11. Prior to check-in, heads of exhibited animals must be clipped of all hair, including topknots and be free of scurs and/or slick spots. Animals not in compliance at check in will be required to comply before check in is complete, or they will not be allowed to show.
- 12. Any animal found to have scurs and/or slick spots; or evidence of incisions, surgical or otherwise, in the following areas: head, testicles, sheath, navel, or dewlap; including scars from caesarean sections, will be disqualified from showing. They shall be disqualified at the show where the violation is determined and all future IBBA sponsored and sanctioned shows. A veterinary statement of purpose or cause will not be accepted.
- 13. Animals with illegal white (defined as white in front of the naval) or any indication of brindling (a color pattern characterized by red streaks mingled with black), or red animals with any unacceptable coloring (according to the IBBA Red High Color Scale available at gobrangus.com and including Brown, Grey, Yellow, Light to White, White Legs or Black Muzzle) are ineligible for show at the show in which the color issue is found. The animal is eligible for inspection at future shows.
- 14. No animal may be shown that has been pumped with any amount of liquid at any time once the animal enters the grounds of a show. The official show veterinarian may administer liquids orally, if so needed, without disqualifying animal(s) from exhibition.
 - a. A protest of this violation must be submitted per the Violation Policy
 - b. Penalty: The fitter and ranch entity involved with an animal being artificially filled will be banned from the show ring for one year and the animal will be disqualified from exhibition at that particular show.
- 15. All entries may be classified for judging on an age basis and should be entered in class according to age. All cattle 18 months (550 days) of age and younger are subject to dental inspection by random check or official protest. Protests can be made at any IBBA show or facilitated by a ranch visit by IBBA Field service representatives. Upon inspection by the ethics committee or IBBA field service representative, photographs of teeth will be taken along with the animal private herd number (tattoo or brand). The photographs will be submitted to a panel of 3 qualified independent specialists that are USDA certified and an accredited veterinarian for final decision. Animals will not be deemed ineligible until the official decisions from the 3 qualified independent specialists is returned to the IBBA. Cattle 18 months (550 days) of age and younger that are inspected and found to have the eruption of ADULT incisors will be subject to disqualification from any IBBA sponsored show. Points accumulated for the present show year by the falsely aged animal will be removed from the SHOW ANIMAL STANDINGS LIST, and that animal will be in eligible for awards.

Fitting and Presentation

- 16. Animals unethically fitted to alter the conformation or appearance of the animal, as determined by the appointed IBBA Ethics Committee or IBBA Staff, will be immediately disqualified at the show in which the violation occurred. This includes:
 - a. No animal may be shown that has had any foreign objects, glued to or otherwise attached in a manner so as to alter its conformation or change its appearance.
 - b. Paint or coloring agents of any kind are not to be used on any animal exhibited at IBBA sponsored shows.
- 17. All bulls must have a nose ring or nose restraint with the lead attached at all times, with the exception of being tied in the stalls and tie outs. This includes but is not limited to being in the show ring and during check in. The nose lead/nose restraint must be an additional lead and not part of the halter. For example, running the lead of the halter through the nose ring as the restraint is **not** within the guidelines. Bulls 250 days and younger are exempt from this requirement.
- 18. Unruly animals that cannot be kept under control will be disqualified at the said show. If an animal breaks away from its handlers three times, they will be dismissed from the show ring and not eligible to show at that particular show.

Fertility and Performance Requirements

- 19. Weights and scrotal measurements will be taken on all bulls at check-in at all six of the IBBA National Shows.
- 20. All Brangus bulls 18 months of age or older that are exhibited at IBBA sponsored shows must have passed a fertility examination given by a non-owner licensed veterinarian or a non-owner certified technician to the standards of the Society of Theriology to be eligible to show. The results of the examination must be available at check-in. Once a bull has a positive examination, retesting is not required.
- 21. All females 20 months of age or older exhibited at IBBA sanctioned shows, must have available at the time of check-in, a certificate of pregnancy issued by an accredited non-owner veterinarian, non-owner certified professional or blood test results certificate. If a blood tests results certificate is provided, it must be blood collected by a non-owner veterinarian or non-owner certified professional and documented. Females showing in the Senior Heifer Division of Spring Shows (January 1 through May 31) must adhere to the classifications and have an IBBA registered natural calf, not older than 250 days of age on show date.

Show Rules Violation Policy and Penalties

- 22. The IBBA and its representative have the authority to request and require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification, pedigree of exhibited animals and enforce all show rules as adopted by the IBBA. IBBA representatives shall include the appointed Ethics Committee at each show. A decision by the Ethics Committee and/or the IBBA representative shall stand at the show in which it is made.
- 23. Owners are responsible for any infraction committed by a non-member or anyone employed or contracted by the owner.
- 24. A valid show rules violation complaint must be accompanied by a written statement describing the violation, the perpetrator of the violation, and signed by an active member of the IBBA. This written complaint will be presented to an Ethics Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Show Committee and the three person Ethics Committee that has been previously appointed for the show where the complaint is presented. All four people will be current members of the Show Committee.
- 25. The Ethics Committee shall rule on the validity of the rule violation. The Ethics Committee shall visit with the perpetrator, present the written complaint, and make a ruling on the complaint if valid. The penalty will be applied according to each stated rule above.
- 26. The perpetrator is entitled to appeal any decision made by an IBBA representative, Ethics Committee, a veterinarian, certified industry professional or designated association representatives to the IBBA Board of Directors. The following requirements must be met: 1) the appeal is in writing and is signed by the appealing party; and 2) the appealing party files the written appeal with the IBBA Board of Directors as soon as possible after the decision is rendered however, the ruling will stand at the show in which the violation occurred. If the IBBA Board of Directors over turns the ruling of the Show Committee Ethics Committee, the exhibitor and or animal in question will be allowed to return to future shows. The IBBA Board of Directors has the right to disqualify the perpetrator from the IBBA approved show after hearing an appeal. The IBBA's Board of Directors decision is final.
- 27. Entries that have not complied with all of the above rules will not be eligible to show, to receive premium monies, or earn points in the IBBA's Show Sire of the Year, Show Dam of the Year, Show Bull of the Year, Show Heifer of the Year and Show Cow Calf Pair awards.
- 28. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any function each exhibitor hereby releases the Association, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits, and judgments past, present, or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision there from.

Presentation of Classes for International Brangus & Red Brangus Shows

An IBBA National Point show shall be conducted in the order described below. Regional and non-Point Show may choose to conduct a show in a difference manner.

IBBA National Point Show class order:

- I. The Brangus Show will begin with the Black Female classes. Junior Heifer Calf classes will be judged through Junior Heifer Calf Champion and Reserve Junior Heifer Calf Champion.
- II. Then, the Red Female classes will enter the ring and will be judged through Junior Heifer Calf Champion and Reserve Junior Heifer Calf Champion.
- III. This procedure will be alternated between Black and Red Shows until all age champions have been selected.

- IV. - VII. Champion Cow/Calf. Then, the Red Cow/Calf classes will be judged through Champion and Reserve Champion Red Cow/Calf.
- VIII. The above procedure will be followed in the bull judging, beginning with the Black classes and alternating between Red and Black Shows. If a division does not have any cattle entered, the division will be skipped.
- IX. Group classes will be judged with Black Group Classes all being exhibited first, followed by all Red Group Classes.

This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the All Open/Youth Cattle Show Special Rules and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

Special Rules for Open Braunvieh Show

1. The rules of the Braunvieh Association of America (BAA) and Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will govern the show.

2. Animals competing in the Braunvieh Show must be registered in the Braunvieh Association of America (BAA) Herd Book. A copy of the registration may be used for Braunvieh check-in. Each animal must bear a legible tattoo matching its registration paper.

3. Exhibitors must be in good standing with the Braunvieh Association of America.

4. All animals exhibited must have a DNA sample on file with the Braunvieh Association of America. A hair, tissue or blood sample on the subject animal must be received by the BAA or BAA representative prior to the show.

5. All animals exhibited must have a known Braunvieh dam or sire and are subject to being DNA verified to Braunvieh parent(s).

6. Animals must be Fullblood or Purebred to qualify for the FB/PB Braunvieh Show. Braunvieh Beef Builders will be shown in a separate Beef Builder Show. Cattle recorded as "Braunvieh Influence" (a "BI" prefix) are not eligible.

7. The BAA reserves the right to provide the judge and audience with the Expected Progeny Difference (EPDs) values, ultrasound data (collected by a certified technician), scrotal circumference for bulls, weights and ratios for performance and weights with weight per day of age. These performance figures (including weights, hip heights and frame scores) can be presented in their entirety or any combination deemed necessary by the BAA.

8. Heifers born Sept. 1, 2022 and after will show in the heifer show but can show with natural calves at side and still be eligible to show for champion heifer.

9. Heifers exhibited at 20 months of age or older (not females in the cow/calf class) must be pregnant and accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy by a licensed veterinarian or show with her natural calf at side. For heifers used in embryo transfer, a certificate of positive fertility issued by a licensed veterinarian must be available for inspection.

10. Females born on or prior to Aug. 31, 2022 must show in the cow/calf class with a natural born calf at side. The pair will not be eligible for champion heifer. The registration of the cow (FB/PB or Beef Builder) will determine the division the pair shows in. Calves exhibited in the cow/calf class can be no more than 230 days of age by date of show. Calves from the cow/calf class can be entered as individuals in the show (additional entry fee).

11. Only bulls born on or after January 1, 2022 are eligible to show. Bulls exhibited at 14 months of age or older must have a positive semen test and a certificate to that effect. The certificate must be available for inspection. Bulls 12 months and older must be shown with a nose lead.

12. Altering animals' natural color will not be allowed. Violation will be cause for disqualification.

Special Rules for Open Braunvieh Show

13. No cosmetic surgeries other than surgical dehorning will be allowed. Violation will be cause for disqualification.

14. Only generally accepted fitting practices will be allowed. Violation will be cause for disqualification.

15. Protests can be made to the Show committee with a \$150.00 protest fee, within 24 hours of the show or prior to release, whichever is first, in writing to BAA staff or show committee members. Show committee will make rulings on a case-by-case basis. Animals disqualified will forfeit entry fees, awards and show points. If ruling in favor of protest, fee will be refunded. If ruling against, the fee will be forfeited.

16. Appeals can be made to the Show committee with a \$150.00 appeal fee. Appeals will be forwarded with all information to the ethics committee and Executive Vice President. If appeal is granted, fee will be returned with reinstatement of show points and any other forfeited entry fees and awards. If appeal is denied, fee will be forfeited.

17. Decision of the ethics committee and Executive Vice President will be final.

- All animals to be eligible for an Open Charolais Breeding Class must be purebred and registered with the American International Charolais Association (AICA). Only bona fide (original) certificates of registration will be accepted as evidence of registration and ownership. <u>NO PHOTOCOPIES.</u> If an animal is registered in its country of origin outside the United States and is eligible for purebred registry in the AICA Herdbook, the animal is eligible to enter.
- 3. Animals registered in the AICA Colored Division Registry (QF AND QM initialed registration numbers) must meet the qualifications of the AICA Rules and Regulations.
- 4. Animals may be approved by a sifting committee designated by the AICA. Stall space will not be provided for any Charolais cattle that have not been accepted by the sifting committee.
- 5. Animals are subject to a medical examination in order to determine age, and each animal will be present in the show ring in its natural conformation without alteration or modification. Use of artificial tailheads is not permitted.
- 6. Bulls from classes 44, 45, 48, 49 and 50 must have valid, satisfactory semen test certificates in possession. This certificate is valid for the entire show season.
- 7. Animals shown in individual classes must be weaned, with the exception of the cow/calf class and calves at the side of females calved after Sept. 1, 2022. In the cow/calf class, the calf must be purebred and registered with the AICA. Females calved after Sept. 1, 2022, must show in an individual female class appropriate to age. Nurse cows are not permitted.
- 8. All females 20 months and older exhibited at AICA-sanctioned shows must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy from a licensed veterinarian or have produced fertile eggs as certified in a written statement by a licensed veterinarian or embryologist or have a calf at side.
- 9. AICA requires that all animals be shown with a halter and suggests that all bulls be shown with a nose lead.
- 10. All exhibits of Charolais breeding cattle shall be governed by the AICA rules & regulations, Article XV, titled "Exhibition of Animals." The inspection of exhibit cattle is specified in Article XV, Paragraph C, of The Association Rules and Regulations and Non-Compliance of Exhibit Inspection is specified in Paragraph D of the same Article XV. Article XV, Paragraph C, Point 2: "Each animal will be presented in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical or other (including banding or other circulatory constriction) appearance change for cosmetic purpose, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Silicone injection or other injection for cosmetic purpose shall be prohibited. Anabolic steroid use shall likewise be prohibited and any animal testing positive for anabolic steroid or diuretic use shall be presumed to be altered and modified."
- 11. The use of coloring agent, flock, and powder is prohibited. Use of these products will result in the immediate disqualification of a given animal in the show.

Special Rules for International Santa Gertrudis Show

- All exhibits of Santa Gertrudis breeding cattle must be registered meeting the requirements for registration as outlined in the Santa Gertrudis Rules and Regulations for Registration, and shall be governed by the last revised version of the Rules and Regulations for Approved Santa Gertrudis Open & Junior Shows as approved by the board of Santa Gertrudis Breeders International, P.O. Box 1257, Kingsville, TX, 78364. A copy may be obtained by contacting the association or viewed at www.santagertrudis.com.
- 2. Each owner must be a member in good standing with SGBI. No outstanding balances on an active or junior members account.
- 3. ALL animals accepted for exhibition in an SGBI sanctioned show are subject to inspection at each show between arrival on grounds and prior to entering the show ring. The inspection will be conducted by a committee comprised of two (2) members of the Show and Exhibits Committee and one (1) from the Breed Standards Committee.
- 4. Heifers 24 months of age or older to be eligible must have produced a calf or be safe in calf as verified by a graduate veterinarian or have produced a live, Santa Gertrudis sired calf with the calf at side meeting the Standard of Excellence and the calf must be registered by thirty (30) days of age. If animal is open due to being in an embryo transfer program this fact must be verified by a written statement signed by a licensed embryo technician in order to show.
- 5. All late summer yearling bulls and older must be exhibited with a nose ring or nose clip.
- 6. All animals must be registered or recorded and PERMANENTLY identified before the show with a brand ID or an ear tattoo.
- 7. JUNIOR OWNERS AND POSSESSION RULE
 - a. To be eligible to compete in SGBI approved junior shows, animal(s) must be registered or recorded in the name of the junior member. This registered or recorded junior must feed, fit, care for and show the animal entered. Ownership deadline is April 1st for all animals born January 1st of the preceding year and thereafter, and November 1st for all other animals.
 - b. Junior participating in Open Shows are allowed and encouraged. Entry must be shown by owner or family member (sister, brother, mother, grandparent, legal guardian, relative by blood). No animal may be fitted or shown by any open exhibitor at any time during the junior's ownership period. An exception is transportation, feed, and care to a show for the duration of the show. In the event of an emergency another junior member may show the animal with the approval of the Shows and Exhibits Chairman or his/her representative.
- 8. FITTING
 - a. Purebred fitting All purebred animals must be exhibited with the hair brushed down on their entire body, legs, and tail with no foreign objects attached to the animal in a manner as to alter the animal's conformation or change its appearance. Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will not be allowed to show. Specially, all hair must be brushed down slick; head clipped smooth; underline clipped blending sides; udder and teats clipped with no long hair to emphasize udder; ears clipped as to environmental and local standards; neck and brisket clipped; body clip using common sense as to season; leg hair clipped and do not leave long from hock or knee to hoof; tailhead clipped; pull switch or brush out (no ball, etc.) trim tail to personal preference.
- 9. Each animal exhibited must be exhibited with the correct age and shown in the class corresponding with their correct age.

Special Rules for International Santa Gertrudis Show

- 10. Entries in each class will be placed 1, 2, 3, etc. Animals are to be presented in descending order according to age.
- 11. Polled classes will be entered at the same time as class entries are required by each show. Animals will be lined up according to age for the judge. To be eligible to show in Best of Polled, animals to be slick polled with no scurs, no scars, no dehorning and with no evidence of horny tissue.
- 12. Classes with over thirty (30) entries should be divided into sections and section winners return for final placing.
- 13. The judge SHOULD be an SGBI approved judge.
- 14. Dress for exhibitors participating in SGBI sanctioned Open and Junior shows shall be of clean and neat clothing of collared shirts with sleeves, belts, no midriffs showing and appropriate footwear no tennis shoes. Hats or go bareheaded no caps.
- 15. Each animal shall be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure **without** alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, pharmaceutical or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Additionally, no pumping or filling of an animal with a liquid, diuretic or any other substance is allowed. **ALL** animals and exhibitors found to be in violation of this rule will be banned for life from showing at SGBI approved shows.
- 16. If entries are not properly fitted and good herdsmanship followed the owner may be asked to not display their cattle until adhering to the proper procedures as outlined in our herdsmanship paper.
- 17. Every exhibitor, in consideration of his/her entry being accepted, agrees to submit any animal so entered by him/her to inspection and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the Show sand Exhibits Committee, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show or fair, and agrees that the conclusion reached by the committee/representative as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age, shall be final, without recourse, against SGBI and designated personnel. Any false representation, interference or unprofessional conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with by the Show and Exhibits committee according to the equities of the case.
- 18. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any SGBI approved show each exhibitor hereby releases SGBI, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgment past, present or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision therefrom.
- 19. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any test, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his/her animals, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the association. This refers to, but not limited to, the procedures to file protest and appeals process.
- 20. APPEALS:
 - a. The Chairman of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and the Vice-President of Youth Activities in conjunction with the person(s) responsible for coordinating the individual shows will continue to be primarily vested with authority to determine whether animals entered in shows meet the standards formally approved by the Breed Standards Committee.
 - b. In the event the Vice-President of Youth Activities or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a youth show and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.
 - c. In the event the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a sanctioned show, and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.
 - d. Additionally, **any** exhibitor participating in an individual youth show or other SGBI sanctioned show that wants to appeal a breed standards disqualification decision by either the Vice-President of Youth Activities/youth show coordinating official or the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/show coordinating official must follow the appeals process outlined below.
- 21. APPEALS COMMITTEE: The appeals committee will be comprised by the following three (3) members the Vice President of Breed Improvement, the Vice President of marketing and Promotions and the Executive Director of SGBI. All three (3) members must be present to constitute a quorum. All decisions rendered by the Appeals Committee will be binding and final for all appeals submitted to the committee.

22. APPEALS PROCEDURE:

- a. All qualification/disqualification appeals and appropriate supporting documentation submitted by exhibitors must be submitted in writing to the Executive Director of SGBI. The written appeal must be accompanied by a \$200 process fee. No waivers will be granted to the requirements for written appeals and the up-front \$200 fee.
- b. Exhibitors must file written appeals postmarked or via e-mail within five (5) business days following the date of the show governing the qualification/disqualification decision by the primary officials (Vice President of Youth Activities/show coordinating official or Chairman of Show and Exhibitors/event coordinating official).
- c. The Executive Director will be responsible for coordinating meeting s of the Appeals Committee and forwarding copies of the appeal and supporting documentation to the other committee members.
- d. The Appeals Committee will render a final decision within five (5) business days following the receipt of the written appeal, appropriate supporting documentation and the \$200 fee.

Special Rules for International Santa Gertrudis Show

- e. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee approves the exhibitor's appeals, the animal covered by the appeal will be qualified to participate in all future SGBI sanctioned events.
- f. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee disapproves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be disqualified from participating in future SGBI sanction events. Additionally, any points or awards previously given to the owner of the animal will be forfeited.
- g. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee rules that the animal covered by the appeal does not meet breed standards, the covered animal will be disqualified from participating in future shows and the owner of the animal will forfeit any points and awards previously granted

23. PROCEDURES TO FILE PROTEST:

- a. File protest with show that infraction occurred. Following their protest rules.
- b. File the same protest with the Shows and Exhibits Committee. Contact the chairman. Exhibitors must also file a protest with HLSR.
- c. Three (3) SBJI members, in good standing, must sign the protest.
- d. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of 100.00, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Show and Exhibits Committee within twenty-four (24) hours after the occasion for such protest.
- e. Order of hearing a protest:
 - i. Chairman of Shows and Exhibits Committee
 - ii. Action by Shows and Exhibits Committee
 - iii. Final action by Board of Directors.
 - iv. Follow appeal procedure as outlined in Rules and Regulations.
- f. All rules and regulations that have been properly protested to the Shows and Exhibits Committee shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - i. Loss of premium money
 - ii. Loss of awards
 - iii. Suspension from showing the subject animal as deemed necessary. Penalty may be for one (1) show, two (2) shows or three (3) shows, or as long as deemed necessary for the offense.
 - iv. Suspension of the exhibitor being the same as other SGBI Rules and penalties.
- 24. Failure to adhere to each show's specific rules shall also be subject to these penalties. Proper protest procedures must be adhered to according to that particular show's rules. SGBI will follow each show's rules, and any action taken by a show will be upheld by SGBI in relation to its bearing on our point show system.
- 25. DISQUALIFICATIONS:
 - a. An exhibitor who has been disqualified from competition in any livestock show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of rule violation(s) will not be allowed to compete in other shows. This shall include, but not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting or deception.
 - b. Judging procedures will **NOT** be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal regarding a judge's decision or method of selection will be considered.
 - c. Show officials may excuse an exhibitor from the ring and exclude them from further competition if an exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative interferes or shows disrespect to a judge or show official.
 - d. In the event that an exhibitor or animal is disqualified after they have been awarded premiums or awards, the exhibitor or animal placing immediately below them may be moved up to fill the vacated position at the discretion of the Shows and Exhibits Committee.
- 26. RULES FOR HIGH POINT AWARDS:
 - For each point show, first place class winner will receive two (2) points; second place class winner receives one (1) point; Division Champion receives three (3) points; Reserve Division Champion receives two (2) points; Grand Champion receives five (5) points and Reserve Grand Champion received four (4) points; Best of Polled receives one (1) point but does not count toward overall points.
 - b. Get of Sire and Produce of Dam points go toward Exhibitor/Breeder of the Year Awards.
 - c. Points will stay with animal if sold.
 - d. The Sir and Dame of the Year should have points from at least two (2) different offspring.
 - e. All points earned at the National Open Show are to be doubled.

Special Rules for International Santa Gertrudis Show

27. **DNA TESTING**: SBGI and its representatives have the authority to require such test as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification, pedigree of exhibited animal, and parentage verification of Star 5, including calves exhibited at the side of any female. "Said authority shall extend to and cover the enforcement of all show rules as adopted by SGBI.

Consignor must be actively engaged in the breeding of the particular breed consigned and must have bred and raised all bulls, except bulls bred by another breeder purchased on or in dam or embryo or herd buyout, etc. If consignor is not the recognized breeder of the bull, an explanation in writing must be attached to the nomination form. Bulls originating from outside of the state of TX can be consigned only by invitation of the Show. Bulls must be registered in the herd books of their respective breed associations; signed (transfer) original registration papers must be in the hands of the sale manager prior to selling in the sale. (Sale manager WILL NOT accept application for registration in lieu of registration paper). THIS IS NOT A TRADING SALE. Registration certificates are expected to be in the name of CONSIGNOR (or a family member that is a member of the recording association). Transfer fees will be deducted from seller's accounts of sale and are expected to be at member rates. Sale Manager will send all transfer information to respective breed associations.
- 2a. Entry Requirements: A limited number of bulls from breed association programs that combine breeds and issue certificates on the bulls will be accepted for the sale. Bulls must conform to all other rules.
- 3. Allowable Number of Bulls: Each consignor may enter not more than three bulls of any one breed in this division. The Show shall determine total number of bulls to be sold and the number of bulls of each breed that will be sold to ensure a sale offering demanded by today's progressive cattle people.
- **4. Fees:** Nomination fee of \$150 per head must accompany nomination form. All nominations received by November 15th will be given priority status; and entry received after November 15th will be considered in order of receipt. Selling fee (commission) will be ten percent of the gross sale price of each bull with a minimum commission of \$150. \$90 of the nomination fee shall apply to the commission. Nomination fees are non-refundable after acceptance of said nomination.
- 5. Nomination Form: A nomination is not valid unless nomination form is completely filled out and received in the Sale Manager's office with correct amount of nomination fees. A valid entry must include a copy of the registration paper(s) and breed EPDs and/or within herd performance data per Rule 7.
- 6. Age: Bulls must be born between Aug. 15, 2022 and October 31, 2023 (there will be no spring or summer 3 year olds). Bulls must be sound and in good service condition to perform satisfactorily under average range conditions. Bulls should be strong boned, adequately muscled, well grown-out individuals with good heads, sound feet and legs, plenty of size for age and of an acceptable disposition to the average cowman.
- 7. EPDs: Bulls are required to have breed EPDs if breed has such a program. If the breed does not have a performance program, bull must originate from herd with meaningful within herd performance data to at least include weaning and yearling information and ratios. High performance bulls will be preferred over bulls with low performance as expressed through non-parent EPDs. EPDs will be as important as the phenotypic criteria expressed in Rule 6 above. Preference will be given to bulls with low or moderate birth weight EPDs and/or actual birth weights and to virgin bulls.

Special Rules for All Breeds Registered Range Bull Sale

- 8. Pre-Sale Screening: Nominated bulls are subject to approval of the Show. Final determinations and approval will be made within context of Rule 3. Nomination fees for bulls not accepted by the Show will be returned to consignor. Animals withdrawn from sale after acceptance by the Show WILL NOT have nomination fee returned. Upon notification of acceptance, signed original registration papers not previously sent to sale manager **MUST** be forwarded at this time.
- 9. Catalog: Bulls accepted for sale by the Show will be catalogued according to breed and breeder.
- 10. Grading: After arrival on Show grounds, all bulls will be subject to sifting and grading. A panel of experienced cattle producers will inspect each bull prior to grading and eliminate from grading and selling any bull that shows any defect, disease, infection, unsoundness or limitation that could potentially detract from the animal's usefulness or that could later become a point of contention. After sifting, each bull will be graded by a panel of 5 experienced cattle producers. Bulls, regardless of breed, will be subjected to the same grading standards to be determined by the Show. Sale order of bulls will be established by the rank of the animal's average grade, regardless of breed. Grading of all bulls will begin on Tuesday, March 4, 2025.
- 11. TAHC/Breeding Soundness Evaluation: Each consignor shall comply with applicable rules and regulations of TX Animal Health Commission as well as Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, which can be found on page 40. Each bull must have an individual official TAHC health certificate showing compliance with Brucellosis and Trichomoniasis regulations and/or any other regulations in place at sale time. A separate "breeding soundness evaluation" statement supplied by a veterinarian must be completed for each bull. Each bull must score above the minimum score to be accepted for the sale. This "breeding soundness evaluation" must be performed within 30 days of sale date and must accompany the TAHC health certificate.
- Pens/Feed: Pens are assigned by the Show. Pens are bedded with sand and sawdust on concrete. Water troughs are supplied by the Show; however, it is consignor's responsibility to provide his own feed trough. <u>All hay fed to bulls MUST be fed in a hay</u> <u>net, NO EXCEPTIONS</u>. Feed and hay may be purchased at the Houston Livestock and Rodeo Feed Store.
- **13.** Sales: Bulls not rejected by the shifting committee after arrival must sell through the auction sale. Private treaty sales are not allowed. Consignor may pass out animal(s) if the highest bid is unacceptable; however, a pass out charge of 10 percent of the highest bid will be assessed.
- **14. Guarantees:** Guarantees of any nature shall be between buyer and seller and shall not in any way bind the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, its officers, directors or the sale manager. The purchaser must notify the seller of his/her dissatisfaction with an animal in writing within six months of the sale date.
- **15. General:** The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo along with the Sale Manager are not responsible for loss or damage to any animal.

Special Rules for All Breeds Commercial Female Sale

- 1. Sale Manager: The Show will employ a Sale Manager to coordinate with the All Breeds Committee to conduct a sale by auction and to properly account for all aspects of the sale.
- 2. Entry Requirements: Entry in this division is open to individuals, firms, or partnerships. Entries can be registered, full bloods or crossbreds, so long as they are in keeping with quality standards of the Show. Preference will be given to breeds and crosses that are demanded and recognized for their maternal contributions to the mainstream commercial cowherds of the Gulf Coast area. Preference will be given to F-1 Brahman cross females. A limited number of open heifers will be accepted only from those who have consigned them the year before and then others. Preference will be given to females bred, raised, and consigned by one entity. Other females must have been owned by consignor by Oct. 1, 2024. Females originating from outside the state of TX can be consigned only by invitation of the Show.
- **3.** Allowable Number of Females: An entry shall consist of five females per pen with a maximum of 3 pens. They should be uniform as to kind, age, size, pregnancy status, etc.
- 4. Fees: A nomination fee of \$20 per head must accompany nomination form. All nominations received by Nov. 15, will be given priority status; any entry received after Nov. 15, will be considered in order of receipt. A selling fee (commission) of 8 percent of the gross sale will be charged.
- 5. Screening Committee: Nominated females are subject to approval by the Show. Final selections will be made to provide for a sale make up of high quality, useful, productive females demanded by today's progressive commercial livestock breeders. Nomination fees for females not accepted for sale will be returned to consignor. Consignments withdrawn after acceptance and notice WILL NOT have nomination fees returned. Females accepted for the sale will be sifted at the Show to eliminate animals injured in transit or deemed not merchantable.
- **6.** Judging: A champion pens of females will be named based on consignments in each breed and category. See Breed Classification information below. Judging will begin on Tuesday, March 4, 2025.
- 7. Pens/Feed: Pens are assigned by the Show. Pens are bedded with sand and sawdust on concrete, and each has a water trough provided by the Show. Feed troughs, if desired, must be furnished by consignor. Each consignor shall feed, water and otherwise care for his/her females. <u>All hay fed to females MUST be fed in a hay net, NO EXCEPTIONS</u>. Feed and hay may be purchased at the Houston Livestock show and Rodeo Feed Store.
- 8. TAHC: Each consignor shall comply with applicable rules and regulations of the TX Animal Health Commission as well as Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo requirements listed on page 40. All females must be accompanied by an official TAHC health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian. It is highly recommended but not an absolute requirement that females, regardless of origin and/or test status, should be official Brucellosis Calfhood Vaccinates. Females, regardless of exposure status or age, must be palpated except for those females that have recently calved. Open females must be declared to be satisfactory potential breeders by an accredited veterinarian and so stated on the health certificate.
- 9. Sales: Private treaty sales are not allowed. Consignor may pass out (PO) charge if the highest bid is unacceptable; however, a pass out charge of 8 percent of the highest bid will be assessed.
- 10. Guarantees: Consignors guarantee females are to be reproductively sound and females palpated to be bred will calve when indicated, according to either known breeding dates, dates of exposure and/or by best estimate of veterinarian. Consignors are responsible for health and viability of all calves born shortly before and/or after arrival at sale facility. All guarantees of any nature, either expressed or implied shall be between seller and buyer and shall not in any way bind the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, its Officers, Directors or the Sale Manager.
- 11. General: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo along with the Sale Manager not responsible for loss or damage to any animal.

Special Rules for Open Breeding Sheep Show

- 1. Junior Entries: Entries in the Junior Breeding Sheep Show may enter the Open Breeding Sheep Show by completing an Open entry application.
- 2. Registry: Breeding sheep must be registered in the recognized flock books of their respective breeds prior to Feb. 26 at 7a.m. and bear such identification as that breed association requires. The flock number must be recorded in the judges' record book at the time the Superintendent lists and classifies entries prior to the judging of the classes. Sheep not carrying proper ear identification coinciding with judges' record book at time of showing will be barred from competition.
- 3. Eligible Breeds: Entry can made in the following breeds.



a. Dorper, Dorset, Hampshire, ORB (Other Registered Breeds), Rambouillet, Registered Finewool Breeds (Columbia, Corriedale, Delaine-Merino, Targhee are the only breeds allowed in the Registered Finewool Breeds Classes), Registered Hair Breeds (Royal White, Texel, and Katahdin are the only breeds allowed in the Registered Hair Breeds Classes), Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk, and White Dorper.

4. Number of Entries: There is no limit on the number of breeding sheep entries an exhibitor may enter. Exhibitors may only enter one group entry per class per breed.

- 5. **Required Information:** It is not necessary for the exhibitor to specify a particular animal when entering the single classes; however, a separate entry application must be made and submitted to the Show before the entry deadline for each individual and group entry. Name and registration number must be furnished at time of entry or upon arrival to NRG Center.
- 6. Group Classes: All animals in group classes must be owned by the same owner. Entries for group classes also must be shown in their respective single classes.
- 7. Breeding Ages: For the purpose of this show, the following will apply regarding ages of breeding sheep: Toothing of sheep to determine the age class in which they are shown will be done during check-in. Sheep with the following tooth development at check-in time will show in the listed classes, and they will not be toothed in the show ring.
 - a. Lambs must be carrying all milk teeth. Lambs showing either or both of their first pair of permanent incisors may not show in the lamb classes.
 - b. Sheep eligible to compete in the two-tooth breeding classes must show only the first pair of permanent incisors. Sheep which have dropped their central pair of milk teeth and show one or both teeth of the first permanent pair may show as singles only in the two-tooth classes of their respective breeds.
 - c. Sheep showing the first two or three pairs of permanent incisors may show as singles in the four-to-six tooth class only.
 - d. Sheep with more than six permanent teeth may not exhibit in the show.
- 8. Defects: Sheep showing pronounced defect or abnormality will be barred from showing in the breeding classes.

- 8. Fitting: Fitting will be left up to the discretion of the exhibitor. No artificial coloring will be allowed.
- 9. Females: Any female over 24 months of age, that has not kidded will not be allowed to show.
- 10. Substitutions: Substitutions are NOT allowed between Open and Youth Boer goat entries.
- 11. **Bedding:** One bag of shavings per every two animals will be provided. Shaving will be distributed at the Airport Blvd. Staging Lot prior to release of animals for move-in. Additional shavings may be purchased once the Feed Store opens at NRG Center. In an effort to free up pen space, outside shavings are prohibited. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 12. **Check In:** All Open and Youth Boer Goat exhibitors must be checked in 3 p.m. on Saturday. Once check in is complete, it is the exhibitors' responsibility to review the check in sheets that will be posted and contact the Show Superintendent prior to the start of the Youth Boer Goat Show, in the event that an entry/entries are posted in the incorrect class. All changes must be made prior to that start of the Youth Boer Goat Show. Class changes will not be allowed after the start of the Youth Boer Goat Show.

Special Rules for Open Llama and Alpaca Show

1. Entry Requirements Llamas: Entries must be made on individual entry forms in the name of the animal and owner as matched to the ILR Registration document. An animal showing in more than one class may be entered on the same form. Handler names must be entered on the form. Youth division entries must be in the name of the Youth. A copy of the animal's ILR registration must be attached to each entry form. Non-Breeder animal's registration must be accompanied by a registration or veterinarian certificate verifying stated condition.

ALL ENTRIES MUST BE SUBMITTED THROUGH THE ONLINE ENTRY SYSTEM (<u>WWW.ALPACAREG.COM/START/HLSR</u>). CHECK PAYMENT WILL NEED TO BE SENT BY FEBRUARY 1ST TO THE SHOW OFFICES WITH A COPY OF THE ENTRIES.

2. Registry:

- a. Llamas 5 months and older, entered in approved ALSA classes, with the exception of Youth Classes, must be registered or have passed screening with the International Llama Registry (ILR) or the Canadian Livestock Record Corporation (CLRC). Non-Breeder Ilamas do not have to be registered or have passed screening with the ILR or the CLRC except those recorded with ALSA and participating in the Award System. Photocopy of ILR/CLRC must accompany entry.
- 3. Entry Limitations: Entries will be accepted on a first come, first served basis. After the maximum number of entries has been received, all remaining entries will be returned.
- 4. Pens: Pens will be assigned by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo on a first come, first serve basis provided adequate stalling directives are included with registration packet. Exhibitors wishing to be stalled next to another exhibitor must request so in an e-mail to the Show Staff at <u>livestock@rodeohouston.com</u> prior to February 1st. Request must be made by both parties with Farm/Ranch and owner/individual name on mailed in forms and/or e-mail or they will not be honored. There is no limit to the number of stalls/pens requested; however, *only two llamas or three alpacas* may occupy a stall/pen. Only one stall/pen per farm may be used for tack/display. There will be no changing of stall assignments at the show. Stalls are 10' x 10'.
- 6. **Displays:** Exhibitors may setup displays for educational purposes but may not offer their products for sale at the show. Any exhibitor caught selling products will be subject to dismissal.
- 7. Bedding: Animals may be bedded on sand or other bedding. Carpet is not available. Requests to have sand removed from a stall prior to arrival must be in writing and indicate the number of stalls with or without sand. Requests must be sent with entry and e-mailed to the Show Staff at livestock@rodeohouston.com. Requests should include a diagram of sand and no sand and any sharing instructions. Requests made after February 1st are subject to availability.
- 8. Feed/Water: Exhibitor must provide feed and water troughs. Water outlets are available.
- 9. Health Certificate: See TX Animal Health Commission Rules. The Show requires that all alpacas and llamas attending the show must have a Veterinary Health Certificate issued within 30 days of the last day of the show.
- 10. **Halter Classes:** These classes are designed to showcase the breeding qualities of male and female llamas and alpacas. Llama Halter Classes will be divided into 3 wool-lengths, Light, Medium and Heavy. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to enter the correct class; however, the judge will have final decision. No llama class changes will be made after judging starts. Alpaca color will be verified at check-in, prior to entering arena. Judge's decision is final.
- 11. Open Performance Classes: Animals entered in Youth Division Classes may not enter Open Performance Division Class.
- 12. Animal Age: Determined by date of Halter Classes. See Halter Class Section.
- 13. **Substitutions:** All substitutions must be for another animal in the exact same class number as the original entry. No additional fee will be charged for substitutions. All substitutions must be submitted before the close of check-in.
- 14. **Exhibitor Emergency Phone Numbers:** A nighttime emergency phone number must be posted on the front of each pen for the duration of the show.
- 15. Intact Males ALSA: Youth 7 to 19 years old may show intact males; however, Youth 7 to 12 years old may not show intact males over 24 months of age. Youth under 7 years old may not show intact males.

Alpaca and Llama Show Association, Inc. (ALSA) Rules: This show is sanctioned by ALSA. All entries, points and awards are subject to the rules and regulations published in the ALSA Handbook 22nd Edition. There is a \$5 per ALSA fee for each animal entered. Non-ALSA members must pay \$60 fee per farm for showing their animals. Youth showing in youth classes must be an ALSA member or pay a \$15 non-member fee. Photocopy of ALSA membership card or current ALSA Membership Directory must be sent to avoid paying \$60 non-member fee. All entries must include ALSA member number, youth number and/or llama number to assure recording of points with ALSA. Animals and youth must be recorded with ALSA within 15 days after the show to accumulate ALSA points. Information about ALSA may be found at www.alsashow.org or by calling ALSA at (281) 516-1442.

Conflict of Interest between Exhibitor and Judge - Exhibitors need to practice good judgment in respect to the Conflict of Interest between Exhibitor and Judges. Per the ALSA rule book, the Judge must not have personal contact with exhibitors (other than a brief greeting) until after the entire show is over. Examples of personal contact include but are not limited to: talking to exhibitors outside the ring, riding together, dining together, visiting in the barn, and viewing sale animals or attending llama or alpaca sales in conjunction with the show they are judging.

The burden of responsibility is with the owner, exhibitor, or trainer to recognize a conflict of interest. When the exhibitor enters a show, it is done so with full knowledge of who will be judging. The Judge, on the other hand, accepts the job without knowing who will be exhibiting at the show.

Open Llama/Alpaca Performance Classes: These classes are open to all exhibitors 7 years and older. However, a Youth entering open classes may not show the same animal(s) the Youth showed in the Youth Division Classes of this Show. Performance classes are designed to present or simulate conditions and obstacles that would be encountered in certain situations when llamas/alpacas are required to perform. These classes demonstrate the intelligence and versatility of the llama and alpaca. Entries will be disqualified if the animal is uncooperative.

The Show also offers the **ALSA Performance Champion Award for Llama Division:** Tabulations are made using the ALSA Point Chart. **Animals must show in the appropriate Obstacle Class, the Public Relations Class and the Pack Class.** A minimum of 8 animals must exhibit in the Open Obstacle Class for the award to be given. Champion accumulates the most points. This is class number 206 and 207 for the Advanced Class and 208 and 209 for the Novice.

For the ALPACA DIVISION, The Show offers the ALSA Versatility Grand Champion. This award goes to the alpaca who shows overall excellence by placing well in numerous show events. To be eligible; animals must show in the appropriate Halter Class, the Fleece Show, and both Obstacle and Public Relations. The ALSA Versatility Grand Champion will not be awarded until after the Halter class is complete.

ALSA Pack Class: This class is designed to present or simulate the conditions and obstacles actually encountered when packing llamas on the trail. Animals must be at least 5 months to compete and be fitted with a two-cinch system. Animals 5 to 36 months carry no weight but must use fill material to simulate a full pack. Animals 37 months and over must carry 20 lbs. of weight.

Obstacle Class: The purpose of Obstacle Class is to demonstrate the well-trained animal's obedience and willingness to complete the activities requested by the handler.

Public Relations Class: This class is for the animal that participates in community activities.

1. Entry Requirements Alpacas: Entries must be made on individual entry forms in the name of the animal and owner as matched to the AOA Registration document. An animal showing in more than one class may be entered on the same form. Handler names must be entered on the form. Youth division entries must be in the name of the Youth. A copy of the animal's AOA Registration document must be attached to each entry form. Non-Breeder animal's registration must be accompanied by a registration or veterinarian certificate verifying stated condition.

ALL ENTRIES MUST BE SUBMITTED THROUGH THE ONLINE ENTRY SYSTEM (<u>WWW.ALPACAREG.COM/START/HLSR</u>). THE LINK WILL BE POSTED AS SOON AS IT IS AVAILABLE. CHECK PAYMENT WILL NEED TO BE SENT BY FEBRUARY 1ST TO THE SHOW OFFICES WITH A COPY OF THE ENTRIES.

2. Registry:

- a. Alpacas 5 months and older, entered in and present at the show must be registered by the Alpaca Owners Association (AOA) or the Canadian Livestock Record Corporation (CLRC). Non-Breeder alpacas do not have to be registered or have passed screening with the AOA or the CLCR except those recorded with AOA and participating in the Award System. A photocopy of the AOA registration certificate must accompany entry.
- 3. **Entry Limitations:** Entries will be accepted on a first come, first served basis. After the maximum number of entries has been received, all remaining entries will be returned.
- 4. Pens: Pens will be assigned by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo on a first come, first serve basis provided adequate stalling directives are included with registration packet. Exhibitors wishing to be stalled next to another exhibitor must request so in an e-mail to the Show Staff at <u>livestock@rodeohouston.com</u> prior to February 1st. Request must be made by both parties with Farm/Ranch and owner/individual name on mailed in forms and/or e-mail or they will not be honored. There is no

limit to the number of stalls/pens requested; however, *only two llamas or three alpacas* may occupy a stall/pen. Only one stall/pen per farm may be used for tack/display. There will be no changing of stall assignments at the show. Stalls are 10' x 10'.

Special Rules for Open Alpaca Show

- 5. **Displays:** Exhibitors may setup displays for educational purposes but may not offer their products for sale at the show. Any exhibitor caught selling products will be subject to dismissal.
- 6. Bedding: Animals may be bedded on sand or other bedding. Carpet is not available. Requests to have sand removed from a stall prior to arrival must be in writing and indicate the number of stalls with or without sand. Requests must be sent with entry and e-mailed to the Show Staff at livestock@rodeohouston.com. Requests should include a diagram of sand and no sand and any sharing instructions. Requests made after February 1st are subject to availability.
- 7. Feed/Water: Exhibitor must provide feed and water troughs. Water outlets are available.
- 8. Health Certificate: See TX Animal Health Commission Rules. The Show requires that all alpacas and llamas attending the show must have a Veterinary Health Certificate issued within 30 days of the last day of the show.
- 9. Halter Classes: These classes are designed to showcase the breeding qualities of male and female alpacas and will be set based on AOA Guidelines. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to enter the correct class; however, the judge will have final decision. Alpaca color will be verified at check-in, prior to entering arena. Judge's decision is final.
- 10. Open Performance Classes: Animals entered in Youth Division Classes may not enter Open Performance Division Class.
- 11. Animal Age: Determined by date of Halter Classes. See Halter Class Section.
- 12. **Substitutions:** All substitutions must be for another animal in the exact same class number as the original entry. No additional fee will be charged for substitutions. All substitutions must be submitted before the close of check-in.
- 13. **Exhibitor Emergency Phone Numbers:** A nighttime emergency phone number must be posted on the front of each pen for the duration of the show.
- 14. Intact Males: Youth 7 to 19 years old may show intact males; however, Youth 7 to 12 years old may not show intact males over 24 months of age. Youth under 7 years old may not show intact males.

2. Sanctioned Breeds:

- a. 4 Class Dutch, Holland Lop, Jersey Wooly, Mini Lop, Mini Rex, Mini Satin, Netherland Dwarf, Polish, Rex, Silver, Tan
- b. 6 Class Californian, Cinnamon, English Lop, Flemish Giant, French Lop, New Zealand, Satin
- c. There is no Meat Pen division in the Open Breeding Rabbit Show.
- d. The Open Breeding Rabbit Show is sanctioned by the American Rabbit Breeders Association and the TX Rabbit Breeders Association. A full listing of ARBA national specialty clubs sanctioned for the 2025 Houston Livestock Show™ can be found on the following website. <u>https://arba.net/national-specialty-clubs/</u>



B. Entry Requirements: The entry fee is \$16 per rabbit and will include both Shows A and B. One rabbit must be shown to receive an exhibitor grounds pass. The same animal may not be shown in both the Open and Youth Shows.

- 4. Arrival and Check-In: All exhibitors must arrive directly to NRG Arena and enter through Gate 5. Exhibitors may begin to arrive no earlier than 6 a.m. and must be in place by 8 a.m. Animals are subject to inspection at check-in. Animals showing symptoms of any contagious disease at check-in or later must leave the Show grounds.
- Trailer Parking: <u>No Trailers will be allowed to park in Maroon Lot.</u> Trailer parking will be located at Airport Boulevard (1901 Airport Blvd; Houston, TX 77051). You may not bring any trailer to Gate 5 for Move Out until you have received your release papers.
- 6. Substitutions: Free substitutions will be taken up to Feb 25, 2025, by email only to <u>livestock@rodeohouston.com</u>. Substitutions are allowed in the same class, sex, breed, and variety as the original entry. Substitutions must be made to the show secretary when the animals are checked in. Substitution Fee is \$5 per rabbit to sub in both Shows.
- 7. Identification: Rabbits must have a permanent tattoo in the left ear. No animal will be checked in without a permanent tattoo.
- 8. **Sales:** Exhibitors are not allowed to sell animals unless the animals are entered in the Show. Exhibitors selling rabbits must get a release from the Rabbit Show for all animals sold before removing the animals from the Show grounds. No early releases for sale animals will be provided. Rabbits not entered in the Show are not allowed on Show grounds. "For Sale" signs will not be allowed.

Special Rules for Open Breeding Rabbit Show

- 9. Check-Out: Only the exhibitor may check-out his or her rabbits. Animals left after check-out time will forfeit awards, ribbons, and money and the exhibitor will not be allowed to Show the following year.



- 3. Entry Requirements: Two meat pens of three rabbits each per exhibitor, no alternates, will be accepted. Only one meat pen per exhibitor will have the opportunity to advance to the top 30. In the event that a judge selects two meat pens from the same exhibitor to be placed in the top 30, only the higher placing pen from that exhibitor becomes eligible to be awarded a top 30 premium. Rabbits will all be of the same breed and variety, but do not have to come from the same litter. Rabbit age limit is 10 weeks. Minimum weight is three and a half pounds (3.5 lbs.) for each rabbit and maximum weight is five and a half pounds (5.5 lbs.) for each rabbit. Entry fees are \$10 per pen.



This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

Special Rules for the Youth Cavy Show

- 1. Show Sanctioning: This show is officially sanctioned by the American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) and is conducted in accordance with its latest revised rules.
- 2. Entry Requirements: Minimum entry is one (1) cavy for a minimum entry fee of \$8. One cavy must be shown to receive an exhibitor grounds pass. The same animal may not be shown in both the Open and Youth Shows.
- 3. Exhibitor Eligibility: Youth exhibitors must be enrolled in a public, private, elementary, or secondary school in TX. Exhibitor must be at least 5 years old, but not older than 18 years old on the day that judging begins.
- 4. Arrival and Check-In: All exhibitors must stage at the staging lot located at Airport Boulevard (1901 Airport Blvd., Houston, TX 77051). As Space is available, exhibitors will be released to NRG Arena and enter through Gate 5. Exhibitors must have a move-in tag to enter Gate 5. Exhibitors may begin to arrive no earlier than 5 a.m. and must be in place at Airport Blvd. by 7 a.m. on Saturday, March 2. Animals will be inspected at check-in. Animals showing symptoms of any contagious disease at check-in or later must leave the Show grounds. Exhibitors must obtain a release form from the rabbit office prior to removing these animals.
- Trailer Parking: No Trailers will be allowed to park in Maroon Lot. Trailer parking will be located at Airport Boulevard (1901 Airport Blvd; Houston, TX 77051). You may not bring any trailer to Gate 5 for Move Out until you have received your release papers.
- 6. Substitutions: Free substitutions will be taken up to Feb 25, 2025, by email only to livestock@rodeohouston.com. Substitutions are allowed in the same class, sex, breed, and variety as the original entry. Substitutions must be made to the show secretary by the time animals are checked in. Substitution Fee is \$3 per cavy.
- 7. Identification: Cavies must have a permanent ear tag in the left ear. No entry will be checked in without an ear tag.
- 8. Sales: Exhibitors may sell animals that are entered in the Show. Exhibitors selling cavies must get a release from the Cavy Show for all animals sold before removing the animals from the Show grounds. No early releases for sale animals will be provided. Only cavies entered in the show are allowed on the show grounds. "For Sale" signs are not allowed.
- **9.** Check-Out: Only the exhibitor may check-out his/her cavies. Animals left after checkout time will forfeit awards, ribbons, and money and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show the following year.
- 10. Payments: Checks will not be issued for premiums less than \$5.
- **11. Prizes:** Sanctioned breeds with 1-9 animals shown will be eligible for class premiums and rosettes; 10+ animals will be eligible for class premiums, trophies, and cash awards. Best in show, 1st Runner Up and 2nd Runner Up will receive trophies, premium money and cash awards.

Special Rules for the Youth Cavy Show

12. Rabbit and Cavy Costume Contest: The rabbit and cavy costume cost will consist of 5 categories; Best Rodeo Theme, Most Elaborate Costume, Funniest Costume, Best Character Impersonation, and Most Colorful Costume. Registration for the Costume Contest will take place at the time of check-in at Rabbit Secretary's Building. Exhibitors will be limited to one (1) entry for the Rabbit and Cavy Costume Contest and category will be determined by the judges. Animals must be entered in the Youth Breeding Rabbit or Cavy Show to participate.

JUNIOR SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS

Preamble:

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (the "Show") is organized for charitable, educational and scientific purposes. In accordance with the Bylaws of the Show, a livestock exposition shall be held once each year to encourage the improvement of the breeding and raising of cattle, swine, sheep, goats, horses, mules, poultry and other livestock and farm products for the benefit of the public. The Bylaws also state that the Show may promote and maintain educational functions. In keeping with these same Bylaws, the purpose of the Junior Livestock Division of the Houston Livestock Show shall be to encourage and promote the educational aspects of livestock projects conducted only by junior exhibitors under the proper supervision and direction of either an Agricultural Science Teacher (AST) or a County Extension Agent (CEA).

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo recognizes that the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, through its 4-H Clubs, and the TX Education Agency, through the FFA Chapters, provide a valuable service to the public in educating TX school students in the principles of successful raising and breeding of livestock. In order to encourage participation in the 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters throughout the state, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo includes as a part of its annual livestock exhibition the Junior Livestock Division which is a special exhibition for TX 4-H Club and FFA members. The purpose of the Junior Livestock Division is to encourage participation in livestock projects conducted under the authority and supervision of all Agricultural Science Teachers (ASTs) or County Extension Agents (CEAs).

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo allows CEAs and ASTs in charge of 4-H Club or FFA Chapter livestock programs the opportunity to enter members which they believe have demonstrated exceptional interest and ability in the raising, caring and breeding of livestock, subject to these Special Rules. These Rules, however, are only prescribed as minimum requirements for participation in the Show, and are not intended to in any way limit the right of any CEA or AST, or the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension or TX Education Agency, to impose additional requirements as they may deem necessary regarding participation in the Junior Livestock Division.

The opportunity to enter 4-H Club and FFA Chapter members' projects in the Junior Livestock Division is only available to CEAs and ASTs supervising these livestock projects. In no event are these rules to be construed as making any offer or opportunity available to any 4-H Club or FFA Chapter member. In no event shall any CEA or AST be considered to be an agent of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for any purpose. This preamble shall be considered to be a part of these Special Rules for the Junior Livestock Division, and all rules are to be interpreted in accordance with the purposes herein described.

REQUIRED:

Each Junior Exhibitor and Open Show Exhibitor must complete an IRS W-9 form and return it with entry. Premium payouts will not be made without a completed W-9 form.

- 1. General Rules: All entries in this department are subject to the General Rules and Regulations published in this book, to these Special Junior Show Rules and to the Special Rules listed for each breed show. In the event of any conflict between these Special Junior Show Rules and the General Rules, the provisions of these Special Junior Show Rules shall govern.
- 2. Junior Show Participation: Participation in the Junior Livestock Division is limited to TX resident students, who are members of a TX 4-H Club or FFA Chapter, and who have continuously owned and personally fed and cared for their animals under the direct supervision of a CEA or AST. Exhibitors must be United States citizens and possess a valid social security number to be eligible for participation in the Show. Exhibitors must be enrolled in, and attending, public or private elementary or secondary schools in TX. Students must be between the ages of 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and 18 on or before Aug. 31, 2024. Each FFA Chapter and 4-H Club must be a member in good standing with its state and National affiliates.
- 3. Quality Counts Verification: Exhibitors are now required to pass the Quality Counts Verification test for entry into the current year Show. Junior market, breeding show entries, and Calf Scramble entrants will not be accepted without the verification code for each exhibitor. Verification codes are not required for Agricultural Mechanics exhibitors, deadline Clay Shoot, Young Guns Skeet Shoot, Archery, Poster Board contest, Video Competition, and Judging Contest contestants. The test can be found at https://www.texaslivestockvalidation.com/qc/qcregister.aspx
- 4. **Dual Show Entry:** Animals entered in the Junior Dairy Show, Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show, and the Junior Breeding Sheep Show may also enter the Open Show.



Entries: Entries must be made by the CEAs and ASTs with one payment for total fees drawn on an account of the 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Entries may be paid online or by check made payable to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Entries must be accompanied by the online entry summary sheet, a check for all fees paid to the Show (if not paid online) from the 4-H Club or FFA Chapter, a signed and notarized release of liability and indemnity for each exhibitor, and a W-9 form for each exhibitor. Do not combine applications from more than one 4-H Club or FFA Chapter.

- 6. Late Entries: Junior Show entries submitted between midnight, Dec. 1 and on or before midnight, Dec. 5 will be accepted with a \$250 late fee per club/chapter. Entries submitted after midnight, Dec. 6 until closing of check-in for individual species will automatically be charged a \$500 extra late fee per entry submitted by mail or in person. (Payment in the form of cash, check, or credit card must be received prior to the close of check-in for the respective specie). Late entries are not guaranteed to be in pre-Show press releases.
- 7. Individual Exhibitors: Entry applications will not be accepted from individual junior exhibitors.
- 8. Partnership Entries: Partnership entries will not be accepted in market classes (steers, lambs, barrows, goats and poultry) or in the junior breeding beef heifer, breeding sheep, and breeding gilt shows.
- 9. Maximum Number of Entries: For each individual junior exhibitor within the 4-H Club or FFA Chapter, the CEAs and ASTs may enter a maximum of the following animals in the Junior Shows:

one market steer	one beef heifer
no limit on dairy heifers	one pen of commercial steers
one market barrow	three entries on breeding gilts
one market wether lamb	no limit on breeding sheep
one group of sheep per group class	one market wether goat
one turkey	one pen of broilers

The use of 4-H membership and FFA membership to attempt to enter more than the maximum number of entries per junior exhibitor in each department will result in disqualification of each individual junior exhibitor involved.

- **10.** Companion Animals: Only animals entered in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] are allowed on show grounds. All other animals, excluding entered cow-calf pairs, will be removed per Show Management.
- **11.** Club or Chapter Entries: Entries made in the name of FFA chapters or 4-H clubs are not eligible in the Junior Livestock Show except for class 19 of the Junior Dairy Show, the Agricultural Mechanics Show and Judging Contests.
- **12. Grounds Passes:** One per exhibitor. Two complimentary Exhibitor Grounds Passes will be offered to each county or chapter entry.
- **13. Parking Permits:** Complimentary parking permits are offered with the following limitations:

Gate 11 Parking (onsite parking):

Each club/chapter will receive 1 parking pass for this lot for each time period that the club/chapter has entries for teacher/agents. If the lot meets capacity, vehicles with a pass to this lot will be sent to Gate 21.

Gate 21 (lot located South of 610 at the corner of West Bellfort and Kirby): Parking will be distributed for each time period as follows based on total entries per time period:

The parking permit must be displayed from rear view mirror and is transferable to other vehicles. Permits do not guarantee a parking space. Parking permits cannot be purchased and are not distributed during the Show; they must be obtained in advance.

*In addition to grounds passes, 2 parking passes per team will be issued to on-site judging contest participants. Judging contest participants will not be allowed on the grounds without a parking pass.

**Permit must be displayed from rear view mirror and is transferable to other vehicles. Permits do not guarantee a parking space. Vehicle permits cannot be purchased and are not distributed during the Show; they must be obtained in advance.

- 14. Ineligible Exhibitors: 4-H and FFA members are considered to be eligible by the Houston Livestock Show for participation in the Junior Livestock Show at the time completed online entries are received from the AST/CEA. Any AST/CEA who has a member who becomes ineligible to participate, for any reason, must provide written and signed notification to the appropriate Superintendent of the Livestock Show at least 24 hours prior to the commencement of any Junior Show activity in which the ineligible exhibitor was to participate. If an exhibitor is determined ineligible, then the entry is ineligible.
- **15.** Foreign Exchange Students: Non-United States citizens and Foreign Exchange students are ineligible to compete in the Junior Livestock Division. Such individuals are eligible to participate in the Open Livestock Show. All Junior Show exhibitors must be United States citizens and possess a valid social security number to be eligible for participation in the Show.
- **16. Past Winners:** Junior exhibitors who have had a Grand Champion steer, lamb, goat, barrow, pen of broilers or turkey at any prior Houston Livestock Show are not eligible to compete in the division in which their prior Grand Champion was exhibited. The winner of a previous Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Show cannot compete in that show.
- **17.** Substitute Exhibitor: Junior Show animals must be exhibited and sold by its owner. EXCEPTION: A substitute exhibitor may be used under the following conditions:
 - **a.** When an exhibitor has more than one entry in the Junior Show and cannot be present to show their animal in another department
 - b. When an exhibitor is sick (must be accompanied by a signed statement from a doctor)
 - c. Approved school activities, STAAR test, etc. (must be accompanied by a signed statement from a school official on school letterhead)

When one of the above conditions exists, the department superintendent may decide whether a substitute showman will be allowed. If a substitute is allowed by the department superintendent, the substitute showman must be from the same county as the original exhibitor. The substitute exhibitor also must meet all requirements of a Junior Livestock Show exhibitor. If only one exhibitor is present from a county, the department superintendent can approve a substitute from another county. An exhibitor may be used as a substitute only one time per department. Any exhibitor of a past grand champion in a respective junior market animal department is **NOT** eligible to serve as a substitute exhibitor. An official substitute exhibitor form must be filled out and turned in to department superintendent until closing of check-in. The department superintendent may also require positive identification of the substitute.

18. Ownership Dates: All species listed below MUST be owned on or before the dates listed below. The feeding and fitting period should begin on or before the ownership date. For information regarding county validation, please contact the supervising CEA/AST.

- 19. Ownership Certification/Fitting: Exhibitors must own their animals at the beginning of and throughout the feeding period. Exhibitor must feed, care for and exhibit animals entered without any aid or assistance during the entire feeding period, except from CEA or AST or from other junior exhibitors and leaders within their county. After validation, if ownership changes, regardless of method or length of time, that chain of animal ownership is considered broken. CEAs and ASTs desiring to enter Junior Livestock Show exhibitors must sign a certification on the entry application that the animal was raised under his or her supervision and was purchased, raised and otherwise prepared for show exclusively by the entrant in accordance with the rules of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- 20. Country of Origin: To meet Country of Origin labeling requirements, entry in Junior Market Lamb, Market Goat, and Market Broiler shows verify that all animals have been bred, born and raised entirely in the United States.
- **21. Animal Handling:** Only experienced handlers may lead livestock within the premises of NRG Center. Show Management reserves the right to release any animal with less than desirable disposition. In any such case, the owner will have up to twelve hours to remove the excused animal from show grounds. The decision of Show Management is final, and exhibitor or purchaser has no recourse.

- 22. Refunds: Entry fees will not be refunded after Dec. 1.
- **23. Stall Space:** Animals entered in the Junior Livestock Show must be stalled or penned in the special divisions set aside for this purpose. Stall space is not guaranteed for each entry fee. After the animals have been stalled, they shall not be moved to any other part of the barn except on the consent of either the Livestock Show Management or of the superintendent of the department. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to keep pens or stalls clean and in a presentable condition. "For Sale" signs will not be permitted on or adjacent to any animal entered in the Show.
- 24. Pre-Stalling: All junior market lambs and meat goats will be pre-penned at the discretion of the Show Management. Penning requests will not be accepted or required. Entries from each county, 4-H Club and FFA Chapter, will be assigned pens together in the same area. Each county or chapter will have designated pens but may be required to share pens with other counties or chapters. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring panels to separate animals if needed. Pen dimensions are 6X6.
- **25. Stalling Upon Arrival:** Steers, Junior Breeding Heifers, Breeding Gilts, and Barrows are stalled upon arrival. To pen together at Houston, groups MUST arrive and remain in line together at Airport Blvd. No assignments will be made for animals in trailers or vehicles that are coming later. Animals will be counted on the trailers or vehicles.

For heifers and steers, the first three rows of cattle stalls on the north side of the barn (rows nearest to the dock and wash racks) will be assigned to those exhibitors arriving first. Once these three rows are assigned, assignments will be given starting on the far end of the stalls (closest to commercial exhibits) and will work back towards the dock.

- 26. Hay/Feed: Hay and feed may be purchased through the Feed Store Committee. Exhibitors who wish to bring their own hay, grain, mixtures or supplements will be permitted to do so. Exhibitors are requested to store no more than two days' supply of feed or hay in the barn at any time. Paid feed bills must be presented at the time releases are requested. Livestock will be bedded on material provided by the Show unless otherwise stated in the rules of a particular department. No straw is allowed (exception: dairy cattle & tie outs). Bedding must not be removed from stalls. Junior Market Barrow, Junior Market Lambs, and Junior Market Goats exhibitors are NOT allowed to bring in outside shavings. Note: Only small squares bales are allowed on grounds. Round bales and large square bales are not allowed.
- 27. Certification Forms and Health Papers: Junior Show exhibitors are required to have a drug certification form signed by the following: (a) Junior Exhibitor; (b) Parent or Guardian; and (c) CEA or AST. The Drug Certification Form is Part III of the Junior Show Release of Liability and Indemnity. No junior animal will be allowed to show without this certification form properly filled out and notarized. Health papers are not required on Junior Market Steers, Barrows, Lambs, Goats or Junior Commercial Steers. Health papers are required on Junior Breeding Beef Heifers, Junior Breeding Gilts, Junior Breeding Sheep, and Junior Dairy Cattle. The Junior Exhibitor and Parent or Guardian must sign the form in the presence of a Notary Public.
- **28. Drug Certification Agreement:** Exhibitor and parent/guardian certify that the entry has not been administered or that the exhibitor and parent/guardian do not have any knowledge that this entry has received any substance not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for food animals. Furthermore, the exhibitor and parent/guardian certify that this entry is free and clear of **ALL** drug and chemical residue withdrawal and elimination time periods.
- 29. Drug Testing: During the collection of blood, feather, fecal, hair and urine samples, the Exhibitor or designated responsible adult must be present at all times unless a substitute exhibitor is approved by the superintendent. Exhibitors found in violation of this rule are subject to disqualification.
- **30.** Animal/Exhibitor Disqualification: To foster fair competition, to provide a level playing field and to protect the safety of food, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species is subject to disqualification if that animal tests positive for that drug upon arrival at NRG Park. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on show grounds.
 - **a. Unethical Fitting:** Unethical fitting means <u>any</u> alteration of the natural appearance, conformation, musculature, or weight of an animal by <u>any</u> unnatural means. Such alterations do not include common and accepted animal husbandry practices. Animals showing <u>any</u> signs of being unethically fitted will be subject to disqualification.

HLSR will appoint a designee at the time of sifting or classification to promptly inspect any suspected instances of unethical fitting. If surgical alterations are suspected, exhibitors MUST produce a veterinarian note at the time of inspection, that must include the following: the identification of the exhibit by its state validation number, the reason for the alteration, and when the alteration was performed. HLSR, in its sole discretion, will determine whether an exhibit has been unethically fitted and may, in its sole discretion, disqualify the exhibit. Such determinations are final and binding on the exhibitor and not subject to appeal.

Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to the following:

- application of <u>any</u> substance to any part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that species; injection, drenching or application of <u>any</u> substance per rectum is prohibited.
- use of injections

- draining of fluids
- bruising
- feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass
- surgical alterations
- artificially filling animals by stomach pumping or airing injections
- **b. Drenching:** Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drench tubes or any other method (by esophagus) is prohibited.
- c. **Therapeutic Practices:** The practice or use of any therapeutic application including, but not limited to animal chiropractic services, acupuncture or electrical massage stimulation on show grounds is prohibited.
- d. Over Age Animals: Over age animals will be disqualified.
- e. Unapproved Drug Use: The showing of any animal that has been administered during its life any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.
- f. Approved Drug Use: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species and class, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at NRG Park. Animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on show grounds. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- g. Animal Inspection: As condition for participation in the Show, exhibitor must agree to submit any animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection. Exhibitor agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by the Show. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by the Show or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. Further, the Show specifically reserves the right to have tissue, blood, urine, hair, feather, and/or fecal laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the laboratory shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or age, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- h. Unmanageable Animals: The Show may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable.
- i. **Non-adherence to Rules:** Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Show rules will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- j. Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on Show grounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. An exhibitor may choose a licensed veterinarian other than the official Show veterinarian, but the official Show veterinarian MUST be notified in advance and he/she MUST be present. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, The Official Show Veterinarian, in agreement with Show Management, reserve the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official Show Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official Show Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and or elimination time, will be determined ineligible for competition.
- k. Treatment Cost: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- **31. Wholesome Meat Act:** The USDA Wholesome Meat Act applies to all market livestock. Only animals eligible for immediate slaughter may be brought onto the grounds and exhibited:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
 - **b.** Drug labels must be observed. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
 - c. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of carcasses or the sale price of the animal. In such cases, the exhibitor forfeits all rights to any and all proceeds including: Auction Price, Scholarships, Premium Awards, Market (Floor) Price and Special Awards.

- **32.** Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act: As required, in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Market steer, lamb and goat shows, and the Junior Commercial Steer competition shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct control, the animal(s) were not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.
- **33.** Disqualification/Condemnation of Animal: "The Show practices a Zero Tolerance policy on all residue violations." The Show reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of Rule 30 of the Junior Show Rules and Regulations listed in the handbook and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified, the class placing will not change. A disqualified exhibitor may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- **34. Disclaimer of Warranties:** The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo expressly disclaims any express or implied warranties (including merchantability), whether the goods or services are provided by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo or by others (such as drug testing). The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo does NOT provide security or guard services and is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exhibitor and exhibitor's parents and/or guardians agree that the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo shall be entitled to disqualify any exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and had no role in the administration of the drug shown by the drug test. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor. Disqualification results in forfeiture of all prize money and auction proceeds.
- **35. Rule Infraction Database:** Each exhibitor understands and agrees that the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is entitled to report any and all rule infractions to the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association (NALSRMA) Rule Infraction Database (RID). The exhibitor agrees that this information will be available to the membership of the NALSRMA.
- **36.** Ultimate Care and Responsibility: By making entry into the Show the exhibitor agrees and understands that ultimate care and responsibility for an animal(s) rest solely upon the exhibitor until such time that possession of the animal is turned over to the commission agency or taken into custody by HLSR Show Management.
- **37. Usage of Electronic Devices:** Neither contestants or exhibitors may be in possession of electronic communication or storage devices at any time during judging or while in arena or in competition. These devices include but are not limited to cell phones, Palm Pilots, Blackberries, personal computers, pagers, and radio devices, such as walkie-talkies and/or handless phone devices.
- **38.** Animal Handling Devices: Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. <u>Halters of any material less than 1/4</u> inch in diameter are prohibited for all species, including but not limited to: cable, nylon, string and monofilament.

Rules Governing Junior Market Guaranteed Premiums and Livestock Auctions

- 1. **Release of Champions:** Exhibitors of Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion animals must remain with their animals until they are received by the commission company or taken into custody by HLSR Show Management.
- Ribbon Winners: All steers, lambs, barrows, goats and poultry that have won ribbons while competing in their individual classes will become the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in return for a Guaranteed Premium. A schedule of the Guaranteed Premiums is shown in the Special Rules section found in each Junior Market Animal Show. Animals will be sold by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in their respective Junior Market Auctions.
- 3. **Sale Proceeds:** Junior Market Auction proceeds will be paid to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. All Guaranteed Premiums will be disbursed after the Livestock Show is completed.
- 4. Withhold Guaranteed Premiums: The Guaranteed Premium will be withheld due to any rule infraction.
- 5. **Substitutions:** Separate auctions will be provided for market steers, lambs/goats, barrows and poultry. Superintendent's permission for someone other than exhibitor to take steers, lambs/goats, barrows or poultry through the auction must be obtained prior to the auction.
- 6. **Thank You Notes:** The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo requires Junior exhibitors with animals in the Junior Market Auctions to write thank you notes to the buyers. Buyer information will be sent to the CEA/AST along with a verification form. When thank you notes have been sent to the buyers, the verification form must be sent to the Auctions Department stating that all notes have been mailed. Once verification forms have been received, checks will be mailed to the exhibitor. No checks will be mailed without a verification form on file.
- 7. Decorations: No decorations are allowed at the sale. The animal must be in a natural state.
- 8. Animal Care: It is the exhibitors' responsibility to take proper care of their animals until the animals are delivered onto the truck of the auction commission agent or taken into custody by HLSR Show Management following the auction. Failure to do so will result in the forfeiture of Guaranteed Premiums. Only animals that have won ribbons while competing in their individual classes will be

eligible for sale in their respective junior market auctions. Exhibitors of sifted or non-ribbon Junior market animals will be charged a commission for animals sold while at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

9. **Placing Animals:** Animals are not considered to be placing animals until that animal has completed all stages of the particular show and has received a ribbon or rosette corresponding with the official placing by the judge.

AUCTION EXPLANATION

How Do the HLSR Auctions Work?

The Houston Livestock Show™ rewards its junior market exhibitors with guaranteed payments for every auction lot by securing above market values for each exhibitor making the auction.

GUARANTEED PREMIUM

Because the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo sells such a large number of market animals (1,894 or 26% of arrivals), simply hoping that enough buyers attend each auction to actively bid on every single lot would be a risky proposition for our exhibitors. As a result, each auction is conducted by a dedicated committee of volunteers who pre-sell the majority of lots to ensure that each exhibitor receives a minimum guaranteed amount regardless of whether or not a bid is received on every lot. Guaranteed premiums are really a safety net for the exhibitor.

Please refer to the Special Rules for each Junior Market show to the view the guaranteed premium for each placing animal that qualifies for auction. Exhibitors will receive one check for the full amount of the guaranteed premium for the auction lot. The guaranteed premium is the only check that will be sent to the exhibitor. *Please Note:* Since Guaranteed Premiums have been greatly increased for each auction, implemented in 2024, additional premiums have been discontinued.

EXHIBITOR SCHOLARSHIPS

EXHIBITOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Thirty livestock and horse show exhibitors will receive a four-year, \$20,000 college scholarship as an additional incentive for participating in the 2025 Houston Livestock Show™.

To apply for the exhibitor scholarships, students must meet the following requirements:

- be a U.S. citizen,
- be a TX resident,
- be a graduating high school senior from a TX public high school,
- be ranked in the top half of the graduating high school class,
- intend to attend an accredited, not-for-profit TX college or university and participate in a curriculum leading to a bachelor's degree,
- participate in one or more of the approved competitions in the 2025 Show year,

Online applications along with eligibility requirements can be accessed through the Show website,

http://www.rodeohouston.com/Educational-Support/Scholars/Apply. Supporting documents must be uploaded at the time of application. Incomplete applications will not be considered. Online applications will open on December 16, 2024 and are due by January 31, 2025 at 7:59 p.m. A school official will be required to complete a digital form for each applicant. This form must be submitted online by February 7, 2025, at 4:59 PM. There are no extensions or exceptions to either deadline.

Exhibitor scholarship applications will be judged using the standard Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship evaluation process. Performance evaluations or place ranking within each show will not influence the outcome of the scholarship awards.

Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship recipients also may be eligible to apply for the Achievement Scholarship Program, which allows college students currently receiving Show scholarships to apply for an additional \$4,000 per semester, for up to four semesters once they reach their junior and senior years of undergraduate studies. To be eligible to apply, existing Show scholars must have been classified as a junior or senior by the conclusion of the spring semester and have completed a minimum of four college semesters since their high school graduation, with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Special Rules for Junior Market Steer Show

1. **Rules:** This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.

Special Rules for Junior Market Steer Show

2. Guaranteed Premiums: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has established a Schedule of Guaranteed Premiums (shown below), which must be accepted by all Junior Market Show exhibitors who win ribbons in the individual classes. In return for the Guaranteed Premium, winning animals become the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and will be sold at their respective Junior Market Auction. Placing steers will be branded as the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo before leaving the judging arena.

- * Premiums are subject to handling fee.
- * The top two exhibitors in each class are required to walk through the Auction.
- * All exhibitors making the sale are *strongly* encouraged to attend the Auction.
- * Only first through fourth placing exhibitors from each class are required to attend the Auction meeting.
- **3. Champions:** The first-place steer of each class of each breed will compete for breed champion steer. Second place steers are required to be brought into the arena. After the champion steer of each breed is selected, the second-place steer in the class that furnished the champion competes with the first-place steer in the other classes of the breed for reserve champion steer.
- 4. Stalling: To stall together at Houston, groups MUST arrive and remain in line together at Airport Blvd. NO assignments will be made for steers that are coming later. Steers will be counted on the trailers. <u>The Airport Boulevard staging area will</u> remain open beginning on Saturday, March 15 at 5 p.m. and Tuesday, March 18 at 5 p.m. for trailers to be staged. The first three rows of cattle stalls on the north side of the barn (rows nearest to the dock and wash racks) will be assigned to those exhibitors arriving first. Once these three rows are assigned, assignments will be given starting on the far end of the stalls (closest to commercial exhibits) and will work back towards the dock.
- 5. Validation: Steers must be validated in the TX 4-H and FFA Steer Validation Program. Show Management will make the final decision regarding any potential disqualification. Animals that need to be retagged may do so between 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. on the day of move-in at the Veterinarian Station by the Main Arena in NRG Center.
- 6. Self/Mobile-Check-In: Check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animal. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. The last 6 digits of the animal's state validation tag number
 - b. The animals declared weight
 - c. The animals declared breed

The Exhibitor will be responsible for making sure the information entered in accurate and if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary.

7. Ear Tags: Steers must have a TX State Validation ear tag. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. Exhibitor numbers must be worn during classification, sifting and judging. If an animal is missing the TX State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify the Superintendent immediately upon arrival.

Special Rules for Junior Market Steer Show

8. **Top 420:** Each breed will be divided into weight groups for pre-judging. A judge will select the top 420 steers for premium sale. The distribution of the 420 sale lots by breed is below.



- 9. Weight: Steers must weigh a minimum 1,000 pounds.
 - a. Exhibitors must declare animal weight and breed during mobile check-in. The weight listed will become that animal's official declared weight to be used for weighing back and selling purposes.
 - b. After judging of each class is completed, all placing steers will be weighed before leaving the ring. Any steer weighing less than 95 percent, or more than 105 percent of its official declared weight will be disqualified. Steers showing more than normal fill, as determined at weighing time, will be sifted.
- **10. Exhibitor Back Numbers:** During judging, exhibitors must wear the correct back number corresponding with the Show entry number.
- **11. Feeding:** All steers must have been placed on feed by June 30, 2024 and the feeding period shall continue through opening day of the show.
- **12.** Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act: As required, in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Market Steer show shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct control, the entry was not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.



13. Clipping: Prior to arrival at the Show, steers must be pre-clipped to no more than 1/4" of hair on any part of the body, except the tail switch, (the tail switch being no more than 12" above the end of the cartilage of the tail) which may be ratted and balled or may be bobbed off. Only Scissors or cordless clippers may be used for touch-up prior to entering the show staging area. Steers will be checked for hair length during staging for each class. Steers found in violation of this rule will be eliminated and removed. The exhibitor will be eliminated from competition for the current show in the steer division.
1/4" hair requirement is strictly enforced. The decision made is final.

- 14. Trim Chutes: No trim chutes will be allowed on the show grounds during the Junior Show.
- 15. Grooming Material: No grooming material of any kind is allowed.
- **16. Drench Guns:** Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drenching tubes or any other method (by esophagus) is prohibited.
- **17. Steer Handling:** Steers that are unruly or require handling by more than one person will be disqualified. Nose leads are permitted during sifting or showing. Only Show officials will be allowed to assist exhibitors during sifting or judging.
- **18. Previously Auctioned Animals:** Steers identified as sold at auction in any major show are ineligible.



Special Rules for Junior Market Steer Show

- **19.** Nose Prints/DNA: Any steer may be nose printed or DNA tested at the request of the superintendent and/or Show Management.
- 20. Release: Steers not qualified for the Premium auction will be released according to the aforementioned schedule.



21. Classification: <u>Steers will be classified at the time of judging</u>. Breed classification will be submitted in the self/mobile check-in system. The breed must be declared upon check-in; however, final determination of breed classification will be made by classifiers appointed by the Show Management. Breed determination is based on visible steer characteristics only; there will be no registration papers, steer certificates or steer affidavits considered. The judgment of the sifting committee and classifiers is final and not subject to protest.



With the addition of the Other Cross I breed to Wave 1, all steers that classify out of breeds from Wave 1 will show in Wave 1.
 Any steer that leaves the grounds from Wave 1 will not be permitted to re-enter the grounds and will be considered disqualified.

- 22. Classifiers: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will have three classifiers who will determine the official breed classification of each steer. The judgment of classifiers is final and not subject to protest. The three classifiers are selected from recommendations from the following: one from the Breed Associations, one from a list furnished by the CEAs/ASTs, and one from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- **23. Sifting:** Per rule 14 of the General Rules and Regulations, the Show may appoint sifting committees to determine the eligibility of animals to compete prior to judging. Animals must be un-blanketed and ready for inspection by the sifting committee at the announced time of sifting. The sifting committee will eliminate any animal which, in its judgment, is not qualified to compete. At the committee's recommendation, the Show may require these animals to be removed from the grounds. The sifting committee's decisions are final, and protests will not be considered by the Show.
- 24. Horns: Steers must be dehorned.
- 25. Scurs: The presence of scurs will be allowed.
- 26. Health Certificate: None required.



27. Placing Steers: All placing steers are considered terminal and must be sold. The top 2 steers from each class will be required to walk through the auction ring and will be taken to NRG Arena at an appointed time by Show Management. All other placing steers must be received by the commission agency 30 minutes after the last breed show ends on the respective day of show. The exhibitor will be responsible for their project until the animal is received by the commission agency. Placing steers become the property of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo upon delivery to the commission agent. Any animal deemed unmerchantable by Show Management or the commission agent due to lameness, illness, blindness, carcass condemnation, etc. may not receive premiums for that animal.

Wave 1 Steers:



- 1st and 2nd place steers that are non-Breed Champions or Reserve Breed Champions and random drug tested steers will be transported to the Sales Pavilion after drug testing has been completed.
- Exhibitors of steers that place Breed Champion or Reserve Breed Champion in Wave 1 will need to report to the Superintendent's Office to receive stalling assignments for Wave 2.

Wave 2 Steers: All steers placing 2nd or higher in their class will be transported to the Sales Pavilion starting at 7 a.m. on Saturday, March 22nd. Exhibitors must be present prior to 7 a.m. to pick up their sale lot number and bring their steer to the staging area for hauling to the Sales Pavilion. Random drug tested steers will be transported to the Sales Pavilion after drug testing has been completed.

28. Non-Placing Steers: Exhibitors of non-placing steers have the option to sell their animals through the commission agent but are responsible for all fees involved. Animals should be in delivered to the commission agent in accordance with all representations required throughout the validation/ownership period. Steers become the property of the commission agent/buyer upon delivery to the commission agent. Any animal deemed unmerchantable by Show Management or the commission agent due to lameness, illness, blindness, carcass condemnation, etc. may not receive a market value for that animal.

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Steers

Pre-Judging: The 18 Breed Champion steers will compete for the Grand Champion Steer of the Show. Breed champion and reserve breed champion steer exhibitors are required to report to the main cattle arena on Friday, March 21 at 6 p.m. for pre-judging. At this time, each breed and reserve breed champion exhibitor will be presented one handler credential and two rodeo tickets. <u>Only one handler is allowed to accompany each breed and reserve breed champion steer into NRG Stadium. Handler must be a parent/guardian, direct family member or CEA/AST. No others will be allowed to serve as a handler.</u>

Grand and Reserve Champion Selection: Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Steers of the Show will be selected during the Rodeo performance in NRG Stadium. All Breed Champion and Reserve Champion Steers must be led into the stadium. After the Grand Champion Steer of the Show has been selected, the Reserve Champion Steer of the breed that furnished the Grand Champion Steer competes with the other Breed Champion steers for Reserve Grand Champion Steer of the Show. Exhibitors of Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Steers must care for animals until delivered to commission agency or taken into custody by HLSR Show Management.

Please keep in mind, registration papers, breeder affidavits, or other paperwork is not considered in the classification process. Eligibility for the class is determined *only* by visual appraisal, as evaluated by classifiers appointed by Show Management.

Classification Terms:

- Ideal Characteristics: Characteristics in combination that most accurately represent the breed
- Acceptable Breed Characteristics: Characteristics that represent the breed
- **Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:** Characteristics that are not reason for absolute disqualification but in combination with other discriminatory visual characteristics could lead to disqualification
- Absolute Disqualifications: Unfavorable visual characteristics resulting in removal from a breed division
- **Considerations:** The following will be considered at the discretion of the classification committee: birthmarks or scarring (due to hot iron branding, freeze branding, or injury-cased discoloration)

BRITISH TYPE

This group includes cattle that appear to be purebred Angus, Hereford, Polled Hereford, Red Angus, and Shorthorn.

Angus:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred

- Solid Black
- Polled (i.e. born without horns)
- Need to have a sheath that is round and perpendicular to the ground.
- Angus-type ear set, small to moderate ear size sitting high on the head and tying into the poll.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Continental Breed type structure (being coarse about his joints, not to be confused with big-boned cattle) and head.
- Bumps or a ridge where horns would be on a horned animal.
- Birthmarks or white hair in the switch should be reviewed for the skin color (black skin color is acceptable; white or pink skin is a disqualification)
- Non-*Angus*-type ear set (Ear set and excessive ear size as in Continental breeds)
- Large navels and angular sheaths

Hereford:

Ideal Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Hereford

- Some white on the back of both ears
- Red body with white face, white underline, some white on lover 1/3 of leg.
- Traditional feather on neck.

- Horned Herefords must show evidence of being dehorned. <u>Acceptable Breed Characteristics:</u> These characteristics are not necessarily desirable and in combination may be discriminating

- Dark red color
- Red neck
- Eye pigment.
- Solid red ear(s)
- Black hair in tail (or ear of animal).
- Freckling on nose/face.
- White above switch in tail
- White across the rump above the twist
- White on legs.

- White above the underline.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Solid white ear(s)

Absolute Disqualifications:

- White skin resulting in white hair above the underline or in the front of the navel (white on the navel is acceptable)
- White skin resulting in white hair on the leg, foot, or tail.
- Horns or Scurs.
- Brindle.
- Diluter color pattern.
- Dehorning scars.
- Double muscling.
- A defined ridge/bump running vertically from the center of the skull into the poll (i.e., TH Bump)

- Larger ear size
- Straight-line white markings on legs or tail above the switch.
- White above the hocks (on the outside and back side of rear legs).
- Excess pigment or color around the eyes.
- Red neck in combination with excess white on legs.
- Excessive line back.
- Coarse joints.
- Head:
- Dish
 - Excessive long head
 - Roman nose
 - Extreme muscle definition

Absolute Disqualifiers:

- Solid black nose
- Diluter color pattern
- Streaking of white from the feather off the shoulder
- Brindles
- Double muscling
- Any color pattern other than red or white (birthmarks excluded)
- Excessive black hair on legs.

Polled Hereford:

Ideal Breed Characteristics

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Polled Hereford

- Some white on the back of both ears
- Red body with white face, white underline, and some white on lower 1/3 of leg.
- Traditional feather on crest.
- Must be polled or have loose scurs.

<u>Acceptable Breed Characteristics:</u> These characteristics are not necessarily desirable and in combination may be discriminating.

- Dark red color
- Red neck
- Eye pigment
- Solid red ear(s)
- Black hair in tail (or ears of animal).
- Freckling on the nose/face.
- White above switch in tail.
- White across the rump above the twist.
- White on legs.
- White above the underline.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Solid white ear(s)
- Larger ear size.

Red Angus:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a Red Angus

- Solid red (shades may vary)
- Polled
- A blonde, light red (or mixed switch).
- Cattle may have black hair on the tail, muzzle, face, neck, and legs.
- Needs to have a sheath that is round and perpendicular to the ground.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Coarse joints (not to be confused with big boned cattle)
- Solid white switch
- Smut/gray nose pigmentation.

Shorthorns:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Shorthorn

- Red with white hair in tail switch.
- White with red hair or red pigment on ear, muzzle, anus, or tail.
- Any combination of red and white, with the red and white color pattern bleeding together.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Orange or light red color
- Black nose pigment
- Coarse head
- Coarse joints/structure.
- Solid red with red tail switch.

- Straight-line white marking on legs or tail above the switch
- White above hocks, on the outside and back side of rear legs
- Excess pigment or color around the eyes
- Red neck in combination with excess white on legs
- Excessive line back
- Coarse joints
- Head
 - Dish head
 - o Excessive long head
 - Roman nose
 - Extreme muscle definition.

Absolute Disqualifiers:

- Horn attachment to the skull
- Evidence of tampering with horns, (or dehorning scars).
- Solid black nose
- Diluter color pattern
- Streaking of white from the feather off the shoulder
- Brindles
- Double muscling
- Any color other than red or white (birthmarks excluded)
- Excessive black hair on legs.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Horns or scurs breaking through the skin
- White skin resulting in white hair above the underline or in front of the navel (white on navel is acceptable)
- White skin resulting in white on the leg or tail/switch.
- Black pigmentation of the skin (not to be confused with freckling on the nose or anus).
- Roaning
- Dehorning scars or evidence of dehorning
- Black skin on the nose.
- A defined ridge/bump running vertically from the center of the skull into the poll (i.e., TH Bump)

- Round muscle pattern.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Diluter color pattern (e.g., yellow or yellow roan).
- Black, blue roans or grays
- Brindle
- Solid white with no red pigment on the ears, tail, or anus
- Motley-face or brockle-face.
- Black hair (any location)

BRAHMAN TYPE


This group is sometimes called American Breeds. Physical evidence of Brahman background is important and includes ear length, ear shape, amount of hide, and hump/crest (Figs. 1 and 2)

American Breeds Cross (ABC):

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Any color (or color pattern)
- Progression of importance to include Bos indicusinfluenced head (longer from eye-to-nose than from eyeto-poll), eye (e.g. almond shaped), ear of adequate length (slightly drooping, slightly tapering at the end, and opening down and forward), showing Bos indicus-influenced sheath
- Crest (or evidence of hump).

Brahman Cross:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a 50 percent Brahman

- A prominent hump beginning at the shoulder and going forward but must angle back down to the neck to create a hump – the width of the hump base should wrap around the neck or shoulder and not be a crest.
- Any color (or color pattern).

Brangus:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred black Brangus

- Solid black with no white above the underline or in front of the navel
- Polled (scurs and slick spots acceptable).
- Progression of importance to include Bos indicus-influence head, eve, and ear of moderate length, slightly pointed, drooping, and opening down and forward.
- With adequate Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics (sheath score if of less important).
- Shows some evidence of a crest.

Santa Gertrudis Cross:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a 50 percent purebred Santa Gertrudis with adequate Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics

- Any color pattern of black, red, yellow, or orange
- Moderate crest (no definite hump).
- Moderate dewlap development
- Moderate length of ear (slightly drooping) and opening forward.
- Sheath score of 2 to 5.

Simbrah:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- A sheath score of 2 or greater
- With Bos inducus head, eye, and ear characteristics (sheath score is of less important).
- Stocking legs.
- Bald, blaze or streak face or mottled-face
- Solid black, solid red, or solid dun/tan combination with white (or any of the previously listed colors).

Brindle color pattern with white markings.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

A sheath score of 1

With adequate Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics (sheath score is of less importance) Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

Bos taurus head

- Bos taurus short ear
- Bos taurus eve
- Sheath score of 1
- Slick neck (lack of crest or evidence of hump)
- Absolute Disgualifications:
- A combination of Bos taurus head, eye, and ear
- With adequate Bos Indicus head, eye, and ear, sheath/navel should represent Brahman characteristics. Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

Sheath score of 2 or less.

- Absolute Disgualifications:
- A crest with an inadequate hump (lack of hump).
- Inadequate Bos indicus head, eye, and/or ear.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Inadequate Bos indicus-influence head, eye, and ear characteristics
- Brown dilution over ribs, fore flank, twist, and muzzle
- Sheath score of 1

Absolute Disgualifications:

- Horns
- Dehorning scars
- White above the underline or in front of the navel
- White on the legs, feet, or tail
- Any brindle

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Straight, pendulous sheath
- Sheath score of 1
- Brindle colorina _
- Excessive white.

Absolute Disgualifications:

- Absence of any visible Santa Gertrudis characteristics Absence of Bos indicus-influence head, eye, ear, or
- sheath Smokes, silvers, grays
- A Bos taurus head
- A Bos taurus ear
- A Bos taurus eye
- Brindle color pattern with no white.
- Absolute Disgualifications:
- A combination of Bos taurus head, ear, eye, and sheath
- Roans
- Gravs _
- Smut
- Silver
- Solid yellow.

CONTINENTAL or EXOTIC TYPE

Included here are Charolais (half-blood and higher), Limousin, Maine-Anjou (half or higher), and Simmental (purebred).

Charolais Cross:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit characteristics of a 50 percent purebred Charolais.

- White, yellow gray, or silver
- Expression of diluter gene
- Minimal painting or spotting (less than 20 percent)
 Skunk tail, line back, baldy.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Painting or spotting (more than 20 percent)
- Double Muscling
- Frail bone work and frail general appearance
- Light red color or orange
- Short, stubby head
- Overly refined, narrow head
- Moderate black pigmentation (e.g., skin around eyes, nose, ears, and anus)
- Moderate dappling
- Absolute Disqualifications:
- Black, red, dark smuts

Limousin:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a Limousin - Head character
 - Eye(s) Deeper socket, prominent brow, light pigmentation around eye on reds.
 - Poll Typically have a wider poll.
 - Ear(s) Tends to be smaller and set lower on head.
 - Muzzle Tends to be short.
 - Sheath Tends to have a forward angle.
- Legs/foot
 - Tends to be smooth-jointed.
 - Tends to be flat-boned.
 - Tends to be smooth-shouldered.
- Acceptable color: Solid black red/orange, light red, charcoal black, chocolate black, orange, bald-face, or brockle-face.
- Brindle color pattern will be allowed providing it does not extend below the mid-rib of the body.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

Maine-Anjou:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Solid Red
- Solid Black
- Red and White
- Black and White
- Heavy Skeletal Structure
- Cattle may have black hair on the tail, muzzle, face, neck, and legs.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics




Figure 3. Maine-Anjou brindling guidelines

- Slight brindling on the topline and down toward the loin edge (Fig. 3).
- Signs of feathering on the neck.

- Showing no diluter gene (unless solid white).
- Excessive painting or spotting.
- Brindles/brindling, roans.
- Excessive dappling.
- Excessive black pigmentation (e.g., skin around eyes, nose ears, or anus)

- Head character issues (i.e., roman nose), coarse joints/skeleton
- Coarse open shoulders
- Pointed poll
- Bigger and more elongated ears/high ear set.
- Pencil sheath (e.g., hanging straight down).
- Excessive crest
- Yellow color
- Red cattle with black nose
- Diluter gene.
- Excessive dappling.

Absolute Disqualifications

- Stocking leg(s) with white extending above the dew claw.
- Brindle below the mid-rib
- Spotting above the underline.
- Roans, gray, silver, or white.
- Monkey/parrot mouth
- Shows an excessive influence of another breed other than Limousin.

Absolute Disqualification

- Brindle (down past the topline, extending onto the rib and down).
- Roans.
- Diluter Color Pattern (e.g., yellow, orange, gray).
- Appears to be more than 50% any other breed.

CROSS DIVISIONS

Simmental:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit characteristics of a purebred Simmental - Typically, longer head and larger ears.

- Lower ear set.
- Heavy skeletal structure.
- Acceptable color patters:
 - Solid black or red.
 - o Red and white, black and white, or yellow and white.
 - \circ Bald, blaze, or streak-face.
 - Some painting above the underline (no bleeding of colors) (i.e., spotting)

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Excessive spotting.
- Excessive white above the underline.

- Motley, brockle, star, or diamond-shaped white in the head.
- Excessive white on the tail above the switch.
- Refined skeletal makeup.
- Absolute Disqualifications:
- Shows excessive influence of another breed type other than Simmental.
- Silver, smoke, white, smut, gray, or any combination of these.
- Solid yellow or orange.
- Brindle.
- Roans.
- Skunk tail.

Black Cross Division:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must have a black body cavity defined as the area behind the top of the shoulder blade down to the point of the shoulder and above the belly line.
- White in the body cavity is only acceptable in the following instances:
 - White is a continuation of the feathering.
 - White is at the fore and/or rear flanks (similar to Hereford pattern).
 - White spotting not collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side
 cannot be all on the same side.

Red Cross Division:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must have a red body cavity defined as the area behind the top of the shoulder blade down to the point of the shoulder and above the belly line.
- White in the body cavity is only acceptable in the following instances:
 - White is a continuation of the feathering.
 - White is at the fore and/or rear flanks (similar to Hereford pattern).
 - White spotting not collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side
 cannot be all on the same side.

Other Cross Divisions:

- Steers of any coloration pattern are acceptable.

 Skunk tail cattle are permitted, provided the white above the rectum does not exceed the amount of white spotting allowed (e.g., basketball size).

Absent of diluter gene.

- Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:
- Slight brindling is allowed, provided is does not extend below the fore and rear flanks.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Roans.
- Excessive white in the body cavity collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side cannot be all on the same side.
- Skunk tail cattle are permitted, provided the white above the rectum does not exceed the amount of white spotting allowed (e.g., basketball size).

Absent of diluter gene.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Slight brindling is allowed, provided is does not extend below the fore and rear flanks.

<u>Absolute Disqualifications:</u> - Roans.

Excessive white in the body cavity collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side – cannot be all on the same side.




Figure 5. Red cross cattle (and other examples)

CLASSIFICATION GLOSSARY

American breeds: Breeds created in the U.S. by interbreeding existing breeds, including at least one tropically adapted breed (most often American Brahman).

Bald-face: Appearance when white covers most of the face.

Blaze or streak-face: A wide strip of white down the face to the muzzle.

Bos indicus (zebu): Sub-species of cattle originating in South Asia—has a prominent hump on top or in front of shoulder.

Bos taurus: Sub-species of cattle, originated in West Asia but is usually called European.

Brindle: A streaking of black, brown, or white on the body of the steer (i.e., tiger stripe).

British/English: Cattle originating in the British Isles—Angus, Hereford, and Shorthorn are most plentiful in the U.S.

Brockle or motley-face: Red or black spotting on a white or bald face.

Continental: Breeds originating in Continental Europe, sometimes called European or Exotic.

Diluter gene: A gene that determines color. Cattle that carry both copies of the gene will appear white. Non-diluter cattle will appear black or dark red, whereas those carrying a single diluter gene will appear gray or yellow.

DISCRIMINATORY BREED CHARACTERISTICS

Characteristics that are not reason for absolute disqualification but in combination with other discriminatory visual characteristics could lead to disqualification.

Horned: Horns are solidly attached to the skull (or there is evidence of dehorning).

Painting: Large white markings covering a major portion of the steer.

Pigmentation: Dark skin coloring on the points of the steer (e.g., eyes, nose, ears, anus, tail).

Polled: Naturally hornless.

Purebred: Showing visual characteristics of a particular breed and none of any other breed.

Scurs: Horny tissue or rudimentary horn(s) attached to skin but not the skull.

Sheath score: Scoring system from 1 to 5 based on the length of the sheath (i.e., 1 = little sheath; 5 = excess sheath).

Smut: Dark gray color pattern.

Spotting: White spots on the steer.

SUMMARY

In the commercial beef industry, most cattle are sorted by visual characteristics into numerous groups for marketing purposes. Similarly, during livestock shows, participating steers are sorted into breed classes based on visual characteristics. In most classes there are few factors that will absolutely disqualify an animal, which are usually easily identified. Instead, most disqualified animals have more than one subjectively evaluated discriminatory characteristic.

Steers should be selected and shown based only on their visual appearance because that is how they will be evaluated for classification. Remember: Classifiers are asked to exercise their judgment. If a steer is classified out, it does not mean that the classifier or anyone else is accusing someone of lying, cheating, or being unethical—nor does it mean that the steer cannot be the breed that the producer/rancher says it is. Look at breed classification as the first stage of judging. Do not be too upset if the classifier makes (or he or she is perceived to have made) a mistake. It is all a matter of judgment.

JUNIOR STEER CARCASS CONTEST

Superintendent – Dr. Jeff Savell, College Station, TX Assistant Superintendent – Dr. Davey Griffin, College Station, TX

The first and second place steers in each class of each breed will be harvested for carcass information. These animals will be sold through the premium sale and slaughtered as a group.

MINIMUM CARCASS STANDARDS

- 1. Minimum and maximum hot carcass weight, 600 to 1,000 pounds, respectively.
- 2. Minimum fat thickness .25 inches.
- 3. Minimum ribeye area 11.0 square inches.
- 4. Maximum USDA Yield Grade 3.5.
- 5. Maximum USDA maturity A^{100} .
- 6. Minimum USDA marbling requirement Slight 00 .
- 7. Minimum USDA Quality Grade $Select^{00}$.
- 8. "Dark Cutters," if severe enough, will be disqualified. (Severe dark cutting is defined as sufficient to result in at least one full-grade reduction in the USDA quality grade).
- 9. Carcasses with excessive bruises and evidence of tampering or questionable injections will be disqualified.

Steers meeting these standards will be evaluated and placed 1st through 10th with the following moneys being paid:

Special Rules for Scramble Steer Show

- 1. **Rules:** This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, the Junior Market Steer Show Rules, and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- Entry: Scramble classes are limited to 2024 Calf Scramble certificate winners. Scramble steer entry fees have been waived. Calf Scramble exhibitors are strongly encouraged to enter their Scramble Steer in the Junior Market Steer Show with an entry fee of \$35. However, Calf Scramble exhibitors are only allowed one entry in the Junior Market Steer Show and it must be their Scramble Steer.
- 3. **Quality Counts Verification:** Exhibitors are required to pass the Quality County Verification test for show eligibility. Entries will not be accepted without the verification code for each exhibitor. The test can be found at https://agrilife.org/qualitycounts/.
- 4. Stalling: To stall together at Houston, groups MUST arrive and remain in line together at Airport Blvd. NO assignments will be made for steers that are coming later. Steers will be counted on the trailers. <u>The Airport Boulevard staging area will remain open beginning on Saturday, March 15 at 5 p.m. and Tuesday, March 18 at 5 p.m. for trailers to be staged.</u> The first three rows of cattle stalls on the north side of the barn (rows nearest to the dock and wash racks) will be assigned to those exhibitors arriving first. Once these three rows are assigned, assignments will be given starting on the far end of the stalls (closest to commercial exhibits) and will work back towards the dock.

Special Rules for Scramble Steer Show

- 5. **Arrival:** Scramble steers will move in with the Jr. Market Steers starting at 1 a.m. on Sunday, March 16 and Wednesday, March 19. All trailers with Scramble or Jr. Market Steers must report to Airport Blvd. for staging.
- 6. Health Certificate: None Required.
- 7. Validation: Steers must be validated in the TX 4-H and FFA Steer Validation Program. Electronic ear tags will be checked on Sunday, March 16 and Wednesday, March 19 from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. The EID on scramble steers MUST match the EID that was originally provided to the Scramble Office. Any steer may be nose printed or DNA tested at the request of the Superintendent and/or Show Management. Show Management will make the final decision regarding any potential disqualification. Animals that need to be retagged may do so between 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. on Sunday, March 16 for Wave 1 and Wednesday, March 19 for Wave 2 at the Veterinarian Station by the Main Arena in NRG Center.
- 8. **Self/Mobile-Check-In:** Check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animal. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. The last 6 digits of the animal's state validation tag number
 - b. The animals declared weight
 - c. The animals declared breed

The Exhibitor will be responsible for making sure the information entered in accurate and if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary.

9. **Ear Tags:** Steers must have a TX State Validation ear tag. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. Exhibitor numbers must be worn during classification, sifting and judging. If an animal is missing the TX State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify the Superintendent immediately upon arrival.




10. **Clipping:** Prior to arrival at the Show, steers must be pre-clipped to no more than 1/4" of hair on any part of the body, except the tail switch, (the tail switch being no more than 12" above the end of the cartilage of the tail) which may be ratted and balled or may be bobbed off. Only Scissors or cordless clippers may be used for touch-up prior to entering the show staging area. Steers will be checked for hair length during staging for each class. Steers found in violation of this rule will be eliminated and removed. The exhibitor will be eliminated from competition for the current show in the steer division. 1/4" hair requirement is strictly enforced. The decision made is final.

- 11. Trim Chutes: No trim chutes will be allowed on the show grounds during the Junior Show.
- 12. Grooming Material: No grooming material of any kind is allowed (this includes conditioner).
- 13. Horns: Steers must be dehorned.

14. **Classification:** All scramble steers arriving in Wave 1 will show as Wave 1 Scramble Steers. All steers arriving in Wave 2 will show as Wave 2 Scramble Steers. Any steer that leaves the grounds from Wave 1 will not be permitted to re-enter the grounds and will be considered disqualified.

- 15. Weight: Steers must weigh a minimum 1,000 pounds.
 - a. Exhibitors must declare animal weight and breed during mobile check-in. The weight listed will become that animal's official declared weight to be used for weighing back and selling purposes.
 - b. After judging of each class is completed, all placing steers will be weighed before leaving the ring. Any steer weighing less than 95 percent, or more than 105 percent of its official declared weight will be disqualified. Steers showing more than normal fill, as determined at weighing time, will be sifted.



Special Rules for Scramble Steer Show

- 16. **Classes:** Scramble steers in each wave will all be shown together, there will be no breed divisions. Classes will be broken by weight. Final classes will be determined by the Show Superintendent and are not subject to change. Any steer reporting for a class other than the class determined by official breed classification and declared weight will not be allowed to show.
- 17. **Exhibitor Back Numbers:** During judging, exhibitors must wear the correct back number corresponding with the Show entry number.
- 18. **Steer Handling:** Steers that are unruly or require handling by more than one person will be disqualified. Nose leads are permitted during sifting or showing. Only Show officials will be allowed to assist exhibitors during sifting or judging.
- 19. **Showmanship:** Showmanship will be judged during the Scramble Steer Show and awarded at the Scramble Steer Awards Ceremony and Donor Social.

Special Rules for Junior Market Lamb Show

- 1. **Rules:** This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- 2. **Guaranteed Premiums:** The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has established a Schedule of Guaranteed Premiums (shown below), which must be accepted by all Junior Market Show exhibitors who win ribbons in the individual classes. In return for the Guaranteed Premium, winning animals become the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and will be sold at their respective Junior Market Auction.

*Top three exhibitors from each class are *required* to walk through the auction.

*All exhibitors making the sale are strongly encouraged to attend.

*Only first through third placing exhibitors from each class are required to attend the auction meeting.

Special Rules for Junior Market Lamb Show

- 3. Validation: Lambs must be validated in the TX 4-H and FFA Lamb Validation Program, only wether lambs are eligible to be validated and shown in the Junior Market Lamb Show. Show Management will make the final decision regarding any potential disqualification. Animals that need to be retagged may do so between 7 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on the day of move-in at the East Arena of the NRG Center.
- 4. **Self/Mobile-Check-In:** Check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animal. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. The last 6 digits of the animal's state validation tag number
 - b. The animals declared weight
 - c. The animals declared breed

The Exhibitor will be responsible for making sure the information entered in accurate and if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary.

- 5. Weight Breaks: Superintendents will break classes once check-in is complete. There will be no preset weight breaks. Exhibitors that do not check-in prior to 1:30 p.m. on March 11 are ineligible. Southdown and Dorper lambs must weigh a minimum of 90 pounds. Other lambs must weigh a minimum of 100 pounds.
 - a. Exhibitors must have check-in completed by 2:30 p.m. on Tuesday, 11. The weight submitted at check-in will become that animal's official declared weight to be used for weighing back and official selling purposes. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to ensure weight and breed declared at the time of self/mobile check-in is accurate for their animal entry prior to the close of check-in.
 - b. During judging, all lambs pulled for classification (Finewool, Finewool Cross, Southdown and Dorper) or judging (Medium Wools) will be weighed. Any lamb that weighs more than 5 pounds above its official declared weight will be disqualified. Any lamb weighing less than 90 pounds (Southdown and Dorper) or 100 pounds (other lambs), will be disqualified. While inside the judging arena, lambs shall not be filled or altered in any way.
 - c. First and second place class winners will be re-weighed prior to Breed Champion drives. Should a first or second place winner weigh out at this time, the animal will retain its placing but will be ineligible to compete for Breed Champion. If the first-place class winner weighs out, the second-place class winner will then advance to compete for Breed Champion honors. No other lambs will advance.
- 6. **Top 330:** Each breed will be divided into three weight groups for prejudging. A judge will select the top 330 lambs for premium sale. A distribution of numbers to compete for the 330 sale places are:

- 7. Ear Tags: State validation tags will be used for 2025. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. If an animal is missing the TX State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify the Superintendent immediately upon arrival.
- 8. Exhibitor Back Numbers: During judging, exhibitors must wear the correct back number corresponding with the Show entry number.
- 9. Feeding: All lambs must have been placed on feed by Oct. 31, 2024 and the feeding period shall continue until the opening day of Show.
- **10.** Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act: As required, in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Market Lamb show shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct control, the entry was not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.

Special Rules for Junior Market Lamb Show

- **11.** Country of Origin: To meet Country of Origin labeling requirements, entry in the Junior Market Lamb show serves as verification by the exhibitor that the entry has been bred, born and raised entirely in the United States.
- **12.** Clipping: Lambs must be slick shorn and of uniform length from knee and hock up at time of arrival. There will be no shearing allowed on show grounds. Only hand shearers and cordless clippers may be used for touch ups.
- 13. Scales: Exhibitors are not allowed to bring portable scales into the building. Scales for weighing are furnished.
- 14. Equipment: All feed, tack, and equipment must be stored above pens. No trimming/blocking stands, show rails or blow dryers are allowed.
- 15. Grooming: No grooming materials are allowed.
- 16. Unethical Fitting: Per rule 30.a. of the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, unethical fitting means <u>any</u> attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by <u>any</u> unnatural means. Unethical fitting includes the application of <u>any</u> substance to <u>any</u> part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that species. Injection, drenching or application of <u>any</u> substance per rectum is prohibited. Further, the application of <u>any</u> substance to or near the tail or anus is prohibited. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified and exhibitors may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- 17. Health Certificates: None required.
- **18.** Drench Guns: Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drenching tubes or any other method (by esophagus) is prohibited.
- 19. Terminal Show: All entries arriving must be sold, including sifted, non-placing and ribbon-winning lambs, according to the Show procedure. Exhibitors will take proper care of all animals until the animals are delivered on the truck of the commission agent. Failure to do so will result in the forfeiture of guaranteed premiums. Exhibitors of non-placing animals will be responsible for a handling fee to be charged by the commission agent. Animals should be delivered to the commission agent in accordance with all representations required throughout the validation/ownership period. Any animal deemed unmerchantable by Show Management due to lameness, illness, blindness, etc. may not receive a market value for that animal.
- **20. Ownership:** Market animals do not become property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo until that animal can advance no further in the competition.
- 21. Stalling: The Airport Boulevard staging area will open beginning on Monday, March 10th at 5 p.m. Trailers will not be staged prior to these times.
- **22. Bedding:** One bag of shavings per animal will be provided. Shaving will be distributed at the Airport Blvd. Staging Lot prior to release of animals for move-in. Additional shavings may be purchased once the Feed Store opens at NRG Center. In an effort to free up pen space, outside shavings are prohibited. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- **23. Pre-Penning:** All junior market lambs and meat goats will be pre-penned at the discretion of the Show Management. Penning requests will not be accepted or required. Entries from each county, 4-H club and FFA Chapter, will be assigned pens together in the same area. Each county or chapter will have designated pens but may be required to share pens with other counties or chapters. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring panels to separate animals if needed. Pen dimensions are 6X6.
- 24. Companion Animals: Only animals entered in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] are allowed on show grounds. All other animals, excluding entered cow-calf pairs, will be removed per Show Management.
- **25. Classification:** Breed classification will be submitted to the kiosk self-check-in which must be completed by 2:30 p.m. on March 11. The breed must be declared upon check-in; however, final determination of breed classification will be made by classifiers appointed by the Show Management. Finewools classified will advance to Finewool Cross and Finewool Cross, Southdown and Dorper classified will advance to the Medium Wool Division. The judgment of the sifting committee and classifiers is final and not subject to protest.

Please keep in mind, registration paper, breeder affidavits, or other paperwork is not considered in the classification process. Eligibility for the class is determined only by visual appraisal, as evaluated by classifiers appointed by Show Management.



CLASSIFICATION TERMS:

- Acceptable: Characteristics that represent the breed.
- **Discriminatory:** Characteristics that are not reason for absolute disqualification but in combination with other discriminatory visual characteristics could lead to removal from a breed division.
- Absolute Disqualifications: Unfavorable visual characteristics resulting in removal from a breed division.
- Scur: Horn growth that is not completely attached to the skull.
- **Birthmark:** Dark pigmented skin with dark fiber present within the margins of the pigmentation.

Finewool:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Rambouillet, Delaine, Debouillet, or a cross between these breeds.
- Silky, white face.
- Silky ears, medium to moderate in length.
- Soft pelt.
- Yellow to white hooves (neutral).
- Black pads on hooves and black dew claws.
- Minimal amount of black streaking in the hooves. Less than 1/8 of cumulative hoof surface.
- Nose should be neutral to pink in color.
- May be polled or horned. Horns must be indicative of acceptable Finewool breeds.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- Moderate amounts of brown or black spots in the skin and/or wool.
- Moderate freckling or pigmented skin (brown or black) on the ears, eyes, nose and lips.
- Black eyelashes.
- Excessive black streaking in hooves more than 1/8 cumulative of hoof surface.
- Birthmarks.

Finewool Cross:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- The standard for Finewool Crosses is a Finewool Ewe (Rambouillet, Delaine, Debouillet, or a cross between these breeds) bred to a Hamshiore or Suffolk Rams only.
- Soft pelt which is characteristic of ½ blood wool (60's-62's spinning count).
- Face and ears should be soft and silky.
- Spotting and/or brown face and ears.
- Moderate spotting and/or brown legs not extending above the rear flank or fore flank.
- Wool must be present below the hocks on the rear legs; wool below the knees on the front legs is not necessary.
- Reddish, rust colored legs are acceptable.
- Birthmarks.
- Scurs are acceptable.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

 Excessive black spotting in the skin above the knees and hocks.

Absolute Disgualifications

- Excessively coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Excessive coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks, and/or down the front and/or rear legs.
- Excessive brown or black spots in the skin and/or wool.
- Excessive freckling or pigmented skin (brown or black) on the ears, eyes, nose and lips.
- Brown or black spots in hairline above the hooves to the dew claw.
- Solid black toe or hooves.
- Black lambs.
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.
- Head, ear and/or horn shape non-typica to the Finewool breeds (Rambouillet, Delaine, Debouillet, or a cross between these breeds).

Finewools classed out will be assigned to either the Finewool Cross or Medium Wool breeds at the determination of the classifiers.

- Moderate black or chocolate brown color on face, ears, and legs (including wool).
- Moderately coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- White-faced or ring-eyed crosses.
- Moderately coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks, and/or down the front and/or rear legs.
- Horns are discriminatory on finewool crosses (except classed out finewools with horns indicative of acceptable finewool breeds).

Absolute Disgualifications

- Excessive black or dark chocolate brown color on face, ears, and legs (including wool).
- Excessively coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Excessive coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks, and/or down the front and/or rear legs.
- Total absence of wool on rear legs.
- Black lambs.
- Evidence of other breeds including, but not limited to Dorset and Southdown breed types (head and ear shapes of Dorset and/or Southdown).
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.

Junior Market Lamb Classification Guidelines

Southdown:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Hair color on muzzle should be mouse-colored, gray to brown and match color on legs and pasterns.
- Nostril pigmentation may be black to purplish-gray.
- Head and muzzle should be broad and proportional to body.
- Head of moderate length and in proportion to body.
- Ears of moderate length, in proportion to body, and covered with short hair or wool.
- Black hooves.
- Slight chalk around eyes.
- Slight chalk around muzzle.
- Spot or speckles in the skin only when shorn.
- Birthmarks.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- Solid white color or dark chocolate color on muzzle and/or head.
- Coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Predominately pink nose with few black spots.
- Excessive black pigmentation on ears.
- No hair or wool on ears.
- Scurs.
- Absence of wool between scur areas.
- Stiped hooves.
- Reddish, rust colored hair above hoof to pastern.
- Black fibers in wool outside of birthmark.

Dorper:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Must be a Dorper or White Dorper.
- Conformation: long, deep, wide body with well sprung ribs and excellent muscling.
- Color: Dorper white sheep with black limited to head, neck, and forequarters not below the knee or behind the heart girth; White Dorper – white sheep.
- Must have at least 1/3 hair primarily on belly, forearm, and britch.
- 100% hair below the knees and hocks.
- 100% hair forward of poll.
- Moderate size ear with no wool covering.
- Head should be strong, bold with a deep jaw.
- Polled or small horns or scurs.
- Spots or speckled pigment in the skin only when shorn.
- Black spots above the hoof line and below the dewclaw.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- Tall, leggy, shallow, and/or narrow-bodied lambs.
- A limited amount of dark fibered spots on body and underline behind heart girth not to exceed a cumulative total of the size of a softball.
- A white sheep with brown or red colored speckles in the covering, confined to the head and neck.
- Excessive wool covering more than 2/3 of body (belly, forearm, and britch).
- Wool forward of poll.
- Heavy horns.

Absolute Disgualifications

- All wool or very little evidence of hair on belly, forearm or britch.
 - Wool below the knees or hocks.
 - Wool on the ears.
 - Excessive amount of black fibered spots on body and underline behind heart girth exceeding a cumulative total of the size of a softball.
 - Black below the knee/hock to the dewclaw.
 - Tri-colored sheep
 - A white sheep with black hooves (stripes or solid) and/or black on nose.
 - Solid brown, red, rust colored head.
 - Strong breed characteristics of breeds other than Dorper or White Dorper, including but not limited to characteristics such as long pendulous ears and long narrow muzzle.
 - Head, ear shape non-typical of the Dorper or White Dorper breed.
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.
- Evidence of color alterations.

- Absolute Disqualifications
 - Speckled face, ears, or legs.
 Horps
 - Horns.
 White hoove
 - White hooves.
 - Intentional alteration of hair color or skin pigmentation.
 - Total pink pigmentation of nostrils.
 - Black lambs.
 - Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
 - Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.
 - Excessive ear size and length not in proportion to head.
 - Head, ear shape non-typical to the Southdown breed.

Junior Market Lamb Classification Guidelines

Medium Wool:

This class generally includes the Suffolk and Hampshire breeds, plus all lambs that do not fit into the Finewool, Finewool Cross, Southdown, or Dorper breed classes.

Applicants must be Junior Market Lamb Show exhibitors participating in the 2025 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. The recipient will be announced following opening ceremonies of the Lamb & Goat Show on Wednesday, March 12.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States, of good character and meet all requirements as specified in the application, including their attending an accredited TX public or private high school, and meeting academic minimums. Applicants must plan to attend a college or university within the state of TX in pursuit of a bachelor's degree. Applicants are evaluated on the basis of academics, leadership/community involvement, and financial need.

http://www.rodeohouston.com/Educational-Support/Scholars/Apply. Supporting documents must be uploaded at the time of application. Incomplete applications will not be considered. Online applications will open on December 16, 2024 and are due by January 31, 2025 at 7:59 p.m. A school official will be required to complete a digital form for each applicant. This form must be submitted online by February 7, 2025, at 4:59 PM. There are no extensions or exceptions to either deadline.

Applicants will be interviewed by a scholarship selection committee in the Show offices.

JUNIOR LAMB CARCASS CONTEST

Superintendent – Dr. Jeff Savell - College Station, TX Assistant Superintendent – Ray R. Riley - College Station, TX

The first and second place lambs in each class of each breed will be slaughtered for carcass information. These animals will be sold through the premium sale and slaughtered as a group.

MINIMUM CARCASS STANDARDS

- 1. Minimum and maximum for carcass weight, 45 to 100 pounds, respectively.
- 2. Minimum and maximum adjusted fat thickness at the 12th rib, 10 inches to .30 inches, respectively.
- 3. Maximum USDA Yield Grade, 3.4. The USDA Yield Grade will be determined according to USDA (1994) grading
- standards. USDA Yield Grade = 0.4 + (10 x adjusted fat thickness, inches)
- 4. Estimated percent boneless, closely trimmed retail cuts (%BCTRC) from the leg, loin, rack, and shoulder is used in ranking.

Prediction Equation: %BCTRC = 49.936 - (.0848 X hot carcass weight, pounds)

- (4.376 X adjusted fat thickness, 12th rib, inches)

- (3.530 X body wall thickness, inches)
- + (2.456 X ribeye area, square inches).
- 5. Carcass must be of lamb maturity.
- 6. Minimum USDA Quality grade must be Choice-minus.
- 7. Carcass shall be free of serious bruises ("old", not recent), free of injection sites on the more valuable carcass parts leg, loin, rack and shoulder (neck excluded) and free of any evidence of surgical altering of the live lamb.

Lambs achieving the above standards will be evaluated and placed 1st through 10th and the following awards will be given.

Special Rules for Junior Market Goat Show

- 1. Rules: This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listing in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- 2. Guaranteed Payments: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has established a schedule of Guaranteed Payments (shown below), which must be accepted by all Junior Market Show exhibitors who win ribbons in the individual classes. In return for the Guaranteed Payment, winning animals become the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and will be sold at their respective Junior Market Auction.

Special Rules for Junior Market Goat Show

- 4. Validation: Market Goats must be validated in the TX 4-H and FFA Validation Program, only wether goats are eligible to be validated and shown in the Junior Market Goat Show. Show Management will make the final decision regarding any potential disqualification. Animals that need to be retagged may do so between 7 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. on the day of move-in at the East Arena of the NRG Center.
- 5. Self-Check-In: New for this year, check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animal. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. The last 6 digits of the animal's state validation tag number
 - b. The animals declared weight
 - c. The animals declared breed

The Exhibitor will be responsible for making sure the information entered in accurate and if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary.

- 6. Weight Breaks: Superintendents will break classes once check-in is complete. There will be no preset weight breaks. Exhibitors that do not check-in at the kiosk prior to 2:30 p.m. on March 11. Goats must weigh between 65 and 120 pounds.
 - a. Exhibitors must have check-in completed by 2:30 p.m. on March 11. The weight submitted at check-in will become that animal's official declared weight to be used for weighing back and official selling purposes. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to ensure weight and breed declared at the time of self/mobile check-in is accurate for their animal entry prior to the close of check-in.
 - b. All market goats pulled for placing considerations will be weighed back. Any goat that weighs more than 4 pounds above its official declared weight will be disqualified. (Goats can weigh 124 pounds at weigh back if their check-in weight was the maximum allowed weight or 120 pounds.) Any goat weighing less than 65 pounds at time of weigh back will be disqualified. While inside the judging arena, animals shall not be filled or altered in any way.
 - c. First and second place class winners will be re-weighed prior to Division Champion drives. Should a first or second place winner weigh out at this time, the animal will retain its placing but will be ineligible to compete for Division Champion. If the first-place class winner weighs out, the second-place class winner will then advance to compete for Division Champion honors. No other goats will advance.
- 7. Top 180: Goats will be divided into twelve classes. The top fifteen goats in each class will qualify for sale.
- 8. Ear Tags: State validation tags will be used for 2025. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. If an animal is missing the TX State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify a Superintendent immediately upon arrival.
- 9. Exhibitor Back Numbers: During judging, exhibitors must wear the correct back number corresponding with the Show entry number.
- **10. Feeding:** All goats must have been placed on feed by October 31, 2024 and the feeding period shall continue through opening day of the Show.
- **11. Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act:** As required, in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Market Goat show shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct control, the entry was not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.
- **12.** Country of Origin: To meet Country of Origin labeling requirements, entry in the Junior Market Goat show serves as verification by the exhibitor that the entry has been bred, born and raised entirely in the United States.
- 13. Horns: If horned, the horns must be tipped (not less than the diameter of a dime at the end).
- 14. Clipping: Goats must be slick shorn and of uniform length from the knee and hock up prior to arrival. "Blocking" or fitting in an attempt to alter or enhance a goat's appearance is not allowed. There will be no shearing allowed on show grounds. Only hand shearers and cordless clippers may be used for touch ups.
- 15. Scales: Exhibitors are not allowed to bring portable scales into the building. Scales for weighing are furnished.

Special Rules for Junior Market Goat Show

16. Equipment: All feed, tack, and equipment must be stored above pens. No trimming/blocking stands, show rails or blow dryers are allowed.

- 17. Grooming: No grooming materials are allowed.
- 19. Unethical Fitting: Per rule 30.a. of the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, unethical fitting means <u>any</u> attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by <u>any</u> unnatural means. Unethical fitting includes the application of <u>any</u> substance to <u>any</u> part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that species. Injection, drenching or application of <u>any</u> substance per rectum is prohibited. Further, the application of <u>any</u> substance to or near the tail or anus is prohibited. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified and exhibitors may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- 19. Health Certificates: None required.
- **20.** Drench Guns: Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drenching tubes or any other method (by esophagus) is prohibited.
- **21. Bedding:** One bag of shavings per animal will be provided. Shaving will be distributed at the Airport Blvd. Staging Lot prior to release of animals for move-in. Additional shavings may be purchased once the Feed Store opens at NRG Center. In an effort to free up pen space, outside shavings are prohibited. This rule will be strictly enforced
- **22. Pens:** Exhibitors will be asked to share pens with other exhibitors. Exhibitors may wish to bring panels which can be used to subdivide existing pens.
- 23. Terminal Show: All entries arriving must be sold, including sifted, non-placing and ribbon goats, according to Show procedure. Exhibitors will take proper care of all animals until the animals are delivered on the truck of the commission agent. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of guaranteed premiums. Exhibitors of non-placing animals will be responsible for a handling fee to be charged by the commission agent. Animals should be in delivered to the commission agent in accordance with all representations required throughout the validation/ownership period. Any animal deemed unmerchantable by Show Management due to lameness, illness, blindness, etc. may not receive a market value for that animal.
- 24. Ownership: Market animals do not become property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo until that animal can advance no further in competition.
- 25. Stalling: The Airport Boulevard staging area will open beginning on Monday, March 10th at 5 p.m. Trailers will not be staged prior to these times.
- 24. Pre-Penning: All junior market lambs and meat goats will be pre-penned at the discretion of the Show Management. Penning requests will not be accepted or required. Entries from each county, 4-H club and FFA Chapter, will be assigned pens together in the same area. Each county or chapter will have designated pens but may be required to share pens with other counties or chapters. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring panels to separate animals if needed. Pen dimensions are 6X6.
- 26. Companion Animals: Only animals entered in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo™ are allowed on show grounds. All other animals, excluding entered cow-calf pairs, will be removed per Show Management.

The first and second place goats in each class will be slaughtered for carcass information.

MINIMUM CARCASS STANDARDS

- 1. Minimum and maximum for hot carcass weight, 35 to 70 pounds, respectively.
- 2. Minimum and maximum adjusted fat thickness at the 12th rib, .05 inches to .25 inches, respectively.
- 3. Estimated percent boneless, closely trimmed retail cuts (%BCTRC) from the leg, loin, rack, and shoulder is considered in ranking.

Prediction Equation is: %BCTRC = 49.936 - (.0848 x hot carcass weight, lbs.) - (4.376 x adjusted 12th rib fat thickness, inches) - (3.530 x body wall thickness, inches) + (2.456 x ribeye area, square inches.)

- 4. Carcass must be youthful appearing.
- 5. Carcass shall be free of serious bruises ("old", not recent), free of injection sites on the more valuable carcass parts leg, loin, rack and shoulder (neck excluded) and free of any evidence of surgical altering of the live goat.

Goats achieving the above standards will be evaluated and placed 1st through 10th with the following premium schedule being offered for those placing.

- 2. Guaranteed Premiums: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has established a schedule of Guaranteed Premiums (shown below), which must be accepted by all Junior Market Show exhibitors who win ribbons in the individual classes. In return for the Guaranteed Premium, winning animals become the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and will be sold at their respective Junior Market Auction.

- 4. Validation: Barrows must be validated in the TX 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program. Show Management will make the final decision regarding any potential disqualification. Animals that need to be retagged may do so between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Saturday, March 15th and Tuesday, March 18th in the East Arena of NRG Center.
- 5. **Top 664:** Each breed will be divided into weight groups for pre-judging. A judge will select the top 664 barrows for premium sale. The distribution of the 664 sale lots by breed is below:

- 6. Ear Tags: State Validation tags will be used for 2025. Only validation tags and USDA Official Premise Identification Number (PIN) tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. If an animal is missing the TX State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify a Superintendent immediately upon arrival. State validation tags must be in the ear of the barrow prior to entering the holding/sift pen. Any barrow entering the holding/sift pen without a state validation tag will be disgualified and sent to the floor truck.
- 7. Self-Check-In: New for this year, check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animal. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. The last 6 digits of the animal's state validation tag number
 - b. The animals declared weight
 - c. The animals declared breed

The Exhibitor will be responsible for making sure the information entered in accurate and if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary.

Special Rules for Junior Market Barrow Show

- 8. Weight: Barrows not weighing between <u>250</u> and <u>300</u> pounds will be sifted. Show Management reserves the right to verify weight on any barrow while on Show grounds.
 - a. Exhibitors must have completed check-in by the time posted in the schedule on the day of move-in. The weight submitted at check-in will become that animal's official declared weight to be used for weighing back and official selling purposes. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to ensure weight and breed declared at the time of self/mobile check-in is accurate for their animal entry prior to the close of check-in.
 - b. All barrows selected by the judge will be weighed before re-entering the arena. Barrows with weights more than 10 pounds below the official declared weight will be disqualified, sold on re-weigh weight, and a \$20 handling fee will be deducted from the floor check.
 - c. Any barrow that weighs more than **10 pounds** above its official declared weight will be disqualified.
 - d. First and second place or Division and Reserve Division Champions will be re-weighed prior to Division Champion and Breed Champion drives. Should a first place or Division Champion animal weigh out at this time, the animal will retain its placing but will be ineligible to compete for Breed or Division Champion. The second place or Division Reserve Champion will then advance to compete for Division or Breed Champion honors. No other barrows will advance.
- 9. Champion Drive: Breed and Reserve Breed Champions will be re-weighed prior to showing for Grand Champion of the Show. If an animal weighs out at this time, the animal will retain its placing, but is ineligible to compete in the champion drive. If the Breed Champion weighs out, the Reserve Breed Champion will advance to compete for Grand Champion of the Show. No other barrows will advance. Breed & Reserve Breed Champions must take backdrop photos prior to Champion Drive, only the Overall Grand and Reserve Champions will be allowed to take pictures after the Champion Drive.

Wave 1 Market Barrows (Hampshire, Poland China, Spotted, Other Crossbred I) weighing 20 lbs. less than the minimum or more than the 20 lbs. above the official declared weight will be disqualified.

Wave 2 Market Barrows (Berkshire, Chester White/Landrace, Duroc, Yorkshire, Other Crossbred II) weighing 15 lbs. less than the minimum or more than 15 lbs. above the official declared weight will be disqualified.

- 10. Stalling: To pen together at Houston, groups must arrive together at the Airport Boulevard staging area. No assignments will be made for barrows that are coming later. Pigs will be counted on the trailers. <u>The Airport Boulevard staging area will open on</u> <u>Friday, March 14th and Monday, March 17th beginning at 5 p.m. for trailers to be staged.</u>
- **11. Exhibitor Back Numbers:** During judging, exhibitors must wear the correct back number corresponding with the Show entry number.
- **12.** Feeding: All barrows must have been placed on feed by November 30, 2024, and the feeding period shall continue through opening day of the Show.
- **13. Ear Notches:** All animals must be properly ear notched within 7 days of birth with a litter notch in the right ear and an individual notch in the left ear. Animals not properly notched in both ears will be disqualified.
- 14. Scales: Scales will be provided throughout the barn. No other scales are allowed.
- 15. Grooming: Only water may be applied to market barrows. No other grooming materials are allowed.
- 16. Health Certificate: None required.
- 17. Drench Guns: Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drenching tubes or any other method (by esophagus) is prohibited.
- **18. Bedding:** One bag of shavings per animal will be provided. Shaving will be distributed at the Airport Blvd. Staging Lot prior to release of animals for move-in. Additional shavings may be purchased once the Feed Store opens at NRG Center. In an effort to free up pen space, outside shavings are prohibited. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 19. Driving Instruments: Driving instruments are to be used for the purpose of directing barrows while they are in transit throughout the barn and while they are being exhibited in the show ring. Exhibitors are to treat animals in a humane manner at all times and Show Management will provide a warning to any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal husbandry. Any exhibitor who fails to heed the warning will be disqualified and removed from Show grounds.

Special Rules for Junior Market Barrow Show

- 20. Classes: Superintendents along with Show Management will break classes after check-in is complete. In the event of a large number of barrows with the same weight and same breed, the Show may break these groups into multiple classes using another method other than weight. To more effectively break classes, weights may be grouped by a maximum of 4 lb. spread (i.e. 267-271). Classes will then be broken based on a measure other than weight. Barrows must show in assigned class; no exceptions will be made to posted classes. Show Management reserves the right to shift classes within a breed.
- **21. Classification:** Breed classification will be submitted to the self-check-in which must be completed by 1:30 p.m. on the day of move-in. The breed must be declared upon check-in; however, final determination of breed classification will be made by classifiers appointed by the Show Management.
- 22. Classifiers: Classifiers will classify Junior Market barrows at show. Sifted and non-placing barrows will be taken directly to the commissioning company. The judgment of the sifting committee and classifiers is final and not subject to protest.
- **23. Terminal Show:** All barrows arriving must be sold, including sifted, non-placing and ribbon-winning barrows, according to the Show procedure. Exhibitors will take proper care of all animals until the animals are delivered on the truck of the commission agent. Failure to do so will result in the forfeiture of guaranteed premiums. Exhibitors of non-placing animals will be responsible for a handling fee to be charged by the commission agent. Animals should be in delivered to the commission agent in accordance with all representations required throughout the validation/ownership period. Any animal deemed unmerchantable by Show Management due to lameness, illness, blindness, etc. may not receive a market value for that animal.

Junior Market Barrow Classification Guidelines

Please keep in mind, registration papers, breeder affidavits, or other paperwork is not considered in the classification process. Eligibility for the class is determined *only* by visual appraisal, as evaluated by classifiers appointed by Show Management.

Classification Terms:

- Ideal: Characteristics in combination that most accurately represent the breed.
- Acceptable: Characteristics that represent the breed.
- **Discriminatory:** Characteristics that are not reason for absolute disqualification but in combination with other discriminatory visual characteristics could lead to removal from a breed division.
- Absolute Disqualifications: Unfavorable visual characteristics resulting in removal from a breed division.

WAVE 1 (Hampshire, Poland China, Spotted, Other Crossbred I)

HAMPSHIRE:

<u>Ideal:</u>

- Black in color with a full white belt over the shoulders encompassing both front legs/feet.
- Possess Hampshire breed character with regards to the skull shape and ear shape.
- Erect ears.

<u>Acceptable:</u>

- Black head with a white body, with evidence of pigment and freckling down the top.
- White belt starting on a front foot/leg; belt partially encircles body extending to at least the chest floor (half belt).
- Freckling in the belt.
- Ear deformity/ear folded in a backwards position towards hog's body (crinkled ear).

Discriminatory:

- Large spots within the belt.
- Belt is in front of or behind a solid black front leg.
- If belt v's and progresses towards the poll (base of the ear).
- White tip on tail, if docked.
- White on rear leg extends to the base of the ham.

Absolute Disqualification:

- Streaking or evidence of white on forehead.
- White skin extends over the rim of the nose.
- When mouth is closed, the white under the chin cannot exceed what a U.S. minted quarter will cover.
- Black head with a white body without freckles or pigmentation.
- Belt extends past the sheath (sheath must be black).
- Red hair.
- Droopy or floppy ears.
- Any evidence of physical tampering that would alter breed character.

POLAND CHINA:

<u>Ideal:</u>

- Predominately black possessing Poland China breed character.

Acceptable:

- A slight continuation of white from the legs to the body.
- Ear may have white on it.
- Three of the four legs must be white.
- May have an occasional splash of white on the body.
- Hair and skin texture can vary from coarse to thin, and color can vary from dark back to ashy/pale.
- Ear deformity/ear folded in a backwards position towards hog's body (crinkled ear).

Discriminatory:

- Partially erect/level ears.
- A moderate continuation of white from the legs to the body.

SPOTTED:

<u>Ideal:</u>

- Must be black and white, possessing Spotted breed character.

To convert to % fat-free lean, divide by warm carcass weight and multiply by 100

- 1. Rules: This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- 2. Arrival: Dairy exhibitors must move-in on Monday, March 3rd starting at 4 a.m. All trailers with dairy cattle MUST report to Airport Boulevard for staging.
- **3. Registration:** Animals entered in the Junior Dairy Show must be owned and recorded in the name of the exhibitor in the herd book of their respective breed association before Dec. 1, 2024.
- 4. Number of Entries: There is no limit on the number of dairy cattle an exhibitor may enter.

- 5. Substitutions: Substitutions can be made prior to Feb. 1 by submitting a completed official substitution form. These must have an official postmark dated no later than Feb. 1. After Feb. 1, heifer substitutions will be accepted by the same method plus a \$50 fee.
- 6. Dress Code: Exhibitor clothing in the Show arena may not bear any insignia or writing other than FFA or 4-H.

Classes: Each of the four breeds competing in the Junior Dairy Show is divided into 14 classes. The breed shows are Brown Swiss, Jersey, Holstein, and Milking Shorthorn. Class schedules, numbers, and age requirements are the same for all breeds.

8. Championship Awards: Only animals receiving 1st or 2nd Premium Awards in their individual classes will be eligible for championship awards.

- 1. Rules: This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- 2. Registration: All entries in this department must be registered in the flock books of their respective breed, on or before October 1 of the year before the show. Animals that are family registered and validated are eligible to compete in the Junior Breeding Sheep Show provided all owners/exhibitors are individually listed and eligible. Animals with farm or ranch names listed as the owner will not be allowed to compete.
- 3. Eligible Breeds: Entry can made in the following breeds.
 - a. Dorper, Dorset, Hampshire, ORB (Other Registered Breeds), Rambouillet, Registered Finewool Breeds (Columbia,



Corriedale, Delaine-Merino, Targhee are the only breeds allowed in the Registered Finewool Breeds Classes), Registered Hair Breeds (Royal White, Texel, and Katahdin are the only breeds allowed in the Registered Hair Breeds

- *Classes*), Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk, and White Dorper.
- 4. Shearing: Sheep may be shown in any length fleece unless Breed Association specifies fleece length. The superintendent and his committee have the right to determine if this rule has been complied with and disqualify any animal not meeting these criteria.
- 5. Number of Animals: There is no limit on the number of breeding sheep entries an exhibitor may enter in an individual class. Exhibitors may only enter one group entry per class per breed.
- 6. Validation: Breeding sheep must be validated through the TX 4-H & FFA Breeding Sheep Validation Program administered by Texas 4-H. The ownership deadline is October 31, 2024. VALIDATION TAGS WILL BE REQUIRED. Exhibitors need to check with their local CEA or AST for local/county validation deadlines. Failure to abide by these rules will result in disqualification.
- 8. Self-Check-In: New for this year, check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animals and group entries. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. The last 6 digits of the animal's state validation tag number
 - b. Breed
 - c. Sex (Note: choose NONE for group classes)
 - d. Class (Note: Only enter group classes with an entry number that is tied to a group class)

Special Rules for Junior Breeding Sheep Show

The Exhibitor will be responsible for making sure the information entered in accurate and if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary.

- 7. Entry Designation: A separate entry application must be made and submitted to the Show before the entry deadline for each individual entry and each group class. Individual entries must submit the breed and validation number for each entry. Name and flock number must be furnished to the Superintendent and entered into the judging books upon arrival at the Show.
- 8. Group Classes: Group classes must be entered by the Dec. 1 entry deadline. Group class entries are \$10 per group class entered. All animals in group classes must be owned by the same owner. Late entry is not allowed. Entries for group classes also must be shown in their respective single classes.
- **9. Bedding:** One bag of shavings per every two animals will be provided. Shaving will be distributed at the Airport Blvd. Staging Lot prior to release of animals for move-in. Additional shavings may be purchased once the Feed Store opens at NRG Center. In an effort to free up pen space, outside shavings are prohibited. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- **10.** Back Numbers: Exhibitors must wear back numbers issued by Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, corresponding with entry in the show ring.
- **11. Breeding Ages:** For the purpose of this show, the following will apply regarding ages of breeding sheep: Toothing of sheep to determine the age class in which they are shown will be determined by the exhibitor before check-in. Sheep with the following tooth development at check-in time will show in the listed classes. The top 4 placing animals in each class will be toothed at the conclusion of each class. If the toothing does not match the class, the entry will be disqualified.
 - a. Lambs must be carrying all milk teeth. Lambs showing either or both of their first pair of permanent incisors may not show in the lamb classes.
 - b. Sheep eligible to compete in the two-tooth breeding classes must show only the first pair of permanent incisors. Sheep which have dropped their central pair of milk teeth and show one or both teeth of the first permanent pair may show as singles only in the two-tooth classes of their respective breeds.
 - c. Sheep showing the first two pairs, or three pairs of permanent incisors may show as singles in the four-to-six tooth class only.
 - d. Sheep with more than six permanent teeth may not exhibit in the show.
- **12. Heelers/Assistants:** Junior Show animals must be exhibited by their owners. The use of heelers (assistants in the show ring) will only be allowed if the heeler is a junior breeding sheep exhibitor entered in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Junior Breeding Sheep Show. All other persons are prohibited from entering the show ring during the Junior Breeding Sheep Show.

13. Show Order: The show order is as follows: Dorper, White Dorper, Registered Hair Breeds, Rambouillet, Registered Finewool Breeds, Southdown, Hampshire, Suffolk, Shropshire, Dorset, and Other Registered Breeds (ORB). It is the exhibitor's responsibility to review the check-in sheets that will be posted and contact the Show superintendent on Monday, March 3 in the event that entry/entries posted are in the incorrect class. All changes must be made prior to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, March 4th. No changes will be made after 4 p.m. on Tuesday, March 4th.

1. Rules: This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.

2. Registration: All animals must be registered in the Herdbook of their Association. Purchase, delivery, possession, and registration must all occur on or before November 30 of the year before the show. Animals that are family registered and validated are eligible to compete in the Junior Breeding Gilt Show provided all owners/exhibitors are individually listed and eligible. Animals with farm or ranch names listed as the owner will not be allowed to compete.

- 3. Validation: To be eligible, gilts must be validated with and adhere to all the rules of the Texas 4-H and FFA Gilt Validation Program administered by the Texas FFA. Exhibitors need to check with their local CEA or AST for local/county validation deadlines. Failure to abide by these rules will result in disqualification.
- 4. Number of Animals: Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of three (3) head in the Junior Breeding Gilt Show.
- 5. Substitutions: Breed substitutions will be allowed if the breed of gilt the exhibitor intends to bring to the show is different than the breed entered at the time of online entry. Breed substitutions can be edited by the exhibitor during the check-in process.
- 6. Ear Tags: State Validation tags will be used for 2025. Only validation tags and USDA Official Premise Identification Number (PIN) tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. If an animal is missing the TX State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify a Superintendent immediately upon arrival. State validation tags must be in the ear of the gilt prior to entering the holding pen. Any gilt entering the holding pen without a state validation tag will be disqualified.
- 7. Showmanship: Showmanship classes will be divided into Junior and Senior Divisions.
 - a. Junior Division Contestants must be 8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024.
 - b. Senior Division Contestants must be 14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024.

- 12. Dressings: No oil, paint, powder or other dressing is permitted on swine. Only water is allowed.
- **13. Driving Instruments:** Driving instruments are to be used for the purpose of directing gilts while they are in transit throughout the barn and while they are being exhibited in the show ring. Exhibitors are to treat animals in a humane manner at all times and Show Management will provide a warning to any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal husbandry. - 1. Rules: This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section and for each breed. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- 4. Ownership/Registration: Animals entered in this department must be owned by the exhibitor and registered in the records of the respective breed association (in the name of the exhibitor) on or before November 1. Permanent identification (i.e. brand or tattoo) must be present and must match the registration paper of the animal.
- 5. **Partnerships:** Original registration papers must be solely in the name of the exhibitor. Partnerships of any form will not be allowed.
- 6. Validation: All junior breeding beef heifers (including potential substitute heifers) <u>MUST</u> be validated through the TX 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program. Heifer validation will include online registration paper submittal and physical validation with DNA hair sampling for all entered and potential substitute heifers.

Exhibitors should contact local county extension agents and agricultural science teachers for specific county validation deadlines and locations; however, all junior breeding beef heifers **MUST** be validated by **October 31**, in order to be eligible for participation in the 2025 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo™ Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show.

5. ID Verification: The tattoo or brand will be checked on as many as four (4) placing heifers at the conclusion of each class and must match the permanent ID that appears on the original registration paper. - 7. Stalling: To stall together at Houston, groups MUST arrive and remain in line together at Airport Blvd. NO assignments will be made for heifers that are coming later. Heifers will be counted on the trailers. <u>The Airport Boulevard staging area will open at 5 p.m. on Sunday, March 9th and Wednesday, March 12th. Trailers will not be staged prior to staging time. Once these three rows are assigned, assignments will be given starting on the far end of the stalls (closest to commercial exhibits) and will work back towards the dock.</u>
- 8. Self/Mobile Check-In: Check-in will take place by scanning a QR code located on the back of the exhibitor entry number using a mobile device. Exhibitors will be responsible for individually checking in their animal. The Exhibitor will be responsible to making sure the information listed in the check-in portal is accurate, if there are any issues the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing time listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the exhibitor's check-in summary. Any heifers not checked in will be ineligible to show.

- Entry: Scramble classes are limited to 2024 Calf Scramble certificate winners. Scramble heifer entry fees have been waived. Calf Scramble exhibitors are strongly encouraged to enter their scramble heifer in the Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show with an entry fee of \$35. However, Calf Scramble exhibitors are only allowed one entry in the Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show and it must be their Scramble heifer.

Special Rules for Scramble Beef Heifer Show

- Quality Counts Verification: Exhibitors are required to pass the Quality County Verification test for show eligibility. Entries
 will not be accepted without the verification code for each exhibitor. The test can be found at https://agrilife.org/qualitycounts/.
- 4. **Partnerships:** Original registration papers must be solely in the name of the exhibitor. Partnerships of any form will not be allowed.
- 5. Validation: All junior breeding beef heifers (including potential substitute heifers) <u>MUST</u> be validated through the TX 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program. Heifer validation will include online registration paper submittal and physical validation with DNA hair sampling for all entered and potential substitute heifers.

Exhibitors should contact local county extension agents and agricultural science teachers for specific county validation deadlines and locations; however all junior breeding beef heifers **MUST** be validated by **Oct. 31** in order to be eligible for participation in the 2025 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo™ Scramble Beef Heifer Show.

- 6. ID Verification: The tattoo or brand will be checked on as many as four (4) placing heifers at the conclusion of each class and must match the permanent ID that appears on the original registration paper. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure the brand or tattoo is legible prior to arrival on Show grounds. Exhibitors will be disqualified if their heifer does not have a matching tattoo or brand, or if the tattoo or brand is illegible. In the event of a disqualification, the next placing heifer with matching identification will advance. THE SHOW WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR BRANDING OR TATTOOING HEIFERS, EXHIBITORS MUST HAVE ALL HEIFERS BRANDED OR TATOOED BEFORE ARRIVAL.
- 7. **DNA Verification:** Show Management reserves the right to collect hair samples on any participating junior breeding beef heifer/scramble heifer. Show Management will make the final decision regarding any potential disqualification.
- Arrival: Wave 1 heifers can begin staging at Airport Blvd beginning at 5 p.m. on Sunday, March 9th and Wave 2 heifers can begin staging at Airport Blvd at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, March 12th. Class schedules, numbers, age requirements and premium moneys (with the exception of special awards) are the same for all divisions. Class breaks listed below are subject to change. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to make it to the show ring for their designated class. Judging will not be delayed for animals entering the arena late. An exhibit not presented promptly at the scheduled time is barred from competition in the class.

Special Rules for Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contest

- 1. Rules: This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations and to the Special Rules listed in this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules will prevail.
- 2. **Purpose:** The Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contest is to encourage more 4-H and FFA members to participate in a practical beef production program. This contest heavily emphasizes feeding and management financial costs and exhibitors should have a firm understanding of the economics associated with the beef cattle industry.
- 3. **Previous Winners:** Past 1st place overall recipients of the Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contest cannot compete in any future Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contests at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- **4. Maximum Exhibitors:** A maximum of 175 exhibitors will be allowed to compete in the contest. The first 170 exhibitors to submit their entries will be eligible for the contest.
- 5. Entry: Entries for the 2025 Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contest are available at <u>www.rodeohouston.com</u> starting on August 5, 2024 at 9 a.m. for returning contestants and will open on August 8, 2024 at 9 a.m. for anyone wishing to submit for any remaining spots and will remain open until the earlier of (i) 175 completed entries received or (ii) August 15, 2024.
 - a. Online Entries will be completed by the AST/CEA and can be paid by a single check from the school or club or by a single credit card.
 - b. Entry fee for 2025 will remain \$105
 - c. There will not be a separate Intent Form process for 2025
 - d. Paperwork can be submitted along with other Junior Show Entries in the Fall
 - e. If an entry cancels before the entry deadline, that spot will become available online.
 - 6. Purchasing Cattle: Once an exhibitor receives confirmation of their entry being accepted on the website, the exhibitor may purchase steers for the 2025 Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Show.

- 7. Scale Tickets: Scale Tickets will be uploaded in the online record book system by September 15, 2024. NOTE: All steers must be purchased and weighed on the same date; this must take place on or before August 31, 2024. The official scale tickets must be properly completed with the animals' identification (official HLSR Tag #), weight, date weighed, seller of the animal, buyer of the animal, and signature or initials of the weighmaster. Scale tickets to include only one steer per ticket (3 scale tickets per exhibitor). Exhibitors should retain a copy of the scale tickets for their record books. Scale ticket examples included on last page of these special rules.
- 8. Record Books: Exhibitors must submit their online record books by 11:59 PM Friday, February 28, 2025 or they will be closed automatically. Any questions regarding Record Books should be directed to jcsrecordbooks@gmail.com no later than 11:59 p.m. Monday, February 24, 2025.
- 9. Steers: Entry will be a pen of three steers. Steers of any of the beef breeds are eligible to be entered in this Show. Replacement steers will not be accepted.
- **10. Ear Tags and DNA Samples:** Exhibitors will receive ear tags and DNA kits after submission of their Entry. Each steer will have a unique ID and will represent the animal's sale slot. Tag numbers will be assigned by Club/Chapter and the Club/Chapter order will be randomly chosen. DNA will have to be turned into HLSR for each steer to be compared to samples from the contest.
- **11. DNA Verification:** DNA will be sampled and verified for randomly selected pens. DNA Samples not matching will result in disgualification and forfeiture of premiums.
- **12.** Arrival: All exhibitors must arrive directly to NRG Arena and enter through Gate 5. DO NOT STAGE AT AIRPORT BLVD. Exhibitors may begin to arrive no earlier than 4 a.m. and must be in place by 9 a.m. on Sunday, March 9. Exhibitors arriving earlier than 4 a.m. on March 9 may be turned away.
- **13. Feeding for Show:** Pen-of-three is to be fed in a separate feed pen from other livestock when placed on full feed. Steers grazed prior to entering their finishing pen may be grazed with other livestock. Exhibitors must continuously own and personally feed and care for their animals under the direct supervision of a CEA or AST. Animals can be raised in a commercial feedlot as long as the steers are fed and penned separately from other feedlot cattle and the exhibitor is providing the daily care of the steers.
- **14.** Days on Feed: At time of weigh-in (sale weight) at the Show, the number of days on full feed must be given to the Committee by the exhibitor.
- 15. Divisions: Students between the ages of 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and 13 on or before Aug. 31, 2024, are eligible to compete in the Junior division of the Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contest. Students between the ages of 14 & 18 on or before August 31, 2024 are eligible to compete in the Senior division of the Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Contest. Exhibitors in the Junior and Senior divisions will be evaluated by judges using the same scoring system. Junior Division exhibitors are eligible to win Sr./Overall awards and Special Awards. Senior Division exhibitors are not eligible to win Junior Awards.
- 16. Weighing: Cattle must be weighed individually on a certified livestock scale by a certified weigher starting on February 21, 2025 through February 28, 2025. This weight is the official weight for the feeding records (record weight) and will be used with a four percent (4%) pencil shrink in the record book. The certified weigher must sign the official scale ticket and the weights must appear on the ticket. This weighing will be followed by check-in weight (sale weight) at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Cattle will be sold on the check-in weight.
- **17.** Sale Weights: Steers must weigh a minimum of 1,150 pounds or a maximum of 1,650 pounds (sale weight) at weigh-in. Steers that fall below or above these weights will not be graded. There will be no reweighs.
- **18.** Steer Handling: Steers that are wild or unruly will be disqualified. If it is necessary to remove one or more unruly animals from a pen, the entire pen will be disqualified. Steers will be shown as a group in pens. Exhibitors must be present in the Sales Pavilion when their steers are being weighed and graded and on sale day.
- **19.** Horns: Steers must be dehorned. If any re-growth appears it must be no more than 2" in length and must have a blunt tip that is no smaller than the size of a quarter. Scurs (defined as loosely attached) may be present but must be no more than 2" in length.
- 20. Health Certification: Health certificates are not required. Exhibitor and his or her AST/CEA or other representative must certify that the steers were withdrawn from all chemicals and drugs in accordance with USDA regulations and comply with all state and federal regulations pertaining to livestock. THESE REGULATIONS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE AT ANY TIME.

- 21. Death Loss: Should an exhibitor lose a steer due to death, that exhibitor must provide immediate notification in writing stating time and cause of death to Show Management at livestock@rodeohouston.com. This notification must also be signed by the CEA/AST and a parent or guardian.
- 22. Grading Committee: A committee of three judges will grade the Junior Commercial Steers based on the USDA standard quality and yield grades for slaughter steers.
- 23. Questions: The Junior Commercial Steer Feeding & Management Committee Chairman will designate a time when the exhibitor may direct questions or inquiries pertaining to any aspect of the Show, to Show Officials or designated committee persons.
- **24.** Scoring Systems: The official scoring system is based on 100 points, allocated as follows:

a.	Written Test	25 pts.
b.	Interview Skills	25 pts.
c.	Steer Grades	15 pts.
d.	Record Book	10 pts.
e.	Meat ID and Quiz	10 pts.
f.	Pen of Steers Closeout	9 pts.
g.	Cost/lb. Gain	2 pts.
ĥ.	Avg. Daily Gain	2 pts.
i.	Feed Conversion	2 pts.

Note: To determine the final placing of the Top 8 Exhibitors, the Initial Interview Score will be dropped and replaced with the Final Interview Score.

- 25. Contest Completion: Exhibitors must complete all phases of the contest and score a minimum of 25 points in order to receive premium cash awards.
- 26. Ineligible Steers for Points: For steers that have been determined to have horns or scurs (see Rule 16), weigh less than 1,150 pounds (sale weight) or weigh more than 1,650 pounds (sale weight) or foundered or bruised, the exhibitor will not receive Steer Grade points on these ineligible steers.
- 27. Steer Sales: All steers entered will be sold, by grade and weight. The regular marketing cost, including trucking expenses to the livestock market, will be borne by the exhibitor, and deducted from the sale proceeds. Steers which arrive to the Show that are determined by Show officials to be foundered, bruised, or otherwise declared non-marketable will be priced on a residual value as determined by Show Management. Steer's grading Select and below and any ungraded steers, including steers weighing less than 1,150 pounds or more than 1,650 pounds will be sold at the corresponding bid price and will not be auctioned at the Junior Commercial Steer Sale on Monday, March 11th. This is a practical, commercially fed steer show. It should be specifically understood that it is not the intent of the Show Management to seek premium bids at the sale of the entries in this division.
- 28. Sale Cap: Show Management will determine market prices using packer bids that are secured by the Commissioning Agent. Only steers grading Choice and above will be auctioned in the Junior Commercial Steer Sale. Sale price on Choice and above steers will be capped at 20 cents per pound above a predetermined fed cattle market price (bid) for Choice and above steers, with exhibitors receiving a minimum premium of \$200 per steer above market price. Amounts bid over the cap amount will be transferred to the premium cash award pool for the current show year payout.
- 29. Commission: Exhibitors will be assessed a \$35 auction commission per head sold.

The exhibitors total record points (85 or less and a minimum of 25 or more to qualify for any record points) divided into the award moneys, i.e. 70 contestants x an average of 50 points = 3,500 points, Therefore, \$8,000 divided by 3,500 points = \$2.2857. A score of 65 would receive \$148.57.
- **32. TOP EIGHT POINT PREMIUMS:** The top eight exhibitors in terms of combined Steer and Record Points will each receive a bonus point premium of \$1,000.

Special Rules for Target Archery Competition

1. Participation: This competition be divided between four divisions (Junior Male, Senior Male, Junior Female, and Senior Female) based on age. All entries in this competition are subject to the HLSR Archery Competition Rules.

Contestants in the HLSR Archery Competition are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this competition.

2. Entry: Entries will be made through the Eyes on Score system at https://www.eyesonscore.com/ starting August 1, 2024 and will close on October 10, 2024, or when the max entries is met. (See rule 6 for details)

3. Eligibility:

- a. Organizations: Must have a membership to one of the following organizations: Texas 4-H, Texas FFA, TFAA, ASA, USA Archery (JOAD).
- b. State of Texas: HLSR Archery Competition is limited to entries within the State of Texas.
- c. School: Contestants must be enrolled in and attending public, private, or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas; between the ages of 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and 18 on or before August 31, 2024 and be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. Involvement in international or national events does NOT disqualify otherwise eligible contestants.
 - i. Junior Participant Classification 8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024.
 - ii. Senior Participant Classification 14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024.
 - iii. A contestant is not eligible if already graduated from high school.

- 4. Foreign Exchange Students: Non-United States citizens and Foreign Exchange students are ineligible to compete in the HLSR Archery Competition.
- 5. Exhibitor Code of Ethics: Per Rule 31 of the General Rules: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] is a family friendly event. As such, an individual's conduct as an exhibitor or patron should be exemplary, and violators are subject to disqualification or removal from Show grounds.

Violations include, but are not limited to:

- Disruptive or improper conduct
- Public display of profanity of any sort
- Violence of any sort
- Providing alcohol to underage persons or providing a space for the consumption of alcohol by underage persons.
- Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol by underage persons
- Possession of an open alcohol container in a public area regardless of the individual's age
- Excessive consumption of alcohol

The consumption, distribution, and service of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with the TX Alcoholic Beverage Code, which defines the lawful consumption and service of alcohol and prescribes sanctions for violations. The consumption, distribution, and service of alcoholic beverages must comply with HLSR regulations and policies.

The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo™ is an invitational Livestock Show. HLSR reserves the right to extend, withhold, or revoke an invitation to any Exhibitor or Contestant.

- 6. Entry Limits: There is no limit to the number of individuals each club/chapter may enter. The right is reserved, by Management, to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry and to refuse any accepted entry admittance to the grounds.
 - a. Exhibitors may only have one entry per bow class for a maximum of 4 entries per exhibitor.
 - i. Exhibitor may only have one entry per preliminary round.
 - ii. Exhibitor must provide the appropriate bow for each entry to be eligible for that bow class.
 - b. Overall entries will not be limited. Initially available will be two rounds on Saturday and one round Sunday morning for up to 180 Exhibitors per round.
 - i. Additional rounds will be added based on need and at the discretion of the Superintendent and Show Officials
- 7. Event Format: The competition will be at a 20 Yard range. The preliminary round will consist of 60 arrows shot at the 40 cm 5-color face. 40 cm Triple faces will be allowed.
 - a. Targets 40 cm 5-color faces and 40 cm Triple faces will be provided.
 - b. Divisions:
 - *i.* Senior Male (14 to 19 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - *ii.* Junior Male (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - *iii.* Senior Female (14 to 19 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - *iv.* Junior Female (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - c. Classes Contestants will compete in the below classes based upon what bow(s) they will be shooting with. All classes will be available for all timeslots.
 - i. Compound
 - ii. Recurve
 - iii. NASP/Genesis
 - *iv.* Barebow (Cushion Plunger style arrow rests are allowed)
- 8. Check-In All contestants must check-in prior to mandatory orientation. Check-in will be open 1 hr prior to your assigned shoot time until 15 minutes before your assigned shoot time. All equipment must be inspected before orientation. NO LATE ARRIVALS WILL BE ACCEPTED. NO EXCEPTIONS!

- 9. Orientation Orientation will be conducted 15 minutes prior to your shoot time. Orientation is mandatory for everyone who will participate in the event.
- **10.** *Finals:* We will conduct a shoot-off style final on with those shooters designated as finalists. Finalists will be announced when the preliminary rounds are complete.
 - a. Finalists will have to be available to shoot the finals or the next person may be moved up at the discretion of Show Management.
- **11. Target Assignments:** Targets will be assigned by show officials and will be subject to change at any time. Assignments will be available in the online score system; these are not considered final and can be changed based on the Shoot Officials' discretion.
 - a. Switching Targets: All target locations will be flipped on a bale after the first 10 ends for the second 10 ends.
 (Example: targets initially located at the top of a bale will be moved to the lower spots and the targets on the bottom will be moved to the top.
- 12. Quivers: Contestants must provide their own quivers. Quivers will not be provided by HLSR.
- **13. Arrows:** An arrow consists of a shaft with a tip (point), nock, fletching and, if desired, cresting. The maximum diameter of arrow shafts shall not exceed 9.3mm (arrow wraps shall not be considered as part of this limitation but may not extend further than 22cm toward the arrow point when measured from the nock groove where the bowstring sits to the end of the wrap). The tips/points of the arrows may not exceed 9.4mm in diameter. All arrows of every athlete shall be marked with the athlete's name or initials on the shaft. All arrows used in any end shall be identical in appearance and shall carry the same pattern and colour(s) of fletching, nocks and cresting, if any. Tracer nocks (electrically/electronically lighted nocks) are not allowed.



4. Draw Weight: A <u>maximum draw weight of 60 lbs</u> will be allowed for the competition. Draw weight will be verified on a case by case basis at the discretion of the Superintendent. You will be asked your draw weight during Bow Check. Anyone found to exceed the draw weight during competition will be subject to disqualification.

15. Safety Requirements:

- a. **Range Safety:** The safety of all involved is of paramount importance. All range safety rules will be strictly enforced. Any contestant failing to conform to safety standards will be warned or disqualified from the event. Minor infractions will be noted and marked on the contestant's badge. Repeated infractions or major safety violations will result in disqualification from the event
- b. **Sky Drawing:** Absolutely no sky drawing will be allowed. Any contestants seen sky drawing will be immediately disqualified.
- c. **Cases:** All bows must remain cased at all times while on grounds until the equipment inspection. After shooting bows must be cased before leaving the range.
- d. **Range Boundaries:** For multiple reasons, control of traffic on and around the range is essential. Please respect these boundaries and the directions of the officials.
- e. **Disruption:** Parents, coaches, and other individuals should remain positive and supportive, being careful not to disrupt or exhibit behaviours deemed detrimental to contestants or the operation of the match. Sanctions ranging from warning to ejection from the grounds or disqualification of contestants may be imposed for interference with the operation of the match or disruption of the events on a firing line or range.
- **16.** *Alcohol Policy*: Consumption, use and possession of alcohol by persons under the age of 21 is prohibited by law and is not permitted. Consumption, use and possession of alcohol is not permitted by parents, coaches, observers, and contestants during the shoot.
- **17.** *Drug Policy:* Shooting is not allowed while under the influence of any drug or prescription medications that effect judgement and conduct to a degree that a participant is unsafe.

- 18. Tobacco Policy: Smoking is not permitted by parents, coaches, observers, and contestants inside NRG Arena. Parents, coaches and observers should adhere to all posted no smoking signs and restrict use to designated areas only. Smoking use and possession of tobacco products (including smokeless) by minors is prohibited by law and is not permitted anywhere on the grounds at any time.
- **19. Interference:** If any contestant in any way, whether in person, or by agent, or servant, interferes with judges during their adjudication or shows disrespect to them, to the show or competition, they are subject to be penalized. Management may demand a proper apology from the contestant, may exclude him/her from competition, bar him/her from the grounds and may also withhold any prizes that may have been awarded.
- **20. Photographs:** All photographs taken by the official photographer become property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Unofficial (i.e. personal) photographs may not be published without the written approval of Management. Contestants wishing to purchase photographs must contact the official photographer.
 - a. Commercial photography and filming are often conducted at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. You may be depicted in photographs or video recordings of any Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo event, and by entering the grounds and/or competitive events associated with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, you consent to the use of any depictions in connection with advertising, news reporting, public relations, webcasts or other broadcasts, or any other activities relating to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, and you further release and waive all claims for compensation and any rights of review and approval, copyright, and right of publicity with respect thereto.
- 21. Property/Security: All contestants or persons in charge of property, shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo do not undertake to do so and shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property of contestants thereof. All contestants are responsible for security of their own property. The contestant is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their property. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is not responsible for the acts of a third party.
- 22. Official Scores: The official score is the record kept by the referee/scorer on a sheet furnished him/her by Management. The referee/scorer's decision is final. All reported scores are checked for accuracy and corrections will be made when required. Shoot officials maintain the objective of producing timely, accurate and complete scoring records for each event. They do not represent any club, county, team, or individual. The superintendent will be responsible for conducting any and all aspects of the event pertaining to "shooting". Including, but not limited to: target assignment, scoring, posting of scores, determination of winners, and rule interpretation.
- 23. Appeals: A contestant may appeal a ruling on the range immediately if he/she feels a referee has missed a score. The scorer may poll the squad at his or her discretion. The decision of the referee on the range is final and not subject to further appeal. Parent/coach scoring is not official scoring and will not be consulted.
- 24. Protests: Contestants may only protest any injustice, violation of the rules, or other circumstance that may have resulted in placing them at a disadvantage relative to other contestants. Such conditions must be reported to the Superintendent(s) immediately. All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a \$300 deposit which will not be returned if protest is not sustained by Show Management. Protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Show Management immediately after the occasion that prompted the protest. The Protest Jury will investigate and reach final resolution of the matter as soon as possible considering all circumstances. Results of all protests are final and will be reported to the contestant.
 - a. Protest Jury will include the Superintendent(s), Assistant Superintendent(s), Director Livestock Competitions and Senior Coordinator, Livestock Show
- **25.** Accommodations Lodging is the responsibility of the contestant's party and will not be arranged by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- **26.** Coaching: A participant may not be coached while on the shooting line. Coaching includes any communication between the coach, parent or other spectator and the contestant; verbal or non-verbal. The contestant may request assistance from Management and Management may assign an assistant, in the event of a malfunction.

- 27. Dress Code: Participants and spectators are required to dress appropriately. Both young people and adults should wear attire appropriate for the weather while remaining modest and socially acceptable. Contestants must wear a shirt with sleeves. Clothing deemed immodest or distracting to other contestants will not be permitted. Fully enclosed shoes must be worn for safety reasons by both contestants and spectators. All contestants and coaches should consider their dress in that they may be having photographs taken or be asked to interview for the media.
- 28. Use of Two-Way Radios: To assist us in range and match operations, only authorized persons are permitted to use two-way radios on the grounds. Any action by either youth or adults interfering with the frequencies in use imposes a safety hazard. Deliberate disruption of range communication by anyone at the event will be considered a safety violation and will be treated as such.
- **29.** Top Archer Award: A Top Archer award will be handed out for the top male and top female score, determined by combining the qualifying score from the Target Competition and the 3-D score. Ties will be broken by combined count of x's from Target and 12's from 3-D.
- 30. Awards: The following prizes will be awarded to each class. Additional awards will be given at the discretion of HLSR.

1. Format:

- a. Each competition round will consist of one (1) round of twenty individual 3D targets.
- b. Shooters will be permitted 90 seconds to range the target and execute the shot. Any arrow not fired by the end of the time will be scored as a zero (0).
- c. Targets will be grouped into sets of 4 with shooters assigned to a target within the set. Shooters will shoot their first target in the set and rotate through the set. Arrows will be scored at the conclusion of the set. Shooters will then move to the next set, assume their beginning spots in the set and continue the process. Each shooter will need a minimum of 4 arrows.
- 2. Entry Limits: There is no limit to the number of individuals each group may enter. The right is reserved, by Management, to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry and to refuse any accepted entry admittance to the grounds.
 - **a.** Exhibitors may only have one entry.
 - i. Exhibitor may only have one entry per preliminary round.
 - ii. Exhibitor must provide the appropriate bow for each entry to be eligible for that bow class.
 - **b.** Overall entries will not be limited. Initially available will be four rounds on Saturday and two rounds Sunday morning for up to 80 Exhibitors per round.
 - i. 20 spots will be available per distance.
 - ii. Additional rounds will be added based on need and at the discretion of the Superintendent and Show Officials

Eagle Recurve allows the use of Barebow Recurve, Olympic Recurve, Traditional/Longbow, or a universal one-size fits all bow approved for use in NASP competition with a maximum draw weight of 20# along with Easton XX75 Genesis Series aluminum arrows.

- 4. Equipment:
 - a. The event will adhere to a maximum draw weight for each shooter of 60 LBS. (See rule 5)
 - b. Use of a sight light is permitted.
 - c. Range finders are permitted but not required. Each target distance will be marked. Each round will be all known distance.
 - d. Each shooter must be able to draw their bow under control and without undue difficulty. Sky Drawing is not allowed.
 - e. Cell Phones and other electronic devices are to be silenced and their use for communication or accessing apps is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, sight mark applications.
 - f. Only one arrow, per shooter, per target will be shot from the designated stake. Anyone shooting the wrong target will receive a zero (0) for the target which should have been shot.
 - g. An arrow that drops while being nocked onto the string in preparation for a shot may be picked up and shot with no penalty. If, in the process of letting down, an arrow drops off the bow or is jarred off by hand contact with the bow, it may be picked up and shot with no penalty. The shooter is responsible for always maintaining control of the arrow and an arrow must not be released or otherwise propelled by the string or it will be scored as a zero.
 - h. Lighted arrow nocks are not permitted.
 - i. Open Class Equipment Rules for Young Adult & Youth:
 - i. May use any compound or recurve bow, sight, release, stabilizer, or equipment unless specifically prohibited in any other part of these rules or by a ruling of the Competition Committee. HLSR reserves the right to review any equipment / accessories and determine its suitability for competition.
 - j. Fixed Pin Equipment Rules for Young Adult, Youth and Eagle: Sights
 - i. All Eagle, 30- and 40-yard classes use fixed pins with no pin limit. A movable sight may be used but must be locked down into a fixed position that will be verified by the group prior to competing. Magnification is permitted in 40-yard classes. Clarifiers or verifiers in the peep are not considered magnification and are permitted in all classes.

3-D Archery Competition Special Rules

- ii. **Stabilizers** A front stabilizer or a system including quick releases, enhancers and/or weights may be used, but may not exceed twelve inches (12") in total length from the tip of the stabilizer (or system) to the point of attachment on the front of the riser of the bow. A single rear stabilizer up to twelve inches (12") in length (including weights) may be used regardless of the point of attachment to the bow.
- k. Arrow Rule for Young Adult, Youth & Eagle Class:
 - i. The maximum diameter of arrow shafts will not exceed 9.3mm or .366"; and the field or glue-in point for these arrows will have a maximum diameter of 9.4 mm or .370". No changes or alterations to the manufacturer's exterior finish and markings are permitted, except for the addition of fletching wraps or that occur during use.
- 5. **Draw Weight:** A <u>maximum draw weight of 60 lbs</u> will be allowed for the competition. Draw weight will be verified on a case by case basis at the discretion of the Superintendent. You will be asked your draw weight during Bow Check. Anyone found to exceed the draw weight during competition will be subject to disqualification.
- 6. Eagle Recurve allows the use of Barebow Recurve, Olympic Recurve, Traditional/Longbow or a universal one-size fits all bow approved for use in NASP competition with a maximum draw weight of 20# along with Easton XX75 Genesis Series aluminum arrows.
 - a. If in the opinion of the Range Official anyone in Youth or Eagle is having difficulty drawing and controlling the bow, they will be required to decrease the poundage to allow them to properly draw and shoot the bow, regardless of arrow speed, to be able to participate.
- 7. Equipment Failure: There is no allowance for equipment failure during the round. Competitors in Fixed Pins classes may make one gang adjustment of their sight during the competition.

8. Scoring Rules

- a. Official Scores will be kept by a volunteer scorekeeper assigned to each group. Contestants will not be handling scoring but can request clarification or correction if they think there is an issue.
- All information on the scorecard must be accurate with all information completely and properly filled in. Information blocks and signatures that are incorrect or incomplete will result in a deduction of ten points. If the score was incorrect the ten (10) point deduction will be taken from the correct score.
- c. If the number of 12 Rings™ is left blank, it will be scored as zero.
- d. Scorekeepers will maintain the official-colored scorecard for each shooter and be responsible for recording each arrow on the corresponding target number and maintaining the running total. Scorekeepers will confirm with the shooter that their total score and number of 12 Rings[™] is correct at the end of the round.

9. Scoring

- a. All arrows must remain in the target until all arrows are scored:
 - i. The arrow shaft must be touching a portion of the next highest scoring line to be scored for the higher value.
 - ii. Scorers are allowed to use their binoculars and may also reflect or shine a light on the target at the time of scoring to aid in the process.
 - iii. The status of any doubtful arrows must be determined before drawing any arrow from the target.
 - iv. The score is based on the status of the arrow while all other arrows remain in the target.
 - v. Arrows may not be removed until a scoring judgment has been made and no changes may be made to the score after removal of an arrow.
 - vi. Targets may not be moved or dislodged for scoring purposes and shall be returned to their proper upright position upon removal of the arrows.
- b. Scorers will agree on a score for each arrow and call out the results to be recorded on the respective shooter's scorecards by their Scorekeepers.
 - i. If the two designated scorers cannot agree on a score another member of the group will break the tie other than the shooter whose arrow is being scored.
 - ii. In classes with only three shooters in the group the shooter will receive the higher score of the two scorers.
 - iii. ASA Range Officials will not make arrow calls except when a group has only two shooters, or during special competitions.
- c. Target "Pass Through" or "Rebound" without striking another arrow:
 - i. Arrows passing through the front of, but still in, the target will be pushed back and scored;


- ii. If the group agrees that an arrow passed through the targets insert seam the shooter will be given a score based on the point of pass through not to exceed eight (8) points;
- iii. If the group agrees and confirms that the arrow actually passed through the target scoring area due to the high number of arrows that had been shot at the target, the range official is to be notified to have the core replaced and the shooter will be allowed to take the score where the "pass-through" occurred as determined by the group up to a maximum score of ten (10) points; and
- iv. If the group agrees that the arrow rebounded out of the target without striking another, the shooter can take the score up to a maximum of ten (10) points. Special Note: A score of 12 will not be permitted under sections 2, 3 or 4 of this paragraph.
- d. An arrow that glances off and goes past the target will be scored as a "0" (includes glancing off a plastic leg.)
- e. Any arrow **embedding** ("Robin Hood") in the nock of another arrow will be scored the same as the arrow it is embedded in.
- f. Any arrow **rebounding** backward off another Arrow (a "Robin Hood" that strikes and damages another arrow and does not proceed toward the target but bounces back) will be scored the same as the arrow it struck, provided the damaged arrow can be identified.
- g. Any arrow **deflecting** by contact with another arrow already in the target and still proceeding toward the target will be scored where it lies in the target, or a maximum of five (5) points if it is not in the target.
- h. Arrows in the corresponding area of the target will be scored with point values of 5, 8, 10, or 12.
- 10. Top Archer Award: A Top Archer award will be handed out for the top male and top female score, determined by combining the qualifying score from the Target Competition and the 3-D score. Ties will be broken by combined count of x's from Target and 12's from 3-D.
- 11. Awards: Cash Awards will be issued based on the number of shooters in each class. Additional awards will be given at the discretion of HLSR.



This show is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

Special Rules for Ranching & Wildlife Poster Board Competition

- 1. **Purpose:** To engage TX 4-H and FFA Members in activities that promote the conservation and/or enhancement of TX wildlife and native landscapes.
- 2. Participation: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo™ (HLSR) makes available to County Extension Agents (CEAs) and Agricultural Science Teachers (ASTs) in charge of 4-H or FFA programs the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Poster Board Contest, subject to the posted rules. The opportunity to enter 4-H and FFA members in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Poster Board Contest is made available only to CEAs and ASTs supervising these members. In no event shall any CEA or AST be considered to be an agent of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for any purpose.

Contestants in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Poster Board Contest are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this competition.

3. Eligibility:

- a. See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Judging Contests
- b. Only Senior Division Participants are eligible. Participants must be 14 to 19 years of age as of August 31, 2024

4. Rules of Entry:

- b. Entry Fee: The entry fee will be \$10
- c. Signatures: All contestants must have the required original signatures (contestant, AST/CEA, parent/guardian, and notarization).
- **d.** Entry Requirements: There is no limit to the number of individuals each club/chapter may enter. The right is reserved, by Management, to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry.

 - ii) Indemnity form for each participant must arrive with entry packets.
 - Entries will not be accepted via paper entry.
 Refunds -There will be no refunds of fees for accepted entries.

5. Project Guidelines:

- a. Each exhibitor may enter only one (1) project.
- **b.** Projects must focus on the conservation and/or enhancement of native TX wildlife habitat affecting multiple native TX wildlife species or impacting a particular native TX wildlife species.
 - a. Migratory species that pass-through TX will be allowed, but the project must contain beneficial management components for that species specific to native TX habitat.
 - b. Species that have been extirpated from the state will not be allowed (i.e. Elk, Red Wolf, Jaguar, etc.).
 - c. No projects focused <u>solely</u> on domesticated farm animals or exotic species will be allowed (i.e. Axis Deer, Feral Hogs, etc.). However, projects that focus on management strategies that impact domestic livestock and/or exotic species for the benefit and/or enhancement of native TX wildlife species (both plant and animal) will be allowed.
 - d. Naturalized, non-native, wildlife species (i.e. honey bees, ring-necked pheasant, etc) may be selected as a topic provided that the project covers how they fit in the native ecosystem and how management of these species benefits those areas and the native animals found therein.

Special Rules for Wildlife Poster Board Competition

- e. Projects that include specific management practices that landowners/managers can implement to benefit native TX wildlife species or native habitats will receive the **most** consideration.
- c. Projects must consist of a 36"x48" display board (36"x24" when folded). *Please note this size, all other board sizes will be **disqualified**.
- d. Display boards may contain text, photos, diagrams, charts, drawings, and samples.
- e. All content must be attached securely and fit on the display board such that unfolding the board is the full extent of setup.
- f. No additional props, header board, or dioramas may be included. The board must be able to fold flat for storage.
- g. Name of contestant must be printed on back of the project board and may not appear on the front.
- **h.** Projects should be self-explanatory and may include the results of original research or a summarization of existing research in order to draw conclusions relevant to the topic.
- i. Each exhibitor must clearly cite the work of others within the display and submit a separate bibliography in MLA format with a heading for primary references to be listed first, followed by secondary references. Examples of MLA format can be found at <u>http://aresearchguide.com/12biblio.html</u>. Works cited should be displayed on the lower right corner on the back of the poster (when viewed from the rear). Failure to credit the work of others will result in disqualification.
- 6. Display and Future Usage Rights: All projects will remain in the possession of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and may be placed on display during the Ranching and Wildlife Expo. Participants grants permission to the HLSR the use of their posters for display and contest promotion through television, film, video, visual, printed media, promotional publications, and other media, without compensation. Entries will not be returned.
- 7. Judging: Projects will be judged on the quality and accuracy of the information presented and the relevance of the project to the conservation or enhancement of native TX wildlife and wildlife habitats. Judges will have final decision on advancement to the oral competition.
 - a. Poster Board Judging will use the following assessment, with scores added for total points out of 100:
 - i. **Focus:** Does the project focus on the conservation and/or enhancement of a <u>native</u> TX wildlife habitat or species? Does the project include specific & beneficial management strategies/practices that individual and/or business landowners can implement for that habitat or species? (Points out of 30)
 - ii. **Appearance:** Is the project displayed well with legible titles and clear content information? Does it draw the reader's attention to the research being presented? (Points out of 20)
 - iii. **Self-Explanatory:** Is the project self-explanatory? Does the participant draw a conclusion or summarize existing/original research? (Points out of 30)
 - Works Cited: Is the work of others properly identified? Are the sources relevant and credible? *Sources acceptable: .gov, .edu or some .org website. Sources not accepted: google.com, wikipedia.com. (Points out of 20)
 - b. Oral Judging will use the following assessment, with a score 1-10 on each item, 40 points max total score:
 - i. Does the contestant present strongly with clear and accurate information?
 - ii. Does the contestant address current management strategies and provide advice for beneficial conservation strategies/practices that individual and/or business landowners can implement?
 - iii. Does the contestant have fluent content knowledge? Is the contestant able to provide adequate and accurate responses to questions?
 - iv. Does the contestant have a logical flow and comprehensive message for the presentation?
- 8. Finalists: Exhibitors of the top ten (10) projects and two (2) alternates will be notified on or before the date listed for Finalist Notifications and will be required to present their project before a panel of judges and an audience on the date listed above for the Finalist Presentations.
 - a. Oral presentations will be limited to ten (10) minutes with an additional five (5) minute question and answer period with the judges. Presentation order will be decided by participant sign-up sheet on the day of judging.
 - b. Visual aids for the oral presentation will consist of a PowerPoint presentation. Information in the PowerPoint presentation shall be limited to what was included on the display board.
 - c. Judges scores from the oral presentations will be combined with preliminary scores from the judging of the display boards to determine final ranking of the top ten contestants.
 - d. If an exhibitor is unwilling or unable to attend the presentation, Show Management reserves the right to invite the next highest placing exhibitor to compete for the top positions.
 - i) Exhibitors unwilling or unable to attend the finals must give HLSR adequate notice of at least one week except in the case of personal illness.
 - (1) Failure to provide notice could result in an inability to participate in this contest in the future.
 - e. Alternates will be contacted if a spot in the finals comes available. Alternates do not need to come to the presentations unless they are contacted

- 1. **Purpose:** To engage Texas 4-H and FFA Members in activities that promote the conservation and/or enhancement of Texas wildlife and native landscapes.
- 2. Participation: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] (HLSR) makes available to County Extension Agents (CEAs) and Agricultural Science Teachers (ASTs) in charge of 4-H or FFA programs the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Video Competition, subject to the posted rules. This event is limited to Texas 4-H and FFA students who meet all Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Junior Show Rules and Requirements. Projects exhibited must have been constructed by 4-H and FFA members under the direct supervision of the CEA or AST. In no event shall any CEA or AST be considered an agent of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for any purpose.

Contestants in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Video Competition are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this competition.

3. Eligibility

- a. See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Judging Contests
- b. Only Senior Division Participants are eligible. Participants must be 14 to 19 years of age as of August 31, 2024.
- c. All videos must be written, shot, produced and submitted in their entirety by one to five members from the same 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. An executed HLSR Exhibitor Indemnity form is required from each person distinctly featured or involved in the production of the video.

4. Rules of Entry:

- a. Entry: Entries MUST be submitted online at http://www.rodeohouston.com/Get-Involved/Exhibitors-Participants/Livestock-Show through CEA/AST. Entries should be submitted prior to midnight, December 1, 2024. Entries submitted after December 1 through December 5 will incur a \$250 late fee, per Club or Chapter. No entry will be accepted unless entry fees accompany entry forms.
- b. Entry Fee: The entry fee will be \$10
- c. **Signatures:** All contestants must have the required original signatures (contestant, AST/CEA, parent/guardian, and notarization).
- d. Entry Submission: Each exhibitor must submit the following in advance to be eligible for competition:
 - i. Videos MUST be uploaded to a YouTube account and marked as UNLISTED or PUBLIC (not private) by the date specified for submission above. Exhibitors are required to submit their video URL electronically to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo website between the dates of December 15, 2024 and January 10, 2025. The video can be submitted online by the exhibitor, parent/legal guardian, or AST/CEA. The exhibitor's date of birth and last 4 digits of their social security are needed to log into the site for submission. Exhibitors failing to submit the required video URL by the deadline of January 10, 2025 are ineligible to compete.
 - ii. If an exhibitor does not follow the documentation guidelines outlined above, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Superintendent, Show Management and Judges.
- e. **Entry Limitation:** There is no limit on the number of completed videos that a county or chapter may submit, but no member may participate in the production of more than one video entry.

5. Project Guidelines:

a. Video Requirements:

- i. Video quality should be 1080p: 1920x1080 or higher.
- ii. The video must be an original work.
- Finalists will be required to re-submit entries in one of the following formats: USB Drive containing the video file: QuickTime movie (.mov), Windows Media (.avi), or as an MPEG 4 (.mp4) (standard, HD and Ultra HD 4K quality)
 - Drive should be mailed to Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Attn: Livestock Coordinator, NRG Center, Three NRG Park, Houston, TX 77054 or can be dropped off at the office no later than February 26, 2023.
- b. Music: If music is used, it MUST be licensed or royalty free. Entries containing unlicensed music will be declined.
- c. **Time:** Each video shall be a minimum of one (1) minute in length and a maximum of three (3) minutes. Points will be deducted for time violations.
- d. **Topic Divisions:** All videos should depict aspects of conservation and/or enhancement of native Texas wildlife habitat affecting multiple native Texas wildlife species or impacting a particular native Texas wildlife species with appeal to a public audience (such as a private landowner or an urban audience) as a top priority. Topics of interest include, but are not limited to the following:
 - Wildlife/Plant Species: Any native Texas wildlife or plant species, their conservation and/or management, conservation issues/threats, and their role in the larger habitat. Migratory species that pass-through Texas will be allowed, but the project must contain beneficial management components for that species specific to native Texas habitat.
 - ii. Native Texas Habitat: Any native Texas wildlife habitat affecting multiple native Texas wildlife species or impacting a particular native Texas wildlife species, conservation issues affecting that habitat, conservation/enhancement practices for that habitat and threats pending for that habitat.
 - iii. Ranching/Wildlife Management Technique/Practice: Any management practices that landowners/managers can implement to benefit native Texas wildlife species or native habitats, tools required, methodology of practice, benefits to the native habitat/species and considerations for using that management technique/practice.

Species that have been extirpated from the state will not be allowed (i.e. Elk, Red Wolf, Jaguar, etc.). No projects focused <u>solely</u> on domesticated farm animals or exotic species will be allowed (i.e. Axis Deer, Feral Hogs, etc.). However, projects that focus on management strategies that impact domestic livestock and/or exotic species for the benefit and/or enhancement of native TX wildlife species (both plant and animal) will be allowed. Naturalized, non-native, wildlife species (i.e. honey bees, ring-necked pheasant, etc) may be selected as a topic provided that the project covers how they fit in the native ecosystem and how management of these species benefits those areas and the native animals found therein.

All videos submitted will be judged together and will not be evaluated by division. Videos cannot show animals or people in harmful situations.

13. Judging Criteria:

Each video will be judged against the following set of judging criteria and final score will be based on total points awarded for each video. The elements for judging the videos will be:

IMPACT (Max Points: 15)

Impact is the sense one gets upon viewing the video for the first time. Compelling videos evoke wonder, laughter, sadness, anger, pride, or another intense emotion.

CREATIVITY (Max Points: 10)

Creativity is the original, fresh, and innovative selection of topic and video content to convey an idea, message or thought.

TECHNICAL (Max Points: 30)

Technical is the quality of the image itself as it is presented for viewing, which includes the following aspects:

- allowable amounts of retouching and adjustments
- sharpness and correct color balance.
- lighting, which includes the use and control of light.
- · posing and capturing of the video

COMPOSITION (Max Points: 30)

Composition is important to the design of the video, bringing all of the visual elements together in concert to express the purpose. Proper composition holds the video in a simple flow of information and scenes while making one piece as a final product.

STORY TELLING (Max Points: 15)

Story Telling refers to the video's ability to evoke imagination. One beautiful thing about art is that each viewer might collect his own message or read her own story.

Contestants in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Young Guns Shooting Sports are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this competition.

- 2. Eligibility: Participation in the Young Guns Shooting Sports Division is limited to TX resident students, who are members of a TX 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Exhibitors must be United States citizens and possess a valid social security number to be eligible for participation in the Show. Exhibitors must be enrolled in, and attending, public or private elementary or secondary schools in TX. Students must be between the ages of 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and 18 on or before Aug. 31, 2024. Each FFA Chapter and 4-H Club must be a member in good standing with its state and National affiliates. Involvement in international or national events does NOT disgualify otherwise eligible shooters.
 - a. Junior Participant Classification 8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024
 - b. Senior Participant Classification 14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024
 - c. Contestants also must have been coached in a bona fide TX Agricultural Science Clay Target Shooting program (381 AG Clays) or TX 4-H Shooting Sports shotgun project within the 2024 or 2025 calendar year.
 - d. Contestants also must have competed in a minimum of one of the following in order to be eligible to enter the HLSR Junior Sporting Clays Shoot:
 - i. Texas Agricultural Science Clay Target Shooting competitions (381 AG Clays) within the 2024 or 2025 calendar year.
 - ii. Texas 4-H Shooting Sports sanctioned shotgun competitions within the 2024 or 2025 calendar year.
 - e. A contestant is not eligible if already graduated from high school.
- 3. Ineligible Exhibitors: 4-H and FFA members are considered to be eligible by the Houston Livestock Show for participation in the Junior Livestock Show at the time completed online entries are received. Any AST/CEA who has a member who becomes ineligible to participate, for any reason, must provide written and signed notification to the appropriate Superintendent of the Livestock Show at least 24 hours prior to the commencement of any Junior Show activity in which the ineligible exhibitor was to participate. If an exhibitor is determined ineligible, then the entry is ineligible.
 - a. **Foreign Exchange Students:** Non-United States citizens and Foreign Exchange students are ineligible to compete in the HLSR Ranching & Wildlife Young Guns Shooting Sports. All Contestants must be United States citizens and possess a valid social security number to be eligible for participation in the Show.
- 4. **Exhibitor Code of Ethics:** Per Rule 31 of the General Rules: The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] is a family friendly event. As such, an individual's conduct as an exhibitor or patron should be exemplary, and violators are subject to disqualification or removal from Show grounds.
 - a. Violations include, but are not limited to:
 - i. Disruptive or improper conduct
 - ii. Public display of profanity of any sort
 - iii. Violence of any sort
 - iv. Providing alcohol to underage persons or providing a space for the consumption of alcohol by underage persons.
 - v. Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol by underage persons
 - vi. Possession of an open alcohol container in a public area regardless of the individual's age
 - vii. Excessive consumption of alcohol
 - b. - 6. Entry Format: Entry will open in mid-October and will close on February 1, 2025 or when the maximum entry limit is reached. Each entry will consist of one (1) Sporting Clays, one (1) Modified 5-Stand and one (1) Skeet Entry for the entered Exhibitor for a single price of \$225
 - a. Each Individual will select to compete on Either Friday or Saturday in Sporting Clays, Skeet and Modified 5-Stand
 - b. At the time of entry you will select your Sporting Clays Flight which will determine the Skeet and Modified 5-Stand rotations available to you as listed below both Friday and Saturday will use the same breakdown (Skeet and Modified 5-Stand rotations will be assigned based on the Sporting Clays Rotation chosen)
 - ii. 8:00 a.m. Sporting Clays is paired with Modified 5-Stand Rotations from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and Skeet Rotations from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.
 - iii. 11:00 a.m. Sporting Clays is paired with Modified 5-Stand Rotations from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. and Skeet Rotations from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m.
 - iv. 2:15 p.m. Sporting Clays is paired with Modified 5-Stand Rotations from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. and Skeet Rotations from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

7. Event Format:

- a. **Sporting Clays:** Shooters will be broken up into squads and scheduled to shoot on 1 of 3 courses. 40 shooters, 10 from each age and gender class, will advance to the Championship Round on Sunday, Feb 12. The list of shooters who advance to the Championship Round will be announced on Saturday, Feb. 11, following the final score tabulation.
 - i. **Targets** 100 targets per shooter
 - ii. Classes
 - 1. Senior Male (14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 2. Junior Male (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 3. Senior Female (14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 4. Junior Female (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - iii. Championship Round 100 targets per shooter
- b. Skeet:
- i. Targets 50 targets per shooter
- ii. Classes
 - 1. Senior Male (14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 2. Junior Male (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 3. Senior Female (14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 4. Junior Female (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
- iii. Championship Round 50 targets per shooter
 - 1. NSSA shootoff procedures will be followed
 - 2. Ties from the qualifying round will be shot off to determine the top 10 shooters in each age and gender class
 - 3. Any ties for championship places will shoot off immediately following the championship skeet round

- c. Modified 5-Stand: Shooters will be assigned a set of time slots based on their Sporting Clays and Skeet slots.
 - i. Targets: 50
 - ii. Classes
 - 1. Senior Male (14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 2. Junior Male (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 3. Senior Female (14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - 4. Junior Female (8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024)
 - iii. Championship Round: There will not be a championship round for Modified 5-Stand
 - 1. Ties will be broken by shootoffs
 - d. High Overall Award
 - i. HOA calculation will include the Finals Scores from Sporting Clays and Skeet as well as the score from Modified 5-Stand
 - ii. Only one HOA will be calculated including the individuals from all 4 classes (Senior Male, Senior Female, Junior Male and Junior Female).
- 8. **Shootoffs/Tie Breakers:** For Sporting Clays the top 10 scores will be invited back Sunday for the Championship Round. If there are any ties for the 10th spot, all the ties will participate in the championship round. For Skeet the top 10 scores will be invited back Sunday for the Championship Skeet Round. If there are any ties for the 10th spot in each division a shoot off will take place to determine the competitor that will advance to the championship round.
 - a. NSCA procedures will be followed for any necessary shootoffs/tie breakers in Sporting Clays.
 - b. NSSA procedures will be followed for any necessary shootoffs/tie breakers in Skeet
 - c. Following the Championship rounds for Sporting Clays and Skeet, shoot offs will take place to determine all places that are tied, except if otherwise specified by shoot management and published at registration table.
 - d. If weather or other unforeseen circumstances make shoot offs impossible, HLSR reserves the right to use alternative means to determine results.
- 9. Check-In: All shooters must check-in prior to mandatory orientation. Shooters will be given credentials in the form of a back number at check-in that must be displayed at all times while shooting. Check-in will be open based on the schedule above. Back numbers must be picked up prior to entering orientation. It is recommended that check-in be done on Friday, as event day schedules will be adhered to. NO LATE ARRIVALS WILL BE ACCEPTED. NO EXCEPTIONS!
- 10. **Orientation:** Orientations will be conducted before each flight on based on the schedule above. Orientation is mandatory for everyone who will participate in events that day. Shooters must attend any one of the scheduled orientations. Failure to attend orientation will result in disqualification.
- 11. Squadding: Squad members will be assigned on a random basis. No special request accommodations will be made. Squadding will be posted online at the <u>iClays website</u>, by February 6. <u>Contestants should check periodically, as</u> <u>updates/changes may be made even after this date.</u>
- 12. **Range Safety:** The safety of all involved is of paramount importance. All range safety rules will be strictly enforced. Any shooter failing to conform to safety standards will be warned or disqualified from the event. Minor infractions will be noted and marked on the shooter's badge. Repeated infractions or major safety violations will result in disqualification from the event
- 13. **Open and Empty:** All firearms will remain open and empty until the shooter is on the shooting station and it is his/her turn to shoot. The firearm must be open and empty before leaving the shooting station.
- 14. **Muzzle Control:** Shooters must maintain safe control of their muzzles at all times. Regardless of condition, muzzles may not be pointed toward or rested upon any part of the body of the shooter or another person. This includes the use of toe pads. The only exception is the limited exposure required in changing chokes. Violation of this rule may result in warning, disqualification from a round, or disqualification from a match.

- 15. **Eye Protection:** Shooting glasses or equivalent prescription glasses are required for all events. All persons on any course are required to have eye protection, including range personnel, and shooters.
- 16. Ear Protection: All persons on any course are required to have hearing protection. Either ear plugs or ear muffs may be worn at the discretion of the shooter, or range officer; but proper hearing protection is required. Electronic devices, other than those specifically designed for hearing protection only, are forbidden on the shooting field forward of the safe line. This includes, but is not limited to, radios, CD players, MP3's, walkie-talkies, and cell phones. One set of complimentary ear plugs will be in each shooter packet. Observers should provide their own ear protection.
- 17. Firearms: Any 12 gauge or smaller fired from the shoulder shotgun, which conforms to NSSA rules.
- Ammunition: NO RELOADS NSCA PERMITTED FACTORY AMMUNITION ONLY- Shooters must furnish their own appropriate ammunition. It is vitally important to allow extra ammunition for practice rounds, shoot-offs, malfunctions, or other contingencies. Ammunition is subject to inspection and verification.
 - a. No load may contain more than 1 1/8 ounces of shot.
 - b. No load may contain any shot larger than Number 7 1/2.
 - c. All loads must contain lead shot.
- 19. **Field and Range Boundaries:** For multiple reasons, control of traffic on and around all fields and ranges is essential. Please respect these boundaries and the directions of the officials.
- 1. Weather/Emergency Contingency: The shoot will take place rain or shine. In the event that the shoot is shut down for unavoidable inclement weather or other situations beyond our control, the event will start back up once it is safe to do so and we are allowed by GHSC Staff. In the event that events must be postponed, we will work with GHSC staff to reschedule. In the event that a reschedule is impossible, full or partial refunds will be granted to those unable to participate in an event. The awards will be distributed based on those who completed their rounds in each event.
- Disruption: Parents, coaches, and other individuals should remain positive and supportive, being careful not to disrupt
 or exhibit behaviours deemed detrimental to shooters or the operation of the match. Sanctions ranging from warning to
 ejection from the grounds or disqualification of shooters may be imposed for interference with the operation of the match
 or disruption of the events on a firing line or field.
- 3. Alcohol Policy: Alcohol is not allowed on the GHSC grounds. Consumption use and possession of alcohol by persons under the age of 21 is prohibited by law and is not permitted anywhere on the grounds at any time.
- 4. **Drug Policy:** Shooting is not allowed while under the influence of any drug or prescription medications that effect judgement and conduct to a degree that a participant is unsafe.
- 5. **Tobacco Policy:** Smoking is not permitted on or near the firing lines or in any area where it would be considered inappropriate or is a situation where the smoke constitutes interference to shooters. Smoking use and possession of tobacco products (including smokeless) by minors is prohibited by law and is not permitted anywhere on the grounds at any time.
- 6. Interference: If any contestant, in any way, whether in person or by agent, or servant, interferes with the judges during their adjudication, or shows disrespect to them, to the show or competition, they are subject to be penalized. Management may demand a proper apology from the contestant, may exclude him/her from competition, bar him/her from the grounds/GHSC, and may also withhold any prizes that may have been awarded.

- 7. **Photographs:** All photographs taken by the official photographer become property of the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo. Unofficial (i.e. personal) photographs may not be published without the written approval of Management. Contestants wishing to purchase photographs must contact the official photographer.
 - a. Commercial photography and filming are often conducted at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. You may be depicted in photographs or video recordings of any Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo event, and by entering the grounds/GHSC and/or competitive events associated with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, you consent to the use of any depictions in connection with advertising, news reporting, public relations, webcasts or other broadcasts, or any other activities relating to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, and you further release and waive all claims for compensation and any rights of review and approval, copyright, and right of publicity with respect thereto.
- 8. Property/Security: All contestants or persons in charge of property, shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and GHSC do not undertake to do so and shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property of contestants thereof. All contestants are responsible for security of their own property. The contestant is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their property. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and GHSC is not responsible for the acts of a third party.
- 9. Official Scores: The official score is the record kept by the referee/scorer on a sheet furnished him/her by Management. The referee/scorer's decision in whether a target is dead or lost is final. All reported scores are checked for accuracy and corrections will be made when required. Shoot officials maintain the objective of producing timely, accurate and complete scoring records for each event. They do not represent any club, county, team, or individual. The Young Guns Superintendent(s) will be responsible for conducting any and all aspects of the event pertaining to "shooting". Including, but not limited to: squadding, scoring, posting of scores, determination and conducting shoot-offs, determination of winners, and rule interpretation.
 - i. Scorecards and clipboards will be carried by a Squad Host to the next station. Parents, coaches, observers and shooters should never have possession of scorecards.
- 10. **Appeals:** A shooter may appeal a ruling on the field immediately if he/she feels a referee has missed a call. Once the shooter has called for another target, leaves the station, or the next shooter has fired, such right of appeal is lost. The referee may seek assistance from the scorer or may poll the squad at his or her discretion. The decision of the referee on the field is final and not subject to further appeal. Parent/coach scoring is not official scoring and will not be consulted.
- 11. **Protests:** Shooters may only protest any injustice, violation of the rules, or other circumstance that may have resulted in placing them at a disadvantage relative to other shooters. Such conditions must be reported to the Superintendent(s) immediately. All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a \$300 deposit which will not be returned if protest is not sustained by Show Management. Protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Show Management immediately after the occasion that prompted the protest. The Protest Jury will investigate and reach final resolution of the matter as soon as possible considering all circumstances. Results of all protests are final and will be reported to the contestant.
 - a. Protest Jury will include the Superintendent(s), Assistant Superintendent(s), Director Livestock Competitions, Senior Coordinator Livestock Show, and the Greater Houston Sports Club COO.
- 12. Accommodations: Lodging is the responsibility of the shooter's party and will not be arranged by the Ranching & Wildlife Young Guns Shooting Sports.
- 13. **Coaching:** A participant may not be coached while in the shooting box. Coaching includes any communication between the coach, parent or other spectator and the shooter; verbal or non-verbal. The shooter may request assistance from the range safety officer and the range officer may assign an assistant, in the event of a malfunction.

- 14. Dress Code: Participants and spectators are required to dress appropriately. Both young people and adults should wear attire appropriate for the weather while remaining modest and socially acceptable. Shooters must wear a shirt with sleeves. Clothing deemed immodest or distracting to other shooters will not be permitted. Where eye and ear protection is required, fully enclosed shoes must be worn for safety reasons by both shooters and spectators. All shooters and coaches should consider their dress in that they may be having photographs taken or be asked to interview for the media.
- 15. **Use of Two-Way Radios:** To assist us in range and match operations, only authorized persons are permitted to use twoway radios on the grounds. Any action by either youth or adults interfering with the frequencies in use imposes a safety hazard. Deliberate disruption of range communication by anyone at the event will be considered a safety violation and will be treated as such.
- **16. Driving Carts:** Anyone driving a cart on GHSC grounds must be 16 years of age or older and posses a valid drivers license. Violation of this rule can mean expulsion from GHSC grounds for the driver and the owner of the vehicle.
- **17. Speed Limit:** The speed limit on GHSC grounds is 10 mph. Violation of this rule can mean expulsion from GHSC grounds for the driver and the owner of the vehicle.
- 18. **Personal Carts:** Personal motorized carts will be allowed with valid proof of insurance. Proof of insurance will be verified at the Event Check-In.
- Rental Carts: Cart rentals from GHSC will be available for \$100 per day. For more information or to reserve your cart, please contact Greater Houston Sports Club at (281) 437-6025 or <u>Nettie@greaterhoustonsportsclub.com</u>. Push carts will be allowed. Cart rental deadline is February 3rd.
- 20. **Practice:** GHSC will be open for practice based on the schedule above. Practice will online be available for Sporting Clays. There are no fields available for Skeet or 5-Stand practice.

- 21. Awards: The following cash prizes will be awarded to each division (Jr. Female, Jr, Male, Sr. Female, Sr. Male).
 - a. Additional Awards will also be given based on the Lewis Class System for Sporting Clays utilizing contestants' preliminary scores.
 - b. Additional awards may be given at the discretion of HLSR.

Special Rules for HLSR Trailer Build-Off Contest

- 1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Junior Show Rules, and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Eligible Entries: Entries in this division are limited to TX FFA and 4-H members. Each team is allowed up to four team members. Team members must be from the same TX FFA Chapter or 4-H Club.
- 3. Maximum Entries: Entries are limited to the first 20 teams that register via the registration link: https://secure.rodeohouston.com/Donate/Home/Index/?code=HLSRBuildOffReg. Each chapter/county will be eligible for one entry into the trailer build-off contest.
- 4. Staging and Arrival: All teams must arrive to the 11645 Almeda Rd, Houston, TX 77045 pavilion and check in prior to the safety meeting. Tools and equipment will be placed upon arrival and check in.
- 5. Tools and Equipment: Trailers will be built using the SMAW Welding process. Each team should supply the appropriate welding, cutting, and fabrication tools to complete the building of a small utility trailer (10'-12' in length). No tools will be provided by HLSR officials. Examples of tools a team should supply: Oxy-fuel cutting apparatuses, angle grinders, hand tools, levels, clamps, sawhorses, jack stands, miter saw, etc. Cordless tools are allowed and preferred when necessary. All tools must have appropriate guarding and be used in the intended manner. No thin abrasive cut-off wheels will be allowed on hand-held grinders. Cut-off wheels will need to be of the metal type similar to Lenox diamond edge wheel. All tools and equipment must be contained inside the designated work and equipment space. Note: electricity will not be supplied.
- 6. Welding Process: Trailers will be constructed using team provided SMAW welding equipment. Multiple welding machines are allowed provided they are in the confines of the work and equipment space for each team. A team may use the electrode of their choice. The following electrodes will be provided, 3/32"-7018, 1/8" 6010, 1/8"-7018. If you wish to use a different electrode, those will need to be provided by the team.
- 7. Trailer construction: Trailers will be constructed using typical structural materials such as angle iron, square or rectangle tube, pipe, channel iron, flat plate, etc. Appropriate tools will need to be on hand to work with these types of materials.

Special Rules for HLSR Trailer Build-Off Contest

- 8. Safety Meeting: A safety meeting will be held before any work begins. All team members and advisors must attend the safety meeting.
- **9. Construction:** During construction, only team members and HLSR officials are allowed in the "hot" work area. Teams will be allowed 15 minutes to consult with their advisor away from the work zone. This time can be used at any point during the day. Construction will begin after the safety meeting and will conclude 8 hours later.
- **10.** Advisors: An advisor for each team must be present throughout the day. Advisors are welcome to observe their team from the public viewing area, but advisors are not allowed to enter the work zone. No coaching or assisting from the observation area.
- 11. Material Provided: All materials will be provided for trailer construction. Material will be pre-cut, however some final trimming or fitting may be required. A cut list and detailed plans will be provided for each team. If there is a discrepancy of the parts provided teams must let HLSR officials know within 30 minutes of the start of construction. Only material provided should be used on the trailer, limited extra material will be available for recuts if a team scraps a piece.
- **12.** Evaluation: Teams will be evaluated on safety procedures, site cleanliness, and teamwork throughout the day. At the conclusion of the trailer construction teams will be evaluated on specific criteria such as weld quality, ability to follow design plans, placement of materials, squareness, etc.
- **13. Loadout:** All teams must provide a way to transport their trailer home. HLSR will provide loading equipment and assistance the day of the contest.
- 14. HLSR Ag Mechanics Project Show: Trailers built during the build off will be eligible for entry in the following year HLSR Ag Mechanics Project Show. All trailers for the build off will be entered into a dedicated class. All trailers returning must meet the HLSR Ag Mechanics Project show rules. Each trailer is expected to have minimum modifications to the structure as it was designed. Paint, flooring, lights, etc. will need to be installed prior to the Ag Mech Project Show. Note: Trailer Build-Off projects are not eligible for Ag Mech Show Division and Overall Grand or Reserve Grand Champion Ag Mechanics Project.

Special Rules for Agricultural Mechanics Project Show

- 1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Eligible Entries: Entries in this division are limited to TX FFA and 4-H members. Projects exhibited must have been constructed by FFA and 4-H members under direct supervision of the CEA or AST.
- 3. Maximum Entries: Each exhibitor may enter only one individual project. Each group of students may enter no more than two group constructed projects and may have no more than one entry in any project class. No individual exhibitor may enter more than two projects, either group and/or individually constructed.
- 4. Staging and Arrival: All projects will stage at the Staging Lot located at 1901 Airport Blvd. Gates will open at 10 p.m.. No projects will be allowed to stage prior to 10 p.m. Projects will be begin releasing from the Staging Lot to NRG Center at 2 a.m.
- 5. Classification of Projects: Projects are to be classified by primary use or function. Projects will be classified during the check in process. Show superintendent or classification committee reserve the right to modify the classification of projects due to entry into the wrong class, misrepresented projects, or otherwise in conflict with class descriptions. All projects must be related to agriculture use and be appropriate for the intended class. The classification of project entries will take place at the Staging Lot, prior to being released to NRG Center. Projects that do not fit within a class will not be allowed to show. No recreational type projects are allowed in any part of the show. This includes, but is not limited to, watercraft, R.V.'s, camping equipment, tiny houses, boat trailers, cooking equipment, and hunting and wildlife equipment.
- 6. **Project Check–In:** Exhibitor(s) will be responsible for individually checking in their entry. Entries not properly checked in will not be able to show. The exhibitor will need the following information:
 - a. Project Location

The Exhibitor(s) will be responsible for making sure the information entered is accurate and if there are any issues, the exhibitor MUST make any corrections with the Superintendent Office prior to the check-in closing listed in the schedule. Any discrepancies with class postings will be resolved using the information on the project's check-in summary.

7. Ineligible Projects:

- a. Any project that cannot be placed into one of the stated classes will be disqualified by the Superintendent. Barbecue cookers, deer blinds, feral hog traps, deer feeders, watercraft, R.V.'s, camping equipment, cooking equipment, yard and patio conveniences, and other recreational and/or convenience-type projects or accessories will not be allowed (Only feeders and equipment for domesticated farm animals will be allowed).
- b. Towed or hauled projects that exceed typical or legal road and highway widths, and cause city traffic flow problems are subject to disqualification and/or may not be allowed to access to Show grounds.
- c. Projects with inappropriate and/or vulgar items, signage, or other materials will be asked to remove the item from the project, or the whole project will be disqualified and removed from the show.
- 8. Substitutions: For exhibitor substitution, see Junior Show Rules. Project substitutions must be made to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, by February 1 and must indicate the project being eliminated and the project being added. Only those substitutions with official post office postmarks on or before February 1 will be accepted without fee. Substitutions postmarked after February 1, will be charged a \$50 late fee. All substitutions are subject to approval by the Superintendent.
- 9. Construction Date: A project can be exhibited only one time at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and should be completed after the preceding HLSR Ag Mechanics show.
- 10. Exhibit Space: The Show reserves the right to display the projects as space and quantity of projects allow. Projects may be double decked as long as they are safely displayed and accessible for judging. It is possible that projects might be displayed at an alternate site. <u>Buildings over 200 square feet will be disqualified</u>.
- 11. Project Presentation: All projects must be painted or properly treated and must be clean and in a presentable condition, even though they may have been used. No touch up painting of any type will be allowed once project is in place. Operation of ramps, extensions, and other special features may be demonstrated only as directed by show officials and as space permits. Floor covering, with the exception of restored tractors, is not encouraged. When used, it must be limited to the floor area under individual projects. No additional floor space will be provided for podiums, chairs, tables, show boxes, etc. Electrical outlets may be provided upon request at check-in but are not guaranteed.
- 12. Documentation: An original plan or drawing, a bill of materials and photographs showing all phases of construction are to be provided with projects. All documentation pictures, captions, and descriptions should be prepared using an electronic format. CAD drawings are encouraged, but not mandatory. TxDOT and/or ASABE regulations and specifications must be provided as they apply to individual projects. Trailers should have a temporary or permanent license plate upon arrival. Display of plans, photos, etc. must be done in such a manner that no additional floor space is required. Stands, podiums, computers, etc. will be permitted only when they can be positioned on or under the project.
- **13. Project Safety:** Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels, and other projects that need support. Sharp edges and points, such as those found on self-feeder roofs, bale movers, etc., are to be padded or covered as necessary to prevent injury.
- 14. Trailer Safety: All trailers and other equipment that is to be operated and/or transported on public roads are to be equipped with the safety equipment specified in Title 7, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration or Vehicles and Traffic Transportation Code of TX Statutes. All tongue equipment that is pulled on a public highway for example: trailers, squeeze chutes, mowers, tillage tools, etc. must have approved safety chains. All trailers that are rated at 4,500 pounds GWR or greater must have approved brakes and brake-away. All trailers must be equipped with lift jacks for hitching and unhitching. Tie down attachments (minimum of 4) are recommended on all trailers. Any trailer that is over width (102 inches) must have a current permit. Trailer widths will be measured from metal to metal, including for example, fenders, wheels, and dust caps, at the widest point. Trailers should follow Federal Safety lighting requirements as described by the NHTSA. A link to the lightning requirements has been provided for convenience:

http://optronicsinc.com/RESOURCES/FMVSSRequirements/Trailers.aspx. Any trailer that does not meet these requirements may lose points during the judging process.

- **15. Electrical Safety:** All 120 VAC and higher electrical plugs and receptacles are to be the equipment grounding type. All metal components are to be grounded. Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) are mandatory for all 120 VAC receptacles where moisture could be present. All 50 VAC and higher connections are to be protected in appropriate indoor or outdoor rated enclosures.
- 16. Chemical and Liquid Safety: Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be used, stored, or sprayed inside of any Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo building at any time. This shall include, but not be limited to: enamel paints, thinners, reducers, gasoline, or any other petroleum-based liquids. All liquids must be in properly labeled original containers. No compressed gas cylinders are permitted. Decoy cylinders are NOT permitted.

- **17. Projects Needing Offloading Assistance:** Projects to be hoisted from the top-side are to be fitted with lifting eyes at balance points that accommodate 1-inch shackles. Projects to be lifted using forks should have appropriate fork pockets and pick points. Projects that cannot be safely off-loaded or set-up with equipment available may be disqualified. Projects requiring prolonged unloading or assembly time, will be attended to after all other projects are offloaded. Transport trailers loaded in a manner that is unsafe to be towed into the display area with a move-in tractor will be towed in by the exhibitor, as space is available, after all other projects are in place.
- **18. Projects with Small Engines:** There is to be no more than two gallons of fuel in any fuel tank. The fuel tank cap is to be in place and sealed with tape. The battery is to be disconnected. This applies to all engines in the exhibit area.
- **19.** Vehicles: Tractors, trucks, ATVs or other vehicles (including non-entered trailers) are not allowed in the exhibit area as part of the display, unless approved by the Superintendent.
- 20. Signs: All projects are to be identified with standard club exhibitor cards. No "For Sale" or sponsorship signs will be permitted.
- 21. Loss or Damage: Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, officials or committee members will NOT be responsible for any loss or damage to projects.
- 22. Judging System: The Danish System will be used in judging the projects. Projects will be judged on:

Minimum Judging Criteria Expectations

a. Workmanship (25 points)

Projects should be constructed in a neat and clean manner. Care should be taken so material is fit well, welds are of appropriate size and quantity, sharp edges and weld spatter are removed from material, but grinding/sanding is not excessive, electrical connections are secure and neat, exposed wire is kept to a minimum, and material is joined in a manner that is aesthetically pleasing.

b. Functionality (25 points)

Projects should be constructed in such a manner they can function while at the time of show. Projects should be free from mechanical, hydraulic, or electrical malfunctions. Consideration will be given where space limits the ability to operate, such as a ramp hitting another project if it was to open.

c. Design and Material Used (10 points)

Material used should be considered by each individual showman. The material should match the purpose and the function of the project. Students should be knowledgeable about any specific, special, or unique material used during the construction of the project.

d. Presentation (10 points)

Students should be knowledgeable about the project they are presenting. They should be able to describe in detail, when requested, processes used in the construction of their project. Students should be able to answer questions pertaining to the end use, purpose, and functionality of the project they are presenting. Students should present projects in a professional and courteous manner.

e. Finish and/or Preservation (10 points)

Each project should be finished in an appropriate manner. Some projects, such as welding shop tables, may have portions where no finish is appropriate. The applied finish should match the use of the project and applied in an accepted manner. Students should be involved in the finishing process as much as possible, and at minimum have knowledge of the application process.

f. Documentation (10 points)

Students will be evaluated on the presentation of their documentation. Documentation requirements are listed in the general rules above. Complete lack of documentation will result in a ribbon color deduction.

g. Difficulty (10 points)

Inherently some projects are more difficult than others. The difficulty of the projects will be evaluated by each set of judges based on the amount of fabrication, design engineering, and innovation within the given project. **Difficulty (10 points)**

- **23.** Ag Mechanics Career Fair: On Saturday, March 16 from 9 a.m. Noon & 1 p.m. 5 p.m. all junior and senior high school exhibitors will have the opportunity to participate in the HLSR Ag Mechanics Career Fair. There is no additional entry fee required for students to participate. Students who choose to participate in the career fair will need to place a visible placard/note for the judges to know the student(s) are currently at the career fair. There are no penalties or deductions during project judging for those participating in the career fair. The class judges will come back to the project when students are present to resume judging of the project.
- 24. Awards: Ribbons will be given as follows: Blue, Red, and White. Projects receiving a red or white ribbon will not be placed as class winners. Prizes are awarded to clubs/chapters and not individual exhibitors for each project.
- **25.** Showmanship Awards: Judges will select exhibitors (by entry number) to receive recognition for showmanship awards based on the following criteria:
 - a. Display and presentation of projects to show officials, judges, and the general public
 - b. Housekeeping around projects
 - c. Exhibitor's dress and professionalism
 - d. Conduct, attitude and participation of exhibitors
- **26.** Judging Courtesy: Exhibitors are not to interfere with judging. It is recommended they be with their projects as they are judged to answer questions and demonstrate operations as requested by the judges. AST/CEAs or adult leaders are not to participate in judging activities. Students participating on the Agricultural Mechanics Job Fair will not be penalized for attending the Fair. Exhibitors should not "over-recruit" passersby.

- Hay Processing and Tillage Equipment This class is for those projects built for <u>processing</u> hay at harvest, as well as post-harvest. Additionally, tillage tools should also be placed in this class. Names and descriptions to use: Hay accumulator, pull-type single bale hay trailer, hay conveyor, hay rake, chisel plow, aerator, batwing-clod buster, tandem disc, pull type road grader, etc.
- Material Processing, Sprayers, and PTO Driven Field Equipment This class is for those projects built for processing material other than hay, and projects requiring a PTO shaft, regardless of mount type. Names and descriptions to use:, Hydraulic log splitter, saw mill, grain elevator, 700 bushel grain cart, seed tender, boomless sprayer, 60' boom-type sprayer, flex-wing mower, 8' field mower, etc.

Front mounted agricultural machinery and equipment This class is for those projects attaching to the front loader of a tractor, skid steer, articulated loader, etc., but do not fit into class one or two. Names and descriptions to use: Tractor loader bucket, front mounted hay spear, skid steer mount concrete mixer, front mounted earth auger, loader mounted root rake, skid steer grapple, Skid steer mounted rotary mower, etc.

A minor modification would be adding a step or bracket for an item, adding a tailgate or ramps, extra lighting, etc. An unapproved change would be changing the length or changing the overall purpose of the trailer. Furthermore, trailers are expected to be floored, painted, and have lighting installed when returned to the Ag Mechanics Project Show. These trailers will be judged using the same criteria as all other projects. Projects will be eligible for class prizes, but not division, grand or reserve grand champion.

- 4. To provide an opportunity for public appreciation of this important phase of 4-H and FFA Youth Programs.

Special Rules for Tractor Restoration Project Show

1. **Rules:** This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

2. Eligible Entries: Entries in this division are limited to TX FFA and 4-H members. Projects exhibited must have been restored by FFA and 4-H members under direct supervision of the CEA or AST.

3. **Maximum Entries:** Each exhibitor may enter only one individual tractor project. Each group of students may enter no more than two group tractor projects. No individual exhibitor may enter more than two tractor projects, either group and/or individual.

4. Staging and Arrival: All projects will stage at the Staging Lot located at 1901 Airport Blvd. Gates will open at 10 p.m. on Thursday, March 20. No projects will be allowed to stage prior to 10 p.m. Projects will be begin releasing from the Staging Lot to NRG Center at 2 a.m.

5. Classification of Projects: Tractor projects are to be classified by year or placed into a class by the Superintendent.

6. Ineligible Projects: Any tractor project that cannot be placed into one of the stated classes will be disqualified by the Superintendent.

- a. Tractors only allowed.
- b. Self-propelled equipment such as combines, hay mowers, and cotton pickers are not eligible.
- c. Horse-drawn equipment is not allowed.

Special Rules for Tractor Restoration Project Show

8. **Restoration Date:** A tractor project can be exhibited only one time at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and must have been restored within one calendar year of the exhibition date.

9. Exhibit Space: Each tractor entry will receive a maximum of 1,000 square feet of exhibit space in the primary exhibit area. The Show reserves the right to display tractors as space and quantity of tractor projects allow. It is possible that tractor projects might be displayed at an alternate site.

10. Signs: All tractor projects are to be identified with standard club exhibitor cards. No "For Sale" or sponsorship signs will be permitted.

11. Loss or Damage: Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, officials or committee members will NOT be responsible for any loss or damage to tractor projects.

12. Awards: Ribbons will be given as follows: Blue, Red and White. Tractor projects receiving a red or white ribbon will not be placed as class winners. Prizes are awarded to clubs/chapters and not individual exhibitors for each project.

13. Showmanship Awards: Judges will select 1 or more exhibitors (by entry number) to receive recognition for showmanship based on the following criteria:

Exhibitors should not "over-recruit" passersby.

15. Judging System: A modified form of the Danish System will be used in judging the tractor projects. Content specific judging groups will use the following criteria and assigned points. Superintendent may modify criteria and points if weather or other factors result in not being able to judge outside on Friday. Detailed description of the 100 points available at the end of these rules.

16. Mechanical is to include the restoration of engine, transmission, final drive, fuel system, cooling system, cranking or starting system, charging system, hydraulic system, steering system, etc.

17. Aesthetics is to include overall appearance of tractor. This includes workmanship and finish. Items to be considered include but are not limited to: metal preparation, completeness of sheet metal, paint and finish, detail and completeness of components such as wheels, tires, steering wheels, seats, decals, instrument panels, wiring harness, etc.

18. Documentation is to be computer-generated, arranged in a three-ring binder, properly divided and sequenced, with a table of contents and page numbers. The documentation should include the following:

- One-page description of the overall restoration project;
 - i Engine disassembly
 - iiTransmission inspection and repair
 - iii Final drive inspection and repair
- b. An expense report identifying all costs of restoration;
- c. Images with captions showing the restoration process before, during and completed;
- d. Images that depict a safe working environment; and,
- e. A completed description of all mechanical work performed.
- f. Justification for color, color scheme, and/or additional equipment attached.
- g. Painting and Sheetmetal work should be documented in photos. Students should complete all paint and body work, or at minimum have knowledge of the process. Student completed paint and body work will be rewarded over professional work.

Special Rules for Tractor Restoration Project Show

Documentation should be grammatically correct; points will be deducted for spelling and grammar errors. An example of a grammatical error would be the use of the word "axel" instead of the correct "axle." The National FFA Tractor Restoration Competition format and forms may be used.

- 19. Safety equipment is to include all equipment that was original to the tractor.
 - a. It also includes the provision of drip pans containing floor absorbent to collect any liquids that may drip from the tractor during display.
 - b. Fuel shut-off valves under all fuel tanks must be functional, and tractors are to be exhibited with the valves closed.
 - c. A fully charged ABC fire extinguisher with a minimum 2.5-pound capacity must be provided with each tractor.
 - d. Extra fuel may not be stored in exhibit building. Tractor engines are to be started and run only at the request of Show Officials.
 - e. Exhibitors of tractors with steel lugs or steel tracks must provide mats or lumber/plywood to serve as runners to protect asphalt and concrete from damage.
 - f. Batteries must be disconnected and cranking, or ignition systems must be disabled on all tractors to prevent unauthorized starting while on display.
 - g. All fuel tank caps are to be in place and sealed with tape. Fuel tanks must be less than 25% filled on all engines.
 - h. LP-Gas tractors will be allowed in the exhibit area.
- **20. Originality** is to include paint color, fasteners, electrical systems, fuel systems, exhaust systems, mechanical systems, original unaltered serial plates, etc.

 21. Classes: Names and descriptions to use model year-manufacturer-model-serial number (Example: 1939 John Deere B Serial # 1112983). Note, Tractor Restoration Projects are not eligible for Ag Mech Show Placings such as Grand or Reserve Grand Champion Ag Mechanics Project.

- 1. Tractors 1950 and Older

- 4. Market Ready Tractors 1960 through present day (See item 23 for Market Ready Expectations)

22. Detailed Tractor Restoration Judging Criteria

- a. Tractor Restoration: No lawn or garden tractors allowed. No implements or non-factory accessories allowed. Exhibitors of tractors with steel lugs or steel tracks must provide mats or lumber/plywood to serve as runners to protect asphalt and concrete from damage. Batteries must be disconnected and cranking or ignition systems must be disabled on all tractors to prevent unauthorized starting while on display. All fuel tank caps are to be in place and sealed with tape. LP-Gas tractors will be allowed in the exhibit area. Fuel tanks must be less than 25% filled. Ribbons will be awarded as follows: Blue, Red, and White.
- b. Aesthetics
 - i. overall appearance of tractor
 - ii. workmanship and finish
 - iii. metal preparation, completeness of sheet metal, paint and finish
 - iv. detail and completeness of components such as wheels, tires, steering wheels, seats, decals, instrument panels, wiring harness, etc.

c. Originality

- i. paint color
- ii. fasteners
- iii. electrical systems
- iv. fuel systems
- v. exhaust systems
- vi. mechanical systems
- vii. original unaltered serial plates

d. Mechanical

- i. static evaluation
- ii. rolling evaluation
- iii. engine

- iv. transmission
- v. final drive
- vi. fuel system
- vii. cooling system
- viii. hydraulic system
- ix. steering system
- x. charging system
- xi. cranking or starting system

e. Safety Equipment all equipment that was original to the tractor

- i. drip pans containing floor absorbent
- ii. fuel shut-off valves under all fuel tanks, off
- iii. 2.5 lb. ABC fire extinguisher

f. Documentation

- i. typed text, three-ring binder with TOC and page numbers.
- ii. one page description of the overall restoration project
- iii. expense report identifying all costs of restoration
- iv. photos showing before, during and after & safe working environment
- v. complete description of all mechanical work performed

g. Note: Uniformity between shows:

- i. Manifolds and exhaust systems may be painted or coated in high temp black paint.
- ii. All rubber, including hoses, belts, electrical wiring and harness may be left unpainted even though they may have been originally painted at the factory.
- iii. Assembly bolt heads and nuts should be painted if originally painted.
- iv. Magnetos, distributors, starting motors, generators, and voltage regulators may be painted black or left unpainted. Non-rust surfaces such as aluminum or zinc coated surfaces including insulation surfaces may be left unpainted.

23. Suggested items for farm tractors entering the Market Ready Class (Class 4). Items for reconditioning maybe beyond the suggested list, and more modern tractors will have additional systems that some older tractors will not have.

Tractors are not required to be completely disassembled, as a restoration tractor does. However, tractors should be disassembled when and where needed to correct any deficiency prohibiting that tractor from safe and productive operation. Industry standards for analysis of tractor components should serve as a guideline for inspection and repair of all major components of the Market Ready Tractor Class. Complete component repair is expected for faulty parts, but OEM parts would not be required where after-market parts would be the best value. Repainting is allowed but not required. Judging criteria for Market Ready tractors will be adjusted from the Tractor Restoration criteria. Market Ready criteria will be used to evaluate tractors based on current real world economic considerations and in line with functional, safe, agricultural tractors. Exhibitors are encouraged to document all phases of tractor analysis used in deciding a) the degree to which the tractor was repaired, b) retesting to establish the tractor's final condition, and c) estimation of the tractor's initial and completed value. Exhibitors should be ready to explain "why/why not" for repairs undertaken and the diagnostic steps that lead to those decisions. While exhibitors are encouraged to select tractors where the most exhibitor skill is demonstrated. Furthermore, economic value of the Market Ready Tractors will be a portion of the judging criteria.

Special Rules for State FFA Tractor Technician Contest

- 1. Rules: This Contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Purpose: This event is a perfect opportunity for students to get on the job training. All of the skills acquired from this event are helpful every day in agricultural, industrial and personal applications. Participants receive hands-on training that empowers them with highly marketable skills that makes them highly employable. Students apply mechanical knowledge and critical thinking and problem-solving skills and interact with industry professionals. This event is supported by curriculum for the following agricultural science and technology coursework: Agricultural Mechanics and Metal Technologies, Agricultural Equipment Design & Fabrication, Agricultural Power Systems, Practicum in Agriculture Food & Natural Resources, Agricultural Laboratory & Field Experience, Agricultural Structures Design & Fabrication.

3. Event Format:

i.

a.

- Team Make-Up
 - i. Teams shall consist of three members from one high school. Team score is determined by combining the scores of all three students from each team.
 - ii. Qualifications of a team member:
 - a. Each team member must be currently a bona fide member of the FFA chapter of the school they represent and on the state roster.
 - b. Members of previous top 5 teams are ineligible to participate in future state contests
- b. Team Eligibility:
 - Three teams from each of the twelve areas of agricultural science and technology in Texas will be eligible to compete in the State FFA Tractor Technician CDE.
 - ii. Teams representing an area must have participated in an area elimination contest in order to compete in the state contest.
 - iii. The agricultural science teacher must certify the eligibility of each team member at registration.
- c. Equipment
 - i. Team members must provide their own compliant clipboard and/or clean folder with the following items: scan sheet, and/or copy of the scan sheet, optional Texas FFA CDE drop sheet, and/or 2 sheets of lined or unlined blank paper.
 - ii. Industrial quality eye protection shall be worn by contestants as they compete in Parts II and III of the event. Industrial quality is defined as meeting the specifications of (American National Standards Institute) ANSI Z87.
 - iii. Due to possible damage to the computers and other solid-state components, test lights will not be permitted.
 - iv. Digital multimeters are recommended and shall have a minimum of 10 or more megaohms input impedance.
 - v. Each team will provide their own box of tools and test equipment for participation in Part III.
 - vi. Type ABC fire extinguishers with a minimum 2.5 pound capacity will be provided by each team for participation in Part III.
 - vii. Drip pans with a minimum two-gallon capacity and a minimum intake diameter of 16 inches will be provided by each team for participation in Part III.

Special Rules for State FFA Tractor Technician Contest

- d. General Rules
 - i. This event is hosted by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
 - ii. Awards, prizes, and internships are sponsored by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the Agricultural Mechanics Committee and participating equipment manufacturers and dealers.
 - iii. The contest will be judged by service engineers from the agricultural, construction, and automotive equipment industries and/or university personnel.
 - iv. Only the judges and the supervising attendants will be permitted in the immediate vicinity while Parts I and II are being conducted and on the area floor during Part III.
 - v. Decisions of the judges will be final.
 - vi. Ag Science teachers coaching state teams will be notified of the make of tractor or tractors to be used in Part III prior to the event, if possible.
 - vii. Each team member will participate individually in Parts I and II of the contest, and work as a member of the school team in Part III of the contest.
 - viii. Teams shall not be permitted to test drive until all malfunctions that, in the opinion of the judges, affect the safe operation or are detrimental to the operation of the tractor have been found and corrected.
- e. Part I Written Examination
 - i. Contestants will complete one hundred objective type questions, true or false and multiple choice.
 - ii. Multiple choice questions may have one or more correct answers.
 - iii. State curriculum materials and references are available from Instructional Materials Service will be used for references.
- f. Part II Appraisal of Tractor/IM
 - i. Contestants will appraise up to 20 components or parts from agricultural tractors or machinery. They will recommend service actions, report condition, and evaluate functionality of each component.
 - ii. Service data from manufacturer's service manuals or IT service manuals will be provided where specifications are needed in order to make the evaluations.
 - iii. Contestants are required to wear industrial quality eye protection as they compete in this phase of the contest.
 - iv. All teams will provide their own measuring devices for the component evaluation portion.
- g. Part III Locating and Correcting Malfunctions in Agricultural Tractors
 - i. A school team of three contestants, working as a group, will compete with the teams from the other schools in locating and correcting five deliberately placed malfunctions in diesel fueled tractors.
 - ii. All tractors will have the same malfunctions installed and service work orders listing owner/operator comments on service needed will be provided.
 - iii. There will be a maximum of 5 malfunctions, repairs, or safety issues per tractor. All tractors will have the same malfunctions, repairs, safety issues.
 - iv. Information regarding tractors used for the contest will be posted to the Texas FFA website by August of each year.
 - v. All systems of the tractor may be considered during the selection of malfunctions such as:
 - Electrical system
 - Engine and power train systems
 - Hydraulic system
 - · Chassis, safety, and handling systems
 - vi. The malfunctions may or may not have an immediate detriment to the starting or performance of the tractor.
 - vii. Each team will furnish their own box of tools, test equipment, drip pan, and a fire extinguisher.
 - viii. The time limit for this phase of the contest is 30 minutes.
 - ix. Contestants are required to wear industrial quality eye protection during this phase of the contest.
 - x. When the team has located and corrected the malfunctions, a designated driver will operate the tractor in a safe manner around the driving course in the arena.
 - xi. Contestants are to notify judges of any deficiencies concerning: transmission and/or hydraulic fluid, battery condition, coolant, and or crankcase oil.
 - xii. Time will terminate after the driver has parked the tractor and turned the key in to the time/score keeper.
 - xiii. Liquid-filled 0-5,000 p.s.i./0-35,000 kPa dual-scale dial gauges equipped with adapters to fit the hydraulic remotes on the tractors used for the event are to be provided by each team participating in Part III.
 - xiv. Any special equipment that is not specifically listed on the tools list will be provided by the contest officials.
 - xv. A copy of the recommended tools list can be found on the CDE page of the Texas FFA website. www.texasffa.org/cdetractor-tech

4. Scoring

- a. Top Ten Teams from Parts I and II will advance to Part III of the State Tractor Tech Contest. Scores will be determined by the sum of all team members scores from Parts I and II of the contest.
- b. Overall Team Scores will be determined by the sum of the following:
 - 3 Individual Scores from Part I 3 Individual Scores from Part II
 - Scores from Part II

c. Overall Individual Scores will be determined by the sum of the following:

5. Tiebreakers

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- In case of a tie, the winner will be determined in the following sequence:
 - i. The team having the highest score on Part II shall be declared winner. If still tied;
- ii. The team having the highest score on Part III shall be declared winner. If still tied;
- iii. The team having the highest score on Part I shall be declared winner. If still tied;
- iv. The team having the high individual score on Parts I and II shall be declared winner. If still tied;
- v. Teams will be accompanied by their advisor and will meet with contest officials who will conduct a coin toss to determine the higher placing team.

b. Individual awards will be based on following in the event of a tie.

- i. The contestant having the highest score on Part II (components) shall be declared winner; if still tied;
- ii. The high team score will be used to determine the winner; or if still tied,
- iii. Contestants will be accompanied by their advisor and will meet with contest officials who will conduct a coin toss to determine the higher placing individual.
- 6. Awards: Prizes are awarded to clubs/chapters and not individual exhibitors for each project.

7. Safe and Appropriate Tractor Operation:

- a. The operator shall be in the seat of the tractor when engaging the starter motor or attempting to start the engine.
- b. The transmission shall be placed in neutral, or park and the clutch disengaged before attempting to start the engine.
- c. The operator shall give an audible signal and assure that all team members are in a clear, safe position prior to engaging the starter motor or attempting to start the engine.
- d. The starter motor shall not be engaged for over 30 seconds at a time. If the starter motor is engaged for over 30 seconds, a minimum of 1 minute cool down period shall be allowed before it is engaged again.
- e. All actions taken during testing, adjusting, repair, and operation of the tractor shall be completed in a prudent manner and in compliance with the manufacturer's recommendations.
- f. All guards, shields, cowlings, etc. removed for service shall be installed prior to driving the tractor.
- g. The operator shall wear the seat belt during the test drive.
- h. Flashers and running lights shall be on when the tractor is being driven on test course.
- i. Tractor motion shall be started smoothly by releasing the clutch in a slow, smooth manner.
- j. The appropriate gear and r.p.m. for the test drive will be announced prior to competition in Part III and the tractor shall be operated in or below the designated gear and at or below the designated r.p.m.
- k. The operator shall not enter the test course unless a safe distance is available ahead of an approaching tractor. Tractors on the test course have right-of-way.
- The operator shall not pass another tractor on test course, unless instructed to do so by the event traffic director. If a tractor is
 operating poorly and/or not maintaining appropriate speed, the event traffic director may permit faster traveling tractors to pass
 the slow-moving tractor.
- m. Tractor shall be driven in safe manner and a safe following distance of at least three (3) tractor lengths shall be maintained when following a tractor on the test course.
- n. Upon completion of the test drive, the tractor shall be stopped in a smooth manner, transmission placed in neutral or park position, brakes set, tractor key turned off, and the operator shall dismount in a safe manner.
- o. A grade of F will be awarded if the operator does not follow the designated test course.

Special Rules for Calf Scramble

- 1. **Rules:** This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Entry Requirements: Calf scramble online entry will be available to Clubs/Chapters by Oct. 15, at <u>www.rodeohouston.com</u>. All entries must be submitted by AST/CEA only by Dec. 1.
 - a. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™] is not responsible for any accidents which may occur to any participant in the calf scramble before, during or after the event.
 - b. Participants are selected on a first-come, first-served basis. AST/CEAs may enter calf scramble participants and alternates online beginning Oct.15, and reenter the system at a later date to submit the remainder of their junior livestock show entries prior to the December 1 deadline.
 - c. Once the necessary paperwork has been received and verified by the Calf Scramble office, qualified applicants will be notified of their acceptance as a participant or alternate, the date and time they are to participate, and where they are to meet. This official notification will be sent to you by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Calf Scramble Office ONLY.

3. Eligibility Requirements:

- a. Applicants must be enrolled in and considered eligible in a TX 4-H or FFA at the time of application and if selected, at the time of scramble. Applicants MUST be United States citizens and MUST possess a valid social security number.
- b. Applicants must be enrolled in and attending a public or private secondary school in the state of TX.
- c. Applicant must have reached their 14th, but **NOT** their 18th birthday on Jan. 1, 2025 and not be enrolled beyond their junior year in high school.
- d. Applicant is required to pass the Quality Counts Verification test for entry. Calf scramble entrants will not be accepted without the verification code. The test can be found at https://agrilife.org/qualitycounts/
- e. Applicant must be financially capable to supply any additional funds that may be needed to purchase the heifer or market steer and to feed and care for it.
- f. Applicant must be able to provide suitable facilities for caring and developing a breeding heifer or market steer.
- g. Applicant must be able to devote the appropriate time and attention to the calf and return to the 2025 Show with a heifer or steer that all parties involved will be proud to display.
- h. Applicant and his/her parents/guardian must be willing, and the participant must be eligible to spend the required time away from school and other activities to exhibit and care for the heifer or steer at the 2025 Show. They must also have the required time it takes to submit all monthly reports, essays and business plan.

4. Physical Requirements:

- a. Participants must be able to run and perform procedures necessary to scramble.
- b. Applicant must weigh at least 100 pounds.

Special Rules for Calf Scramble

- 5. Certificate Limitations: Applicants who previously won a scramble certificate through participation in the Calf Scramble, 4-H and FFA Dairy Judging Contest, or 4-H and FFA Livestock Judging Contest at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo are not eligible to participate in the calf scramble or to accept additional calf scramble certificates.
- 6. Scramble Limitations: Participants are only allowed to participate in one Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Calf Scramble in any one year. Clubs/Chapters may enter unlimited calf scramble entries, with the first 5 entries being considered for available participant positions. All potential calf scramble participants/applicants must be entered online by the December 1 deadline.
- 7. Substitutions: If a participant is unable to scramble for any reason, an alternate will be assigned by the Calf Scramble Office.
- 8. Ineligible Participants: Approved applicants are considered eligible by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for participation in the calf scramble at the time the online entries are made. Any CEA/AST that has a member who becomes ineligible to participate, for any reason, must provide written and signed notification to the scramble office at least 24 hours prior to the commencement of the scheduled scramble in which the ineligible participant was to participate. Failure to do so may result in disqualification of entries for the following Show year.
- 9. Dress: Participants must wear long pants and comfortable shoes. Dresses and skirts will not be allowed. Shoes with any type of knob or cleat are not allowed. A belt is not required but strongly suggested. Please remember that you will be running in dirt, so the more comfortable you are, the easier it is to run.
- **10. Roll Call:** Participants must be checked in at the scramble meeting room prior to the start of the meeting. Any participant that is not present at roll call and the scramble meeting may forfeit their position and be replaced with an alternate. A notice including the scramble date and meeting time will be sent to all participants and alternates.
- 11. Results: All results called on the dirt are final. No instant replay, no appeals.

Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Competition: 19 scramble contestants will compete in the Super Scramble held during the Finals Rodeo Performance on Sunday, March 23rd.
- **3. Contestants**: Contestants for the Super Scramble will consist of the first catch winners from the prior 19 calf scramble rodeo performances. The first catch winner for each night is expected to return on Sunday, March 23rd for the Super Scramble.
- 4. Credentials: On the night the exhibitor catches, the first catch winner will receive a credential packet for the Super Scramble Performance. This packet will include a parking pass and three rodeo tickets (1 ticket for the scrambler and 2 tickets for family/advisors accompanying the scrambler) for the Finals Rodeo Performance on Sunday, March 23rd.
- 5. Alternates: In the event the first-catch winner is unable to attend, alternates for the finals will consist of the second catch winner who caught during the same rodeo performance as the first catch winner who cannot attend. If the second catch winner is not available to attend, the third catch from the rodeo performance will become eligible.
- 6. Results: All results called on the dirt are final. No instant replay, no appeals.

Total award for all Calf Scramble Certificate recipients is \$2,500, \$2,000 of which will be used to purchase the heifer or market steer and \$500 of which will be received after the donor social at the 2025 Show, provided that all obligations are fulfilled. Purchase certificates in the amount of \$2,000 must be used in the purchase of a breeding beef heifer or a market steer approved by the CEA or AST. Heifers must be born between Jan. 1. 2024 and Apr. 30, 2025.

All steers must be validated through the TX 4-H and FFA steer validation program by June 30, 2025 and the electronic identification number must be entered in the "Animal Details" section of the monthly reporting system on or before August 1, 2025. Steers may be any breed of beef cattle. Exhibitors who fail to submit their scramble steers validation electronic identification number by the deadline will be subject to disgualification.

All heifers must be validated through the TX 4-H and FFA Heifer Validation System. Heifer validation will include online registration paper uploading and a physical validation with a county validation committee which will include DNA hair sampling. The deadline for heifer validation is October 31, 2025, exhibitors should contact their County Extension Agent or Agricultural Science Teacher for local / county deadlines. Exhibitors who fail to validate their scramble heifer by the deadline will be subject to disqualification.

- The calf must be an FFA or 4-H project. The winner MUST return to the 2026 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and show the calf in the Scramble Beef Heifer Show or Scramble Steer Show. Steer projects may not be entered in any show prior to the 2026 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo that requires the winning animals to be sold at auction. Scramble steer exhibitors are encouraged to enter the Junior Market Steer Show but are only allowed one entry into the Junior Market Steer Show and it must be their Scramble Steer. Scramble heifer exhibitors are encouraged to enter the Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show but are only allowed one entry into the Junior Breeding Beef Heifer Show and it must be their Scramble Heifer. Appropriate entry materials must be submitted through the exhibitor's club or chapter by Dec. 1, 2025, for the exhibitor to show in the 2026 Junior Livestock Show.
- 3. Payment on scramble heifer certificates will be made to the seller after the completed purchase certificate and the original, transferred registration paper are received in the Scramble Office. Payment on steer certificates will be made to the seller after the completed purchase certificate is received in the Scramble Office. The original scramble certificate must be signed by the supervisor, seller, parent, and student. Payment will be delayed if documentation is incomplete.

- 5. Winners cannot purchase animals from themselves, immediate family members (mother, father, brother, sister, sister-in-law, brother-in-law, grandfather, grandmother, stepfather, stepmother, half-brother, half-sister, niece, nephew, aunt, uncle, cousin) or their ranches (family ranches or partnerships), or 4-H club/FFA chapter. Winners cannot purchase animals from their 4-H/FFA advisor or the 4-H/FFA advisor's immediate family members (mother, father, brother, sister, sister-in-law, brother- in-law, grandfather, grandmother, stepfather, stepmother, half-brother, half-sister, niece, nephew, aunt, uncle, cousin) or their ranches (family ranches or partnerships). Winner cannot purchase animals from their Donor or their Donor's immediate family members (mother, father, brother, sister, sister-in-law, brother- in-law, grandfather, grandmother, stepfather, stepmother, half-brother, halfsister, niece, nephew, aunt, uncle, cousin) or their ranches (family ranches or partnerships). Winners may not purchase heifers previously exhibited through any Calf Scramble program. Payments will not be issued to 4-H Clubs. FFA Chapters, students. parents, supervisors or Donors.
- Winners cannot purchase a calf that they have previously shown at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in any given year or 6. any calf that has previously been recorded in their name or in an immediate family member's name. Winners cannot purchase a calf that was previously shown as a Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scramble calf.
- If a calf is purchased for less than the \$1,750 certificate amount, the seller will be issued a check for only the actual purchase 7 amount.
- Heifer Certificates may be combined with certificates awarded from other stock shows occurring between Jul. 1, 2024 and Mar. 31, 8. 2025 as long as the animal is brought back to the Houston Livestock Show in 2026. If a combination of certificates is being used, the original transferred registration papers must be sent to the Show that is earliest in the calendar year. The first Show will make copies of the original transferred registration papers and then forward the original transferred registration papers to the later Shows. The last Show of the calendar year will receive and hold the original transferred registration papers and forward the original transferred registration papers to the winner/exhibitor upon completion of the project at all of the Shows involved.
- Scramble steer and heifer substitutions will only be allowed at the discretion of Show Management. Furthermore, scramble heifer 9. substitutions will only be allowed if the original registration paper of the substitute heifer (solely in the name of the respective scramble exhibitor on or before Oct. 31, 2025) is received by the Scramble Office on or before the December 1st deadline. Show Management must be notified immediately of any potential substitutions.
- 10. Winners who fail to fulfill their obligations as stated in these rules may have their Calf Scramble Certificates revoked, will be required to repay the certificate value to the Houston Livestock Show and will be required to provide a letter of explanation to the

donor and the Scramble Office. Failure to comply with these rules could also result in forfeiture of Calf Scramble entries for one year for that club/chapter. If repayment is not made within 30 days of the 2026 Show, HLSR reserves the right to repossess the scramble heifer or steer and revoke invitations to participate in future Houston Livestock Shows. Winners who are ineligible to show at the 2026 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scramble Steer or Scramble Beef Heifer Shows will be required to re-pay the certificate value to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

- **11.** Scramble Certificate winners who initially accept and then decline their Scramble Certificate, may be barred from exhibiting/participating in future HLSR competitions/shows. This is at the discretion of Show Management.
- **12.** Failure to submit three (3) or more monthly reports to the donor and Scramble Office during the course of the year-long project will make the exhibitor ineligible for the remaining \$500 received upon completion of the 2026 Show.

RULES FOR ALL 4-H AND FFA JUDGING CONTESTS

1. Eligibility:

- a. Only TX 4-H and FFA teams and individuals may enter. 4-H team members must be from the same county and FFA members must be from the same Chapter.
- b. All participants MUST be United State citizens and possess a valid social security number. All participants must be enrolled in and attending TX public or private school programs (including home school). Enrolled college and university students are not eligible to participate.
- c. Each Agricultural Science Teacher (AST) or County Extension Agent (CEA) may enter as many teams as desired unless specified in the special rules.
- d. Each team shall consist of three or four members, with the three highest scores being used for team scores.
- e. Individual contestants may compete for individual awards.
- f. Junior Division Contestants must be 8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024.
- g. Senior Division Contestants must be 14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024, and are enrolled in, and attending, public or private elementary or secondary schools in TX.
- h. Each team and its age division must be designated and certified by an AST or CEA at the time of pre-registration. If one or more team members are in the senior division, the team and its individuals are considered all senior division.
- i. Each team member must turn in at registration a properly executed **LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY AGREEMENT**. No contestant will be allowed to judge without this agreement.
- j. Only coaches, CEAs or ASTs, will be allowed to pick up registration packets. All packets for a County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter must be picked up at the same time by the same person.
- 2. Entry: Entry for each type of contest will take place as follows:

a. Individual Contests:

- i. Entries MUST be submitted online at <u>http://www.judgingcard.com</u> by the supervising AST/CEA for the County 4-H Club/FFA Chapter. Entries open on October 15, 2024, must be submitted prior to midnight, Dec. 1, 2024.
- ii. Contests include Agricultural Public Speaking and Agricultural Science Fair.
- iii. Forms: Completed indemnities must be brought on the day of the contest to complete entry. Forms with missing
- information will be considered incomplete entries and will not be accepted.

b. Teams Contests:

- i. Entries MUST be submitted online at <u>www.judgingcard.com</u> by the supervising AST/CEA for the County 4-H Club/FFA Chapter. Entries open on October 15, 2024, must be submitted prior to midnight, February 1, 2025.
- ii. Contests include Agriculture Product ID, Ag Robotics Contest, 4-H/FFA Dairy Judging, 4-H/FFA Floriculture, 4-H/FFA Food Challenge, 4-H/FFA Horse Judging, 4-H/FFA Livestock Judging, 4-H/FFA Livestock Quiz Bowl, 4-H/FFA Meats Judging, 4-H/FFA Nursery Landscape, 4-H/FFA Poultry Judging, 4-H/FFA Range and Pasture Plant ID, 4-H/FFA Veterinary Science Contest, 4-H Wildlife Contest, FFA Wildlife Contest, 4-H/FFA Wool Judging
- iii. Forms: Completed indemnities must be brought on the day of the contest to complete entry. Forms with missing information will be considered incomplete entries and will not be accepted.

3. Conduct of Contestants:

- a. There will be no talking between contestants during the contest. Violating this rule may cause the contestants and their teams to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards.
- b. Only contestants and contest officials will be permitted in the contest area during the contest.
- c. Contestants must have their group letter clearly visible on their clothing.
- d. Contestants cannot smoke or use any tobacco products in contest facilities.
- e. Contestants should not monopolize any one exhibit for an unreasonable length of time.
- f. Contestants should not separate themselves from the class on which their group is working.
- g. Contestants should not in any way willfully obstruct the work of another contestant.
- h. If an ineligible contestant is permitted to judge, the team and individual members of that team will be ineligible for prizes. Furthermore, the AST or CEA who certified the eligibility of the team members, as well as the County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter, will be ineligible to enter another team for a period of three years.
- i. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disqualification.



Accommodations: We will consider requests to accommodate a student with physical or mental impairments on a case-by case basis in consultation with the contest Superintendents. Accommodation requests should be submitted to the Livestock Office at least 14 days prior to the contest event date via <u>online form</u>. The Livestock Department will follow-up on all submitted requests.

Scoring: Scan sheets will be provided. CONTESTANTS MUST USE THE HLSR PROVIDED, PRE-CODED SCANTRONS OR THEY WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. Contestants must provide their own #2 pencil and may bring an unmarked clipboard and/or manila folder for use during the contest. Forms that are bent or abused will not be scored. Ties will be broken on the consistency of judging all classes. If ties still exist, ranking with the ties will be the discretion of the contest superintendent(s).

- 6. **Results:** Results, as announced, are final. Contestants must be present to receive their awards. Any remaining awards will not be mailed following the show.
- 7. Pictures: The top three teams and individuals in each contest must have their picture taken.

1. **Rules:** This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.



Entry Fee: Entries **MUST** be submitted online at <u>www.judgingcard.com</u> by an AST/CEA. Entries must be submitted prior to midnight, December 1, 2024.

- Entry: See Entry Rules for All 4-H And FFA Judging Contests
 - a. Any changes to an entry (e.g., Speech Title or Topic Area) must be sent to the Livestock Office between the dates of December 15, 2024, to January 10, 2025. Changes may be submitted via regular mail, or by uploading to the online form <u>here</u>.
- Eligibility: See Eligibility Rules for All 4-H And FFA Judging Contests
- a. Contestants must be members of either 4-H or FFA and meet all Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Junior Show Rules and Requirements.
- b. Contestants must be passing all subjects for the semester or grading period immediately preceding the contest and certified by a school official on the entry form.
- 5. Conduct of Contestants See Rules for All 4-H And FFA Judging Contests
 - a. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant in the contest room for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by individual contestant will result in disgualification.
- 6. Contest Format: The event will be conducted using the following format:
 - a. A panel of judges will evaluate and score each presentation. Click <u>here</u> to review the scoring rubric. Due to the large number of entries, the contest will be conducted over two days. A Preliminary Round will be on Saturday, March 15, 2025, at **Houston Community College Alief Hayes Campus, 2811 Hayes Rd., Houston, TX**. The top 2 contestants from each assigned room will advance to the Final Round on the second day. Contest finalists will be announced on the first day (Saturday)

through JudgingCard.com. All finalists will advance to the Final Round on the second day, Sunday, March 16, 2025, at NRG Center in the 200 series rooms.

- b. Contestants will compete in either the Junior or Senior Division. Contestants will be assigned an official contest number, and the speaking order and room assignment will be randomly determined for the Preliminary Round of judging.
- c. Contestants will NOT be judged by topic (i.e., Animal Science). The top 2 contestants from each assigned room will advance to the Final Round on the second day. Contestants MUST compete in their assigned room. Changes may only be approved by Superintendents or Show Management.
- d. The finalists in the Junior and Senior divisions will compete for overall division winner and placings within their respective divisions.
- e. Contestants will randomly draw to determine the speaking order for the Final Round of judging on the second day. Final Round contestants will be evaluated and ranked by judges without regard to topic area.
- 7. Parking: Preliminary Round (Day One): Parking will be offsite at Houston Community College Alief Hayes Campus; therefore, no parking passes will be mailed to the supervising CEA/AST/FCCLA advisor. There will be ample parking for the Preliminary Round at Houston Community College Alief Hayes Campus.

Finals Round (Day Two): All Final Round Contestants will be provided a HLSR parking pass on Saturday, March 15th at the conclusion of finalist announcements at the Houston Community College – Alief Hayes Campus. Prior to the show, complementary grounds passes will be mailed to supervising CEA/AST/FCCLA advisors for all contestants.

8. Documentation: Each contestant must bring a completed Release of Liability and Indemnity Form with them to the contest and to be turned in at registration. Cash award winners will be required to complete and return a W-9 form to a JCC rep on contest day or e-mail to <u>Abston@hlsr.com</u> within two weeks of the contest.

Contestants are required to upload an Abstract and a Statement of Originality Form as one pdf file electronically to the Judging Card <u>website</u> between the dates of December 15, 2024, and January 10, 2025. The documentation must be submitted by the AST/CEA. Documentation should be saved as a single PDF file. The file should be named "Exhibitor Last Name_Exhibitor First Name_"J" for Junior Division or "S" for Senior Division_"PS" for Public Speaking." Example: Johnny Stockshow, who is entered in the Junior Division of Public Speaking, would name his file "Stockshow_Johnny_J_PS". Students failing to submit the required documentation by the deadline of January 10, 2025, are ineligible to compete.

- i. <u>Abstract</u>: The Abstract will be provided to the judges for informational purposes only. A minimum of five (5) references must be listed as Literature Cited using the APA format. The Abstract template (PDF fillable format) will be used by all contestants. Be sure to save a completed copy of the Abstract for your reference.
- ii. <u>Statement of Originality Form</u>: This form (PDF fillable format) must be signed by the contestant, parent/legal guardian, and AST/CEA (or teacher).

If a contestant does not follow the documentation guidelines outlined above, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Superintendent, Show Management and Judges.

- 10. Dress Attire: Contestants should wear presentable attire. Business attire or Official 4-H or FFA attire is recommended.
- **11. Time:** Each speech shall be a minimum of six (6) minutes in length and a maximum of eight (8) minutes. Time point deductions will apply as follows:
 - a. Under six minutes one point per ten seconds
 - b. Over eight minutes one point per ten seconds
 - c. Junior contestants will be given a discrete, two-minute warning by the timekeeper prior to the eight-minute deadline.
- **12.** Question/Answer Period: A three-minute question and answer period will follow each speech. At the end of three minutes, time will be called, and all questioning will end.
- **13. Props:** The use of pets, signs, electronics, objects, or props of any kind are prohibited. A violation of this rule will result in contestant disqualification.
- **14. Speech Topic Areas:** Each contestant will enter their speech in only one of nine (9) topic areas. The final determination of the contestant's speech topic area will be at the discretion of the Superintendent and Show Management.

Special Rules for Agricultural Public Speaking Contest

Topic Areas:

- Western Heritage: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as Western history, culture or heritage.
- **Natural Resources:** Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as soil, water, air, water quality, wildlife, forestry, aquaculture, conservation, recreation, recycling, energy environmental issues, etc.
- Animal Science: Any current or future subject that deals with any aspect(s) of the dairy, equine, poultry, sheep, goat, swine, beef or specialty animal industries.
- Agronomy: Any current or future subject that deals with any aspect(s) of the horticulture and/or agronomy industries
 including floriculture, fruit and/or vegetable production, nursery operations, turf and landscape management, crop
 production, or specialty crop production.
- **Agribusiness:** Any current and future subject that deals with topics such as cooperatives, sales, service, communications, entrepreneurship, marketing, finance, commodities, hedging, advertising, etc.
- Agricultural Policy: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as domestic farm issues, international trade, international competition, rural economic development, legal issues, animal rights, subsidies, price supports, etc.
- **Agricultural Technology:** Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as biotechnology, biogenetics, bioengineering, mechanical engineering, new agri-technology applications, global positioning and other satellite technology, computer applications, etc.
- Agriculture Communication: Any current or future subject that deals with the process or act of communicating
 agricultural related information to the public.
- Livestock Show Ethics: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspect of the ethics practiced in the livestock show industry.
- **15. Eligibility of Previous Winners:** Previous First (1st) Place winners in the Junior and Senior Divisions may not use the same winning speech in future contest(s) and must select a new speech subject matter to remain eligible to enter the contest in subsequent year(s).
- 16. Contestant Lunch: A free lunch will be provided for each contestant.
- 17. Schedule Conflict: Students with conflicts due to participation in other HLSR events held on the same day of the contest will need to notify the Contest Superintendent during check-in to arrange a presentation time. Once the contest begins, it is the responsibility of each contestant to notify the Contest Superintendent should a conflict arise with their assigned presentation time.
- **18. Tie Breaker:** A tie will be broken on scores received from the Question / Answer Period, in consultation with judges panel and at discretion of contest Superintendent(s).

Special Rules for Agricultural Science Fair

PURPOSE

To engage Texas 4-H and FFA Members in activities that promote basic and applied science, technology, and engineering research projects that have applications to agriculture and closely related fields of study.

1. **Rules:** This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.



Entry Fee: Entries MUST be submitted online at <u>https://www.judgingcard.com/</u>. Entries must be submitted prior to midnight, <u>December 1, 2024</u>.

Eligibility: See Eligibility Rules for All 4-H And FFA Judging Contests

- a. Contestants must be members of either 4-H or FFA and meet all Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Junior Show Rules and Requirements.
- b. Contestants must be passing all subjects for the semester or grading period immediately preceding the contest and certified by a school official on the entry form.
- Entry Limitation: Contestants are limited to one (1) individual entry. An entry must be the result of a student's own effort and ability. Team entries are NOT allowed. There is no limit to the number of entries a chapter or club may submit.



- Conduct of Contestants See Rules for All 4-H And FFA Judging Contests
- a. Personal electronic devices (such as iPads, tablets, computers, and other Wi-Fi devices) can <u>only</u> be used as part of a contestant's research project, subject to the prior approval of the Contest Superintendent.
- b. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not allowed in the contest room.
- c. Devices which are required for medical reasons (i.e. blood sugar monitors/apps) are permitted. Convey medical device needs to the Contest Superintendent in advance. Violation by any individual contestant will result in disqualification.
- 6. Project Exhibition: The project must have been researched and developed within one (1) calendar year of the exhibition date. If the project is a continuation of a longitudinal (multi-year) study, the student's focus for research, display and presentation must center on the most recent year's data. A successive year project must indicate change or growth in the project from the previous year(s) in the logbook. Importantly, the project must document that the additional research is a substantive expansion from prior work (e.g. testing a new variable or new line of investigation). A research project may be a part of a larger study performed by professional scientists, but the project presented by the student must be only their own portion of the complete study.
- 7. Topic Areas: There are six (6) topic areas from which a contestant must select one (1):
 - a. <u>Animal Systems</u>: The study of animal systems, including life processes, health, behavior, nutrition and growth, physiology, genetics, management and processing, as related to the study of small animals, aquaculture, livestock, dairy, horses and/or poultry.
 - Examples:
 - Assessment of advances in livestock nutritional strategies
 - Assessment of new disease control mechanisms
 - Effects of estrous synchronization on ovulation
 - Comparing the effect of thawing temperatures on livestock semen
 - Effects of growth hormone on meat/milk production
- b. <u>Environmental Services/Natural Resource Systems:</u> The study of systems, instruments and technology used in waste management, land reclamation, pollution control, recycling, bioremediation, and water resources management; the study of

the management of soil, water, wildlife, forests and air as natural resources and their influence on the environment, including research projects involving environmental chemistry, water science and geoscience. Examples:

- Comparison of farming systems that make use of locally available resources
- Development and adoption of water reuse systems
- Assessment of ecologically based farming systems
- Innovative practices to promote soil health
- Comparison of water movements through different soil types
- c. <u>Food Products and Processing Systems:</u> The study of product development and nutrition, quality assurance, food safety, bacteriology, environmental microbiology, microbial genetics, food sales and service, regulation and government compliance, and food service handling and delivery technologies.

Examples:

- Assessment of emerging microbial contaminants and foodborne hazards
- The role of value-trait marketing of food products
- Enhancing food safety through improved processing technologies
- Development of food products with increased health benefits
- d. <u>Plant Systems:</u> The study of plant life cycles, genetics, classifications, systematics, functions, biorhythms, structures, anatomy and physiology, reproduction, pathology, taxonomy, media and nutrients, as well as growth and development practices; the study of crops, turf grass, forestry, horticulture, shrubs and/or ornamental plants, hydroponics, and agronomy ecology. Examples:
 - Enhancing water and nutrition efficiency of crop species
 - Issues and challenges related to implementing cover crops
 - Comparison of genetically modified and conventional seed/plant growth under various conditions
 - Advances in weed management practices
 - Comparison of plant growth of hydroponics and conventional methods
- e. <u>Power, Structural and Technical Systems:</u> The study of agricultural equipment, power systems, robotics, microcontrollers, sensors, signal processing, biomechanics, alternative fuel sources, energy storage, biomaterials, precision technology, wind and water movement power, as well as woodworking, metalworking, welding and project planning for agricultural structures. Examples:
 - Development of alternate energy source engines
 - · Assessing processes that allow for more efficient conversion of cellulose and hemicellulose to fuel
 - Comparing properties of various alternative insulation products
 - Investigation of light/wind/water energy sources
 - Adoption of precision agriculture using nanotechnology-based applications
- f. <u>Social Systems:</u> The study of human behavior and the interaction of individuals in and to society, including agricultural education, agribusiness management, agricultural communication, agricultural leadership and other social science applications in agriculture, food and natural resources.

Examples:

- Investigating perceptions of community members towards alternative agricultural practices
- Determining the impact of local/state/national safety programs upon accident rates in agriculture/natural resource occupations
- Determining the economic impacts of local/state/national legislation and regulatory requirements upon agricultural production and natural resource utilization
- Enhancing economic security of sustainable farming systems
- Comparison of farming practices for improving sustainability and community economic security

- **9. Documentation:** Each contestant must bring a completed Release of Liability and Indemnity Form with them to the contest and to be turned in at check-in. Cash award winners will be required to complete and return a W-9 form to a JCC representative on contest day or e-mail to <u>Abston@hlsr.com</u> within two weeks following the contest.
 - a. Contestants are required to upload the following documentation as one file electronically to the JudgingCard website between the dates of December 15, 2024, and January 10, 2025. The documentation can be submitted online by the AST/CEA. Documentation should be saved as a PDF file; the file should be named "Exhibitor Last Name_Exhibitor First Name_"J" for Junior Division or "S" for Senior Division_"AS" for Ag Science." **Example:** Johnny Stockshow, who is entered in the Junior Division of the Agricultural Science

Contestants must use fillable templates that are provided in the link above and not submit document screenshots, photocopies, or scanned images of required documents. If the contestant does not follow the guidelines outlined above, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Superintendent, Show Management, and Judges.

10. Contest Format:

- Contestants will compete in either the Junior or Senior Division. However, projects will NOT be judged by topic. Upon arrival, a. contestants will be randomly assigned to a specific group. Contestants MUST compete in their assigned groups. Changes may only be approved by the Contest Superintendents or Show Management. b.
 - All exhibits must have the following information attached to the project display:
 - Name of student i.
 - Chapter/Club name with location (city) ii.
 - Division entered (i.e., Junior or Senior) iii.
- Contestants should be located next to their display area during judging to explain their research project to contest judges and C. address guestions from judges. Each project display will be allocated a maximum of 15 minutes for judging. This time shall include approximately 3 to 5 minutes for the student presentation and 10 minutes for judges' questions.
- Personal electronic devices (such as iPads, tablets, computers, and other Wi-Fi devices) can only be used as part of a d. contestant's project with the prior approval of the Contest Superintendent. The maximum size for a project display is as follows: Depth (front to back) 30 inches or 76 centimeters; Width (side to side) 48 inches or 122 centimeters; and Height (the floor to top of display, including table) 108 inches or 274 centimeters. All project materials and support mechanisms must fit within the project dimensions (including table covers). Exceptions may be granted on a case-by-case basis by the Contest Superintendent.
- e. Contestants must provide all supplies needed for their project display. Tables will be provided by HLSR. Wall mountings are prohibited. All displays must consist of a stable, free-standing display board or lie flat on the provided table-top not to exceed the size outlined above. Failure to meet these requirements can result in disqualification.
- Contestants must have a copy of their Project Logbook (i.e., research notebook) on their display table for review by contest f. judges.
- Displays requiring electricity should have an internal power supply (i.e., batteries, etc.). Electricity will NOT be provided by the g. HLSR. All prescribed safety regulations of the HLSR will be followed.
- Contestants should be in presentable attire. Business attire or official 4-H or FFA attire is recommended. h.
- 11. Presentation Schedule Conflict: Students with conflicts due to participation in other HLSR events held on the same day of the contest will need to notify the Contest Superintendent during project check-in to arrange a presentation time. Once the contest begins, it is the responsibility of each contestant to notify the Contest Superintendent should a conflict arise with their assigned presentation time.
- 12. Presentation Area: Contest officials, judges, and participants only are allowed in the project presentation area during "preliminary" project judging. During "final round" judging, the general public will be allowed in the judging area and seated in a designated location.

- 2. Eligibility: (See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Contests).
- 3. Conduct of Contestants: (See Conduct of Contestants for all 4-H and FFA Contests).

a. Communication devices (cell phone, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disgualification.

- 4. Maximum Entries: Each county 4-H program/FFA chapter may enter a maximum of two (2) Junior teams and a maximum of two (2) Senior teams.
- 5. Members per Team: Each team will have a minimum of three (3) and no more than six (6) members. Teams may not include members in different age divisions (i.e., Juniors mixed with Seniors). <u>Contestants can only participate on one team</u>.
- 6. Only contestants will be allowed to participate in building, programming, and tournament play of the robots.

7. CONTEST FORMAT/RULES OF PLAY:

- a. Teams must pre-build and program a robot prior to the competition.
- b. Teams will report to the designated location for check in and submit their robot and additional pieces/equipment for inspection.
- c. Each team will be directed to a team table (one 6' or 8' table and chairs). Each table will have access to electricity to power laptops and robot batteries.
- d. An orientation will be provided for all participants and coaches where contest officials will review the challenges, rules, and scoring.
- e. The theme, design of the game and 3 to 4 challenges will be released in advance of the contest. There will be 3 to 4 additional unknown challenges revealed on contest day, during orientation.
- f. Each team will have one and one-half hours for additional designing, building, programing, and testing of their robot.
- g. Teams will practice and compete on the same game table.
- h. If time allows, teams are allowed to make alterations to their robot design and/or program between matches.
- i. Teams must report immediately to the playing field when called.
- j. The robot must perform challenges autonomously.
- k. Only Ag Robotics contestants and contest officials will be allowed in the Robot Challenge areas.
- I. Teams that may experience any equipment malfunction(s) may not replace the equipment with supplies outside the contest area (from leaders, volunteers, county extension agents or contest officials). Instead, team members must work together and be creative in completing preparation without the malfunctioning equipment or visit other teams to borrow the needed part.
- m. Depending on the challenges, contest officials may provide non-Lego items that can be incorporated into the design of the robot.
- n. Coaches will be permitted to meet with their team for a 10-minute time period prior to programming and practice. This time should be used to help team members develop a plan.

Special Rules for Ag Robotics Contest

- No cell phones or other types of communication devices are allowed in the table or contest areas. During programming, practice, and game time, contestants are not allowed to communicate with anyone outside of the contest (coaches, parents, siblings, etc).
- p. A match will range between 1 and 3 minutes in length, depending upon the challenges. The specific time limit will be noted in the game release document.
- q. Teams will have two preliminary matches in which to earn points. The sum score of the two matches plus the teamwork score will determine teams that qualify for the finals. The top 5 teams in each age division will advance to the final match. If there are fewer than 5 teams in an age division, no finals will take place. The total score from the preliminary matches (match + teamwork scores) will be used for preliminary placings.
- r. Finals will consist of two additional matches. The two match scores from the final round will be added to the total preliminary score. Finalist teams will be ranked based on their total scores. Judges' results are final.
- s. Teams must clean up their pit areas prior to the awards ceremony. Teams not making the top 5 are free to leave once their table area has been cleaned and are dismissed by contest officials.

- 11. Bluetooth and Internet Connectivity: Bluetooth connections can be made and utilized during Build Time. It is not allowed during the competition phase while the robot is on the playing field. No internet connectivity will be provided. Teams are advised to make sure their computers' operating system, software and robot firmware are up-to date prior to the contest.
- **12.** Scoring: Point values for each separate challenge may vary, depending on the level of challenge difficulty. Penalties will also depend upon challenge design, but examples may include: knocking over pieces, restricted human interaction with robot or game

pieces, excessive retrievals, etc. Points will be awarded or deducted for each round of match play. Additionally, a teamwork score will be assessed by a panel of judges and added to the match scores to form the preliminary team score. The preliminary team score determines qualifiers for finals. After each match, the team captain will initial the score sheet, indicating agreement to the points awarded. Once signed, the match score is final and cannot be challenged. The contest tabulator will review the score sheet and will correct any mathematical inaccuracies.

- **13. Tie Breaker**: Tie breakers for the contest will be a sudden death match until the tie is broken.
- **14. Participants with Disabilities:** Any competitor who requires auxiliary aids or special accommodations must contact the Livestock Office at least two weeks before the competition.
- 15. Rules of Play: The official rules of play will be released with the challenge in mid-February 2025.
- **16.** Awards: Contestants must be present to receive their awards. Any remaining awards will not be mailed following the show. The following awards will be awarded in <u>both</u> Junior and Senior divisions.

5. Classes:

- a. Four to six classes will be judged (200 300 points) 12 minutes per class.
- b. Two questions classes for a total of 10 questions. Questions classes will be designated during contest (50 points total 5 points per question).
- c. Written test consisting of 25 questions. Questions will be two points each. Questions will be derived from a list of questions maintained by TX FFA, <u>https://www.texasffa.org/cde-dairy-cattle</u>. Exhibitors will be allowed 20 min. to complete written test. (50 pts).
- d. Movement of groups to each class will be controlled by the superintendent.
- 6. **Tiebreakers**: the tiebreaker sequence for this contest will be as follows: (1) Highest total score of all live judging classes, (2) Lowest standard deviation of all live judging classes, and (3) Highest total questions score.
- 7. **Results:** The results, as announced, will be final. Contestants must be present to receive their awards. Any remaining awards will not be mailed following the show.

8. Calf Scramble Certificates:

- a. Certificates will be awarded to the top winners (combined Junior and Senior Divisions excluding high school seniors 12th grade) who have never received a calf scramble certificate at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Number of eligible winners to be determined by Show Management. The certificates will be the only ones given regardless of clerical errors or for any other reason.
- b. Winners who do not report to the Contest Superintendent within 15 minutes after the results have been announced will forfeit their purchase certificates and the next ranking winner will be moved up to receive the forfeited certificate. Any individual that is unable to attend the Awards Presentation because he/she is exhibiting an animal in a concurrent show MUST receive approval from the Contest Superintendent prior to the conclusion of the contest to receive the certificate.
- c. Winners of the certificates will be taken to the Livestock Judging Reception by the Calf Scramble Committee following the Awards Presentation to complete the required forms.



I. Total award for all Calf Scramble Certificate recipients is \$2500, \$2,000 of which will be used to purchase the heifer or market steer and \$500 of which will be received after the banquet at the 2025 Show, provided that all obligations are fulfilled.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this contest is to stimulate the study of, and interest in, the production and retailing of cut flowers, plants and foliage through the agricultural education curriculum. The event requires students to identify plant materials, tools, and pests common to the industry, demonstrate knowledge and understanding of scientific principles and management practices applied in the industry via a written exam, make observations, draw conclusions, and utilize higher order thinking skills in problem solving situations. This event has ties to the following agricultural science curriculum: TEKS 130.20, Floral Design, TEKS 130.23 Horticulture Science and TEKS 130.25 Practicum in Agriculture, Food and Natural Sciences.

Special Rules for Floriculture Contest

- 1. **Rules:** This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, Rules for All 4-H and FFA Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Eligibility: (See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
- 3. Conduct of Contestants: (See Conduct of Contestants for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
 - a. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disqualification.

4. Contest:

a. Team Make-up: Three or four individuals per school form a team. All members will be scored, and the top three scores will count towards the team total.

b. Equipment:

- 1. Team members must provide their own sharpened No. 2 pencils for the event. A pencil sharpener may not be available in each event room.
- 2. Team members must provide their own compliant transparent plastic clipboard free of all current or recycled lapel contest stickers; must be sticker free (excluding school logos which were applied when clipboard was manufactured) and/or clean folder with the following items: scan sheet, and/or copy of the scan sheet, optional TX FFA CDE drop sheet, and/or 2 sheets of lined or unlined blank paper.
- **3.** Team members may use their own battery-operated non-programmable calculators. If the calculator has either a PROB, PGM, or TVM button or if the calculator has a large screen and the ability to graph function, it is programmable and will not be permitted. Letters above the number keys also indicate that the calculator is programmable.
- 4. Team members are **not** permitted to share calculators between teammates or among other contestants.
- 5. No allowance will be made for malfunctioning or inoperable calculators.
- 6. The "Universal Form C" scan sheet will be used for this CDE.

c. Event Schedule:

- 1. Each contestant shall complete the event in the time allotted:
 - a. The identification of plant materials/pests/diseases/tools must be completed in 60 minutes. The identification will be divided into two (30 minute) rotations.
 - b. The problem-solving section must be completed in 30 minutes
 - c. The placing classes must be completed in 15 minutes. The contestants will be able to work within the placing classes at their own pace during the 15 minutes.
 - d. The keep/cull section must be completed in 15 minutes. The contestants will be able to work within the keep/cull sections at their own pace during the 15 minutes.
 - e. The written examination must be completed in 30 minutes.
- 2. Observers are not permitted in the event area while the event is in progress, but observers may be allowed in the area following the event.

3. Providers are encouraged to leave contest materials in place for one hour following the conclusion of the event to allow teachers and students adequate time for review.

d. Identification of Plants/Tools/Pests/Diseases (600 points)

- 1. 60 specimens will be selected from the 170 plants/tools/pests/diseases listed on the TX Floriculture list.
 - Specimens will be identified in two rotations, 25 plants and five pests/diseases/tools in each rotation, with 30 minutes to complete each rotation. All contestants will be allowed to work within the rotation, at their own pace. Contestants cannot return to a rotation once it is timed out.
 - **3.** A plant specimen may consist of any part of the plant commonly utilized in the floriculture industry for plant identification. The plant must match the plant listed on the TX Floriculture CDE list.
 - **4.** Plants to be identified will be presented as intact, live specimens. Tools may be either an intact item or high-quality photographs. Pest and diseases may be presented as an intact specimen, photograph, or preserved specimen (herbarium sheet, insect mount). Photograph should be a minimum of 8.5" x 11" in size.
 - 5. When a pest or disease must be presented with an affected plant, a "Pest/Disease" label will be with the item to designate identification of the problem rather than the plant. The Pest/Disease label will be placed as part of the number of the specific specimen.
 - 6. Each contestant will be supplied with a list of the plants, pests, diseases, and tools. Contest providers will distribute this list to the contestants at the start of the contest, to insure equal access to the information throughout the event.
 - 7. Each specimen will be designated with a number. Students bubble in the appropriate number in the space next to the specimen's name on the scan sheet.
 - 8. 10 points are given for each correctly identified specimen.
 - 9. Under no circumstances is any contestant allowed to touch or handle the photos or specimen used as part of the event. Any infraction of this policy is sufficient cause to eliminate the individual from the **entire contest**.
 - **10.** If live pests are used, a magnifying device will be provided. (Enough devices for multiple students to identify at the same time 6 preferred)
 - 11. If live pests are used, there will only be one species of pest per ID. (Providers should ensure there are not multiple species on the same ID spot)

e. Placing Classes (150 points)

- i. Contestant's place three classes that are selected from the Placing Classes List.
- ii. All plants in a class will be from the same species or cultivar.
- iii. There will be classes from each of the following types:
 - 1. 1 class of blooming container plants.
 - 2. 1 class of foliage container plants.
 - 3. 1 class of floral designs.
- iv. Classes will consist of four items per placing class.
- v. Classes will be designated by number and class name.
- vi. 50 points are given for each correctly placed class.
- vii. Floral designs will be labeled by type (symmetrical, asymmetrical, round or horizontal/vertical line).
- viii. Blooming Container Plant classes will consist of all 4 specimens of the same variety and color.
- ix. If the quality plants from the suggested list of plants to be used in a placing class are not available, the provider may substitute plants/flowers from only those listed on the identification list.

One class of blooming container plants, which may include:

- Kalanchoe blossfeldiana cv. Kalanchoe
- Rhododendron cv. Azalea
- Saintpaulia ionantha cv. African Violet
- Chrysanthemum x morifolium cv. Florist's chrysanthemum

- f. Cut Flower Keep/Cull Classes (150 points)

- i. One class each of line, form and mass flowers (eight specimens per class/three classes total)
- ii. The guidelines will follow A Manual for Flower Judging (see reference section) in determining the keep/cull classes.
- iii. Contestants should designate the four best plant specimens from the eight specimens presented, using visual appraisal. Students are not permitted to handle any plant specimen.
- iv. Event officials will assign a point value to each one of the individual plant specimens, within the class, with the greatest number of points assigned to the most desirable specimen and the least points assigned to the least desirable specimen. If the student selects the best four plant specimens, within the provided class full credit will be given (50 points). The selection of less desirable plant specimens will reduce the points awarded within each keep/cull class.
- v. Classes will only contain 1 specimen per container for the Keep/Cull section.
- vi. If quality specimens from the suggested list of specimens to be used in a Keep/Cull class are not available, the provider may substitute plants/flowers (keeping within the same type, Mass, Line, Form) from only those listed on the identification list.

One class of cut line flowers which may include:

- Antirrhinum majus cv. Snapdragon
- Delphinium elatum Delphinium
- Gladiolus x hortulanus cv. Gladiolus
- Consolida ambigua cv. Larkspur
- Liatris spicata Liatris

One class of cut form flowers which may include:

One class of cut mass flowers which may include:

g. General Knowledge Examination (100 points)

- i. Contestants will complete a 50 question multiple choice exam.
- ii. Questions will be taken from a data bank of questions located on the TX FFA website.
- iii. Contestants are given 30 minutes to complete the examination.
- iv. Two points are awarded for each question answered correctly.

h. Problem Solving (100 points)

i. This practicum is designed to evaluate participant's knowledge and ability related to floricultural practices in the industry and selection, care and handling of interior plants in various settings. The practicums will alternate as noted:

2022

- Pricing and Calculating a Bill of Materials; and
- Care and Handling of Cut Flowers ie. Processing, conditioning, and storage.

2023

- Pricing and Calculating a Bill of Materials including Marketing, Pricing and Sales; and
- Principles and Elements of Design

2024

- Pricing and Calculating a Bill of Materials for Weddings; and
- Creating Wedding Designs

2025

- Pricing and Calculating a Bill of Materials for Sympathy Flowers; and
- Creating Sympathy Designs

2026

- Pricing and Calculating Specialty Designs (ie. Homecoming, holidays, corsages/boutonnieres); and
- Plant Structures and Functions
- ii. Contestants will be provided a written scenario that they must assess to determine the correct answers.
- iii. Contestants will complete 10 multiple-choice questions.
- iv. Contestants are given 30 minutes to complete the problem solving.
- v. 10 points are awarded for each question answered correctly.

- vi. No more than 5 of the 10 multiple choice questions will require calculations from the pricing and calculating section.
- vii. A formula chart will be provided as part of the practicum section. This formula chart will be designed and added as a resource in regard to pricing, rounding, and calculations.

Special Rules for 4-H & FFA Food Challenge

- 1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, Rules for All 4-H and FFA Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Eligibility: (See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Contests).
- 2. Conduct of Contestants: (See Conduct of Contestants for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
 - a. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disqualification.
- **3.** Maximum entries: Each county 4-H program/chapter may enter a maximum of two (2) Junior teams and a maximum of two (2) Senior teams.
- 4. Members per team: Each team will have at least three (3) and no more than four (4) members. Teams may not include members in different age divisions (i.e., Juniors mixed with Seniors). <u>Team member names are not required until day of contest.</u>
- 5. Entry fee: (See Entries for All 4-H and FFA Contests)
- 6. Attire: Each team will have the option of wearing coordinated clothing, aprons, or hair coverings. Each team member is required to wear closed toe shoes and a hair restraint. Each team member must wear a hat, hair net and/or other type of hair restraint during the food preparation part of the competition. No electronic devices or jewelry (except medically required) are allowed in contest. This includes cell phones, smart watches, or other communication devices.
- 7. Resource materials: Printed resource materials will be provided for each team at the contest. These include Choose MyPlate Mini Poster, Fight Bac Fight Foodborne Bacteria Brochure, Know Your Nutrients, Food Safety Fact Sheet. No other resource materials will be allowed. Teams may not use their personal copies of the resources during the contest.
- 8. Supply box: Each team must supply their own equipment for the challenge. Teams may only bring the supplies listed in the contest supply box listed on last page of the 4-H & FFA Food Challenge Rules. Team boxes may be randomly selected for inspection at the time of contest check-in. Any extra equipment found during inspection will be removed from the team's supply box. Throughout the contest, teams that are in the possession of supplies not on the official supply list may be disqualified.

Special Rules for 4-H & FFA Food Challenge

Boxes must be completely closed, and all equipment should remain inside the box until the start of the contest. Supply boxes are limited to the following dimensions: 40" x 24" X 40". If box is on wheels, the height of the wheels is not included in the dimensions. The contest committee may measure any and/or all boxes to determine compliance to size. If boxes are out of compliance, teams may be disqualified.

- 9. Food categories: 1) Appetizer 2) Main Dish 3) Side Dish 4) Healthy Dessert. Teams will be randomly assigned to a category, with assignments revealed at the cooking/preparation station and/or during team orientation. Each team will be directed to a cooking/preparation station consisting of a table and electrical outlet. Only participants and contest officials will be allowed in food preparation areas.
- 10. Contest format: Each team will receive an information sheet with their contest category and "key" ingredient for that category (no ingredient amounts, recipe, or instructions will be provided at the station). The "key" ingredient will be representative of one of the following categories: Appetizer, Main Dish, Side Dish, Healthy Dessert. Teams will also be able to use items from a "pantry" they bring as a part of their supply box (see the supply box list for a list of allowable pantry items).

Teams will have access to a "grocery store" of additional ingredients which should be combined with the team's "key" ingredient to create an original recipe/dish during the contest. Grocery store items will include items commonly found in grocery stores such as produce, canned goods, crackers, dairy products, etc.

Teams must select & use at least two additional items from the "grocery store" and will be provided the maximum number of items they can select during orientation. Teams will not be required to analyze cost of recipe, nor will this be included in the presentation or scoring of the contest. Contest currency and cost analysis have been eliminated.

- 11. Preparation: Teams will have 40 minutes to prepare the dish, plan a presentation, and clean up the preparation area. Each team will create an entire dish/recipe (not a full meal) using the provided key ingredient and grocery store items. Dishes/recipes created should include two or more servings. Teams should present the entire dish/ recipe to the judges and communicate during their presentation what an individual serving size should be. Teams will be responsible for determining the number of servings their dish provides. Teams should not create multiple dishes with their ingredients/pantry items.
 - a. Teams are challenged with being creative and developing their own recipe with the ingredients provided.
 - b. Teams will determine the exact amount of each ingredient used based on their original recipe.
 - c. The key ingredient provided to and/or grocery store items selected by each team may also be used to garnish the dish.
 - d. Note cards may be used to write down the recipe that the team invents, along with notes related to nutrition, and food safety. Teams should be exact on ingredients used, preparation steps, cooking time, temperature, etc.
- 12. Food and Equipment safety: A safe and sanitary working environment must be maintained during the contest. Each station will have food and kitchen safety printed resources for reference. Teams should follow the steps listed to ensure proper food and equipment safety is practiced. Judges will be scoring teams on food and equipment safety during the preparation phase of the contest. Teams should also discuss food safety practices used in the team presentation to the judges. A copy of the score cards can be found at https://texas4-h.tamu.edu/projects/food-nutrition

Gloves: Gloves do not have to be worn throughout the contest; however, there should always be a barrier between your hand and any food touched. A barrier includes gloves and/or a cooking utensil. When wearing gloves, they must be changed between handling raw meats/seafood; handling cooked items; and ready to eat items or raw vegetables to prevent cross contamination. Hand sanitizer should be used during the preparation phase of the contest to further prevent cross contamination.

Hair Restraint: Each team member must wear a hat, hair net and/or other type of hair restraint during the food preparation part of the competition. Examples of acceptable hair restraints includes hairnets, bandana with hair pulled completely back, chef hat with hair restrained inside, or a cap with hair completely tucked inside.

- **13.** Nutrition: Each station will have a variety of nutrition printed resources/references. Each team should highlight key nutrients in their dish and their functions during the presentation.
- 14. Cost analysis: Teams will not be required to analyze cost of the recipe, nor will this be included in the presentation or scoring of the contest.
- **15. Equipment malfunctions:** Teams that may experience any equipment malfunction(s) may not replace the equipment with supplies from another team, leaders, volunteers, CEA/ASTs or contest officials. Team members must work together and be creative in completing preparation without the malfunctioning equipment.
- **16. Presentation:** Following the preparation phase of the contest, each team will give a 5-minute presentation to a panel of judges. Team presentations should include the criteria on the score card which includes Knowledge of MyPlate and Dietary Guidelines; Nutrition Knowledge; Food Preparation; Safety Concerns and Practices; and Serving Size information. Teams should remember

that food appearance and quality; creativity used; and utilization of effective communication skills is also included on the score card. A copy of the score cards can be found at https://texas4-h.tamu.edu/projects/food-nutrition.

- a. A majority of team members must participate in the presentation.
- b. To earn maximum points, teams must use the 5-minute presentation to address the following areas of the presentation scorecard: Knowledge of MyPlate and Dietary Guidelines, Nutrition Knowledge, Food Preparation Steps, Safety Concerns and Practices, and Serving Size.
- c. At the end of 5 minutes, time will be called additional time will not be allowed. Judges will be allowed 3 minutes to ask questions. Judges will not ask questions related to what teams should have covered during the presentation. Judge's questions will be related to general nutrition, health, chronic disease prevention or others relevant to food and nutrition.
- d. No talking or writing is allowed among any team members while waiting to present. Team members caught talking and/or writing will receive a warning. The second time, the team will be disqualified and asked to leave. Team members should not have pens or pencils in their possession while waiting to present.
- **17. Clean-up:** Teams must clean up their preparation areas. Clean-up time is included in the 40-minute preparation allotment. Teams should plan to not have access to a kitchen facility; therefore, dirty dishes should be placed in a plastic container, bag or box to be cleaned at a later time. <u>Left-over food should be disposed of in trashcans made available not in the bathrooms</u>.
- **18.** Finished Dishes: Finished dishes MAY NOT leave the preparation/judging areas. Dishes must be discarded after teams complete the judging process to ensure teams in following heats do not see what ingredients are available to gain an advantage.
- **19. Final Round:** The first-place team in each category per age division will compete in the final round competition. Teams competing in the final round will be provided with an area to wash their supplies in preparation for the Finals.
- **20.** Tie breakers: The tie breaker sequence will be 1. Presentation score; 2. Preparation score; 3. Questions section of the Presentation scorecard
- **21.** Awards: Contestants must be present to receive their awards. Any remaining awards will not be mailed following the show. The following awards will be awarded in <u>both</u> Junior and Senior divisions. Once announced, all contest results are final.

- 1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, Rules for All 4-H and FFA Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Eligibility: (See eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
 - a. Teams consisting of three (3) or four (4) contestants will be eligible for team awards. Teams that consist of less than three (3) will only be eligible for individual awards.
- 3. Conduct of Contestants: (See Conduct of Contestants for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
 - a. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disqualification.
- 4. Scoring: (See Scoring for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
- 5. Classes:
 - a. Eight live animal classes (400 points). One set of ten questions (50 points). Contest will consist of (450 points).
 - b. Animals within a class will be designated by numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4.
 - c. No oral reasons for this contest. Questions come from at least 3 of the placing classes.
 - d. The species that will make up the contest include beef cattle, swine, sheep, and meat goats.
- 6. Results: The contest results, as announced, will be final. Contestants must be present to receive their awards. Any remaining awards will not be mailed following the show.

7. Calf Scramble Certificates:

- a. Certificates will be awarded to the top winners (combined Junior and Senior Divisions excluding high school seniors 12th grade) who have never received a calf scramble certificate at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Number of eligible winners to be determined by Show Management. The certificates will be the only ones given regardless of clerical errors or for any other reason.
- b. Winners who do not report to the Contest Superintendent within 15 minutes after the results have been announced will forfeit their purchase certificates and the next ranking winner will be moved up to receive the forfeited certificate. Any individual that is unable to attend the Awards Presentation because he/she is exhibiting an animal in a concurrent show MUST receive approval from the Contest Superintendent prior to the conclusion of the contest to receive the certificate.
- c. Winners of the certificates will be taken to the Livestock Judging Reception by the Calf Scramble Committee following the Awards Presentation to complete the required forms.



- Total award for all Calf Scramble Certificate recipients is \$2,500, \$2,000 of which will be used to purchase the heifer or market steer and \$500 of which will be received after the banquet at the 2025 Show, provided that all obligations are fulfilled.
- Purchase certificates in the amount of \$2,000 must be used in the purchase of a breeding beef heifer or a market steer approved by the CEA or AST. Heifers must be born between Jan. 1, 2024, and Apr. 30, 2025.

- 9. 4-H and FFA will participate in retail cut identification. The official list of retail identification cuts and corresponding code list will be identical for 4-H and FFA participants and will be the official list for this contest. Point values for 4-H and FFA retail identification will be consistent with TX 4-H and FFA guidelines, respectively.
- 10. Five questions on each of two classes shall be prepared by the official committee. The classes for questions will be identified to participants immediately prior to judging of the class. Questions should be derived from clear decisions that should be made while determining the placing of the class. Questions will be written and administered to all participants as a class in the contest rotation or as the last class in the contest depending upon facility limitations.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Nursery/Landscape Career Development Event (CDE) is to encourage FFA members to explore the diversity of the "Green Industry", in terms of plant materials used, basic knowledge, skills and applications to the workplace through the agricultural education curriculum. This is an important facet to agriculture in TX. The event requires students to identify plant materials and tools common to the industry, demonstrate knowledge and understanding of scientific principles and management practices applied in the industry via a written exam, and make observations, draw conclusions and make decisions in evaluating groups of plants and landscape designs. The event has ties to the following agricultural science curriculum: TEKS 130.21, Landscape Design Management; TEKS 130.23, Horticulture Science; TEKS 130.22, Turf grass Management and TEKS 130.25, Practicum in Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources.

Special Rules for Nursery/Landscape

- 1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, Rules for All 4-H and FFA Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- 2. Eligibility: (See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
- 3. Conduct of Contestants: (See Conduct of Contestants for all 4-H and FFA Contests)
 - a. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disqualification.

4. Event Format:

- a. **Team Make-up:** Three or four individuals per school form a team. All members will be scored, and the top three scores will count towards the team total.
- b. Equipment
 - i. Team members must provide their own sharpened No. 2 pencils for the event. A pencil sharpener may not be available in each event room.
 - ii. Team members must provide their own compliant transparent plastic clipboard free of all current or recycled lapel contest stickers; must be sticker free (excluding school logos which were applied when the clipboard was manufactured) and/or clean folder with the following items: scan sheet, and/or copy of the scan sheet, optional TX FFA CDE drop sheet, and/or 2 sheets of lined or unlined black paper.
 - iii. Team members must provide their own architect scale for the event.
 - iv. Team members may use their own battery-operated non-programmable calculators. If the calculator has either a PROB, PGM, or TVM button or if the calculator has a large screen and the ability to graph function, it is programmable and will not be permitted. Letters above the number keys also indicate that the calculator is programmable.
 - v. Team members are <u>not</u> permitted to share calculators or architect scale between teammates or among any other contestants.
 - vi. No allowance will be made for malfunctioning or inoperable calculators. Electrical outlets will not be available for charging batteries, etc.
 - vii. Team members must provide their own architect scale for the event.
 - viii. The "Universal Form C" scan sheet will be used for this CDE.

c. Event Schedule

- i. Each contestant shall complete the event in the time allotted:
 - a. The identification of plant materials/pests/diseases/tools must be completed in 60 minutes. The identification section will be divided into two-30-minute rotations.
 - b. The problem-solving section must be completed in 30 minutes.
 - c. The Keep/Cull section must be completed in 30 minutes.
 - d. The Written Examination must be competed in 30 minutes.
 - e. Observers are not permitted in the event area while the event is in progress, but observers may be allowed in the

area following the event at the discretion of the superintendent.

ii. Providers are encouraged to leave contest materials in place for one hour following the conclusion of the event to allow students adequate time for review. Observers are not permitted in the event area while the event is in progress, but observers may be allowed in the area following the event.

d. Identification Section (600 points)

- i. 60 specimens will be selected from the 170 plants, diseases, disorders, weed and tool list presented on the TX FFA Nursery/Landscape Identification List.
- **ii.** Specimens will be identified in two rotations, 25 plants and five pests/diseases/disorders/weeds/tools in each rotation, with 30 minutes to complete each rotation. All contestants will be allowed to work within the rotation, at their own pace. Contestants cannot return to a rotation once it is timed out.
- iii. A plant specimen may consist of any part of the plant commonly utilized in the nursery/landscape industry for plant identification. The plant must be the exact plant listed on the TX Nursery/Landscape Identification List.
- iv. Plants to identify will be presented as intact, live specimens. Tools may be either intact items or high-quality photographs. Pest and diseases may be presented as intact specimens, photographs, or preserved specimens (herbarium sheet, insect mount). Photograph will be 8.5" x 11" in size.
- v. When a pest or disease must be presented with an affected plant, a "Pest/Disease" label will be with the item to designate identification of the problem rather than the plant.
- vi. Each contestant will be supplied with a list of the plants, pests, diseases, disorders, weeds, and tools. Contest providers will distribute this list to contestants at the start of the contest to insure equal access to the information throughout the event.
- vii. Each specimen will be designated with a number. Students bubble in the appropriate number in the space next to the specimen's name on the official scan sheet.
- viii. 10 points are given for each correctly identified specimen.
- ix. Under no circumstances is any student allowed to touch or handle the photos or specimen used as part of the event. Any infraction of this policy is sufficient cause to eliminate the individual from the **entire contest**.

e. Problem Solving (100 points)

ii.

- i. This practicum is designed to evaluate participants' ability to evaluate a landscape design, read a landscape drawing, measure and calculate materials needed to execute a landscape plan and evaluate factors that affect profitability of a landscape business. In addition, the contest provider will incorporate two to five questions related to the following topics:
 - 2022: Plant Nutrition, Chap 6 in the TNLA TCNP manual
 - 2023: Plant Pests, Chap 7 in the TNCP manual
 - 2024: Soil & Growing Media, Chap 5 in the TCNP manual
 - 2025: Landscape Design, Chap 18 in the TCNP manual
 - 2026: Landscape Color, Chap 15 in the TCNP manual
 - Blank typing paper will be provided at the contest site for calculations.
- iii. Students will have 30 minutes to complete this section.

f. Plant Keep/Cull Classes (200 points)

- i. This section will consist of 10 multiple choice questions worth 10 points each.
- ii. One class each of groundcovers/vines, shrubs, and annual or herbaceous plants (eight specimens per class/three classes total). A fourth keep/cull class will be selected by the contest provider from the keep/cull class listing, for a total of four keep/cull classes.
- **iii.** Contestants should designate the four best plant specimens from the eight specimens presented, using visual appraisal. Contestants are not permitted to handle any plant specimen.
- iv. Event officials will assign a point value to each one of the individual plant specimens, with the greatest number of points assigned to the most desirable specimen and the least points assigned to the least desirable specimen. If the student selects the best four plant specimens, within an individual class, full credit will be given (50 points). The selection of less desirable plant specimens will reduce the points awarded within standards available on JudgingCard.com. A new table illustrating keep/cull point groupings will be available on JudgingCard.com

I. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, the Junior Show Rules and Regulations, Rules for All 4-H and FFA Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.



Eligibility: (See Eligibility for all 4-H and FFA Contests). Students will only be able to compete in either the junior or senior divisions of the Veterinary Science Contest.

- a) Junior Division Contestants must be 8 years of age (in addition to being in the 3rd grade) and not over 13 years of age as of August 31, 2024.
- b) Senior Division Contestants must be 14 to 18 years of age as of August 31, 2024, and are enrolled in, and attending, public or private elementary or secondary schools in TX.

Conduct of Contestants: (See Conduct of Contestants for all 4-H and FFA Contests)

- a. Communication devices (cell phone, tablets, smart watches, fitness trackers, and any other smartphone style watch devices) are not permitted to be in the possession of the contestant for the duration of the contest, except those devices which are required for medical reasons (ie blood sugar monitors/apps). Convey medical device needs to contest superintendents in advance. Violation by any team member or individual contestant will result in disgualification.
- 4. Contest participation: Entries can be submitted for teams and individual contestants, to be considered a team, a team entry must be submitted. Each team shall consist of three or four members, with the three highest scores being used for team scores. The Communication round (final round) will not count towards team scores.
- 5. Contest Components: There will be five (5) components or "rounds" to the contest. Each component will be weighted in the following manner for scoring purposes:

Written Exam	200 points (20%)
ID Exam	150 points (15%)
Practicum	400 points (40%)
Math Practicum	100 Points (10%)
Communication	150 points (15%)
Total	1000 points (100%)

The top five (5) participants in the junior Division and the top five (5) participants in the senior Division will advance to the Communication round. Top scores for the finalist in each division will be determined by adding participants' points from the first four (4) contest components (Written Exam, ID Exam, Practicum, and Math Practicum). Total scores to establish final ranking will be determined by adding points earned in all five (5) contest components for a maximum of 1000 points. For the Communication round, the top 5 participants in each division will individually present a 3–5-minute informative speech related to the specified topic without using any outside materials. Each year, a list of five (5) possible topics will be identified so that preparation may begin prior to the contest. From these five (5) topics, one will be selected by contest officials as the Communication round topic for the contest. Participants will receive the selected speech topic the day of the contest and will have no less than 15 minutes to prepare. Judges may ask questions. Spectators and eliminated participants may watch the Communication round, but may not speak, signal, or otherwise communicate with participants. Spectators and eliminated participants may not ask questions. The Communication round will be worth 150 points.

Written Exam: For Junior and Senior members and team's questions will be written regarding information selected from the Veterinary Science: Preparatory Training for the Veterinary Assistant and the Texas FFA CDE Vet Science Test bank. Questions may be multiple choice, true/false, matching, identification or short answer. There will be 50 questions, each worth four (4) points, for a total of 200 points.
- 7. Identification Exam: The Identification Exam will include twenty-five (25) Veterinary Instruments, twenty-five (25) Breeds (cattle, horses, sheep, goats, swine, dogs, and cats), and twenty-five (25) Parasites and Internal Organs. This portion will be made up of 75 questions worth 2 points each for a total of 150 points.



Practicum: The Practicum will be the hands-on component of the contest. Participants will perform the skills individually. The superintendents will select three of the six skills listed below.

- i. Administering an Oral/Tablet capsule
- ii. Bandage Removal
- iii. Fecal flotation

- iv. Filling a prescription
- v. Placing a tail tie
- vi. Suture Removal

At each station, instructions and time constraints will be provided. The practicum will be judged using a rubric for thoroughness, safety, and overall completion of the skill in the allotted time. The Practicum will be worth 400 points total. Each skill may be weighted with different point values depending upon the complexity of the skill.

- **9.** Math Practicum: The math practicum could include conversions, dose calculations, dilutions and cost calculations and invoices. Calculators will be provided for this section. The math practicum will be worth 100 points.

1. Entry:

- a. Entries will be taken via online registration site. A link to the online entry system will be posted to the Livestock Exhibitor page of the rodeohouston.com website by mid-November. Paper entry forms will not be accepted.
- b. Entry Deadline is February 1, 2025.
- c. Payment must be completed either via online registration or mailed to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Offices. All entries must be postmarked by February1st. **NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER FEBRUARY 1ST.**

2. Conduct of Contestants:

- a. There will be no talking between contestants during the contest. Violating this rule may cause the contestants and their teams to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards.
- b. Only contestants and contest officials will be permitted in the contest area during the contest.
- c. Contestants must have their group letter clearly visible on their clothing.
- d. Contestants cannot smoke or use any tobacco products in contest facilities.
- e. Contestants should not monopolize any one exhibit for an unreasonable length of time.

Special Rules for Junior and Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest

1. Rules:

- a. This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Rules for All Intercollegiate Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.
- b. All Rules are subject to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Junior College Livestock Coaches' Association and the National Collegiate Livestock Judging Coaches' Association.
- 2. College Eligibility: Junior colleges in the U.S. with agriculture departments are eligible to enter the Junior contest. Senior colleges in the U.S. which offer a degree in Animal Science are eligible to enter this contest. The entry application must be signed officially by the team coach, certifying that all team members are eligible for entry in this contest. Each college will be permitted to enter one team.
- 3. Entry Fees and Procedures: An entry fee of \$100 per team (6 members per team) plus \$30 for each additional individual will be charged for entering this contest. Junior and Senior colleges will be allowed to enter additional individual contestants.
- 4. Coaches Meeting: Coaches will designate their team members the morning of the contest. All scratches must be turned at that time as well. The Coaches' Meeting will take place virtually.
- 5. Junior Eligibility / Team Makeup: Each Junior team will consist of six members. The five highest scores will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards. Junior college individual participants designated as alternates will be eligible for individual overall awards, but ineligible to compete for team or team member individual awards. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Junior (2-year program) College and may not have credit for more than 66 semester hours or the equivalent. Contestants must have attended full time the previous semester at the school for which they are competing, or not attended any Junior College the previous semester, in order to be eligible to compete. Students must have a 2.0 GPA on a 4-point scale to be eligible.
- 6. Senior Eligibility/Senior Team: Each Senior team will consist of six members. The five highest scores will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards. Senior college individual participants designated as alternates will be eligible for individual overall awards, but ineligible to compete for team or team member individual awards. Contestants must be regularly enrolled as a full-time student in a Senior College which offers degrees in agriculture. Students who have participated as contestants in Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contests of interstate or international character previous to January 1 are not eligible to enter this contest. Contestants must have been regularly enrolled in their respective colleges the previous semester and must not have served any time as an animal science instructor at any secondary school or college. Students must have a 2.0 cumulative GPA on a 4-point scale and meet criteria established by National Collegiate Livestock Judging Coaches Association to be eligible.
- 7. Future Contests: Contestants entering this contest will not be eligible to enter future Junior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contests held at the Houston Livestock Show but may be eligible to enter the Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest if they transfer to a Senior College.
- 8. Barn Entry: No contestant or coach will be permitted to enter the show grounds/NRG Arena 24 hours prior to the contest.

Special Rules for Junior and Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest

- 9. Arena Seating: Coaches and alternates will not be permitted in the seats of the arena while the contest is in progress. Coaches and alternates may be permitted to see the classes after the judging is completed.
- 10. Class Makeup: The contest will consist of five classes of beef cattle, four classes of sheep and/or goats, and three classes of swine. There will be a minimum of one market beef, market hog, and market lamb or goat class. Performance classes with scenarios will be provided to the contestants on at least three classes, preferably one in each division. This information, along with visual appraisal, will be used to arrive at the final placing and will be included as a portion of the oral reason discussion. Contestants will be briefed on any assumptions to be used in placings prior to the start of the contest.
- **11.** When available, performance information may be used for evaluation of breeding classes.
- **12.** Time: On each class of livestock, 15 minutes will be allowed for the contestants to make their observations, record their placings and take such notes as will assist them in remembering the class when they appear before the judge to present their oral reasons. Contestants will be notified two minutes before the time is up.
- 13. Class Change: Each group of contestants will change to another class as directed by the Superintendent and/or group leader.
- 14. Oral Reasons: After placing all classes in the contest, the contestants will each appear before judges to give oral reasons substantiating their placings. Oral reasons will be given on eight (8) classes (4 cattle, 2 sheep/goats and 2 swine). Each contestant will be allowed two minutes to give his/her reasons on each class. Contestants will not be allowed to hold any paper, card, or device of any kind to assist in reasons presentation.
- **15.** Dress Code: No contestant will wear any uniform, college colors or belt buckle, or will in any way signify to the judge his/her identity or the identity of the college represented.
- **16.** Talking: While the contest is in progress, there is to be no conferring between contestants or anyone else, except as directed by the Superintendent or his representative.
- **17. Rule Violations:** Any coach or contestant who violates any of the rules of this contest will be barred from competing in future contests and their team will be disqualified for any awards.
- 18. Ties: Ties will be broken using species reasons scores, overall reasons scores and overall score when breaking ties within species. Ties within reasons will be broken by overall score and ties within overall score will be broken by overall reasons. Scores tied after application of these tie breakers will be broken by a method determined by contest officials. No duplicate awards will be given.
- 19. Scoring: Scan sheets used for scoring are provided by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo[™]. Standard rules that apply to optical scanning should be followed (blacken only one bubble per class, completely blacken the bubble, avoid stray marks, do not fold or bend). Each contestant must provide their own #2 pencil and may bring a clipboard for use during the contest. Forms that are bent or abused will not be scored. Team number and contestant number are assigned at registration.

Special Rules for Intercollegiate Meat Judging Contest

1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Rules for All Intercollegiate Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

2. Eligibility:

- a. <u>Entry Fees and Procedures:</u> An entry fee of \$100 per team (4 members per team) plus \$30 for each additional individual will be charged for entering this contest. Junior and Senior colleges will be allowed to enter additional individual contestants.
- b. Schools may enter two (2) teams and as many other individuals as entry fees are paid for.
- c. All individuals will compete for individual awards and designated teams will compete for team awards.
- d. Contest is open to agricultural colleges and universities and to any other higher educational institutions where instruction in meat grading and meat judging are included as a regular part of the curriculum. Foreign exchange students who are not currently enrolled in a university program are ineligible to compete. Foreign exchange students enrolled in a university or training in a facility while being coached with a team from that university are eligible.
- e. There will be two divisions in the contest: Junior College and Senior College. If HLSR is the first contest of the year for an institution, that institution may compete in which ever division it designates. If the institution has already competed in one or more contests within the calendar year, it must enter the same division in which it previously competed. All students from a single institution must compete in the same Division.
- f. Junior College Division will answer questions on classes from the first part of the contest and will not participate in the specification class.
- g. Senior College Division will write reasons on classes from the first part of the contest and the specification class will count as part of the overall score.
- h. A team will consist of four (4) members to be designated by their respective coach at time of registration.
- i. Any contestant must be an undergraduate student who has not competed in an Intercollegiate Meat Judging Contest prior to the current calendar year. Contestants must be a regularly enrolled student in the school they are representing and have successfully completed at least one semester or quarter's work. The contestant must never have served as an instructor in any college, university, or secondary school. Each participating institution shall certify its own contestants and adjudge their eligibility.

3. Conduct of Contestants:

- a. Contestants will move from exhibit to exhibit during the contest in groups.
- b. A group leader will be provided for each group of contestants. The leader's duty will be to enforce the contest rules and keep the exhibits of the class on which his group is working in an orderly arrangement.

Special Rules for Intercollegiate Meat Judging Contest

- c. Contestants will not be permitted to:
 - i. Handle any exhibit.
 - ii. Use any mechanical aid, such as measure or light, etc.
 - iii. Talk to fellow team members at any time during the contest, including the lunch hours.
 - iv. Smoke, except as permitted.
 - v. Monopolize any one exhibit for an unreasonable length of time.
 - vi. Separate themselves from the class on which their group is working.
 - vii. In any way willfully obstruct the work of any other contestant.

4. Writing Reasons and Answering Questions:

- a. Junior College Division will answer questions on the five questions classes. Questions will pertain to the quality, yield, or other logical differences between each carcass or wholesale cut. There will be 10 questions for each of the five classes. Each correct answer will receive five points for a possible total of 50 points per class. Incorrect answers will receive zero points.
- b. Senior College Division will write reasons on each of the five reasons judging classes. Each set of reasons will carry a possible 50 points and will be graded by a member of the official committee.
- c. After all reasons and questions classes have been placed, contestants will retire to a suitable warm area for a review of notes. Junior College Division will be allowed 15 minutes for review of notes. Senior College Division will be allowed 30 minutes for review of notes.
- d. A period of 4 minutes will be allowed to answer each set of questions and fifteen minutes will be allowed to write each set of reasons. All contestants will answer questions on the same class at the same time. Contestants will write reasons in the same order in which they judged the classes.
- e. A period of four minutes between each set of questions and three minutes between each set of reasons will be allowed (with pencils down) to allow contestants to review their notes on the next class. Notes may be referred to during the period reasons are being written, but not while answering questions.
- f. A one-minute warning will be given after three minutes have elapsed for answering questions. A two-minute warning will be given after 13 minutes have elapsed for writing reasons.
- 5. Supplies: All blank forms, Placing Cards, Reasons Cards, and notes for reasons or questions sheets will be provided by the contest administration. Clipboards, pens, pencils, frocks, cooler coats, and suitable head cover shall be provided by the contestants or their institution.

6. Time:

- a. 15 minutes will be allowed in the cooler for note taking and placing each of the five reasons and questions classes. Contestants will stand back from all classes for the initial four minutes to review general appearance factors. 15 minutes will also be allowed for beef quality grading with no stand back required. Additionally, two 15-minute periods will be allowed for the Senior College Division to evaluate the specification class, however, once a participant has moved to the second set of specification cuts, they may not go back to the first set.
- b. 10 minutes will be allowed for judging each of the four non-reason placing classes as well as the value based pricing class.
- c. Three 10-minute periods will be allowed for yield grading 15 beef carcasses (5 per period). Contestants may only evaluate the five beef yield grading carcasses in their class and cannot go back or move on to the next set. The yield grading classes do not have to be evaluated consecutively.
- d. A two-minute warning for reasons/questions classes and a one-minute warning for non-reasons/questions classes will be given, at which time contestants must stand back from all placing classes.
- e. All placing and grading cards will be collected immediately by each group leader after the card has been completed and time has been called.

Special Rules for Intercollegiate Wool Judging Contest

1. Rules: This contest is subject to the Houston Livestock Show General Rules and Regulations, Rules for All Intercollegiate Judging Contests, and to the Special Rules of this section. Where Special Rules conflict with other rules, Special Rules prevail.

2. Eligibility:

- a. Open to agricultural colleges and universities which offer a degree in animal science.
- b. Each school will be permitted to enter two teams. The three highest scores will count for all team totals. The low scoring individual will be considered the alternate and will be eligible for any individual awards.
- c. A team will consist of a minimum of three and maximum of four members. A contestant must have been regularly enrolled in their respective colleges since Oct. 1, 2024. The contestant must never have served as an official instructor at any agricultural college, as a regular Extension Agent, as a regular vocational agricultural teacher, as an official representative of a breed association or officiated as a wool judge in a state, regional or national show. Applications for entry must be signed officially by the team coach, certifying that all team members are eligible for entry in this contest.
- d. Contestants entering this contest will not be eligible to enter future Wool Judging Contests at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.
- 3. Entry Fees: An entry fee of \$100 will be charged for entering this contest. Junior and Senior colleges will be allowed to enter additional Individual contestants for a fee of \$30 per individual.

4. Conduct of Contestants:

- a. Coaches and alternate team members will not be allowed to see the classes until after the official judges have given their reasons. Contestants, coaches and alternate team member will be given 45 minutes to view the classes at the conclusion of the contest.
- b. Contestants are warned against rough handling of contest fleeces. Any contestant who violates this rule will be asked to place the remainder of the classes without handling. No warning will be given.
- c. While the contest is in progress, there is to be no conferring between contestants or anyone else, except as directed by the Superintendent or his representative.
- d. Contestants or coaches violating the rules will be barred from competition and their team disqualified.
- e. Contestants will provided an official scantron and are required to mark all their answers on the official scantron. At the conclusion of judging, there will be five (5) minutes to verify all answers have been marked correctly on their scantron; however, contestants **WILL NOT** be allowed to review the fleeces. Contest Officials will not wait on contestants to copy all answers if they have not finished. At the conclusion of five (5) minutes, scantrons will be collected immediately, **NO EXCEPTIONS**.
- 5. Classes: The classes to be judged are as follows:
 - a. Three (3) classes of breed fleeces. Fleeces will be placed on the basis of weight, staple length, grade and breed requirements. Reasons to be given on one class.
 - b. Three (3) classes of commercial fleeces. Fleeces will be placed on the basis of weight, staple length, grade, yield and fiber strength. Reasons to be given on one class.
 - c. Three (3) sets of oral reasons shall be presented by each contestant: (1) breeding class (1) commercial class and (1) breeding or commercial class, to be determined by the officials.
 - d. A class of 15 fleeces will be scored for grade, spinning counts present, length, character, purity, and yield. Reasons will not be given on this class. Contestants will submit their findings on an official grading sheet.

Special Rules for Intercollegiate Wool Judging Contest

- e. Fifteen (15) minutes will be allowed for the placing of each class of four (4) fleeces. A maximum of forty-five (45) minutes will be allowed for scoring the class of 15 fleeces. Each contestant will be allowed two and one half (2 ½) minutes per fleece and seven and one half (7 ½) minutes to re-examine any or all of the fifteen (15) fleeces.
- f. Contestants shall be allowed twenty (20) minutes to prepare each set of oral reasons.
- 6. Awards: Contestants must be present to receive their awards. Any remaining awards will not be mailed following the show.
